April 28, 1895-July 5, 1990

Carl H. Ringgenberg, 95, 1801 20th St., died Thursday of congestive heart failure at Mary Greeley Medical Center. Services will be held Saturday, July 7, at 1:30 p.m., at Adams Funeral Home, with the Rev. John S. Anderson officiating. Burial will be in Ames Municipal Cemetery.

Carl Ringgenberg was born in Campbell, Neb., to Henry and Anna C. (Bierhaus) Ringgenberg. He moved to Ames in 1903 with his family. From 1917 to 1918, he lived in Whiting, and from 1918 to 1919, he served as an engineer in the United States Army during World War I. On Dec. 30, 1919, he married Eloise Minkler in Ames. She died on April 11, 1965. On Dec. 20, 1966, he married Ruth Plagmann. She died on Sept. 25, 1976. On Dec. 3, 1979, he married Vera Wymore in Ames.

He was a member of First United Methodist Church, where he served as Sunday school teacher, member of the board of trustees, choir director and on the finance committee. He also served as clerk of Washington Township Trustees; on the Story County AAA Committee during the

1930s; and the Story County Board of Education for 16 years. In 1950, he was elected to the Iowa House of Representatives, serving for three terms; and in 1956, he was elected to the Iowa Senate, where he served until 1960.

He is survived by his wife, Vera; one son, Robert of Nevada; two daughters, Ruth Matson of Ames and Marilyn Patrick of Dallas, Texas; eight grandchildren; and eight great-grandchildren.

He also was preceded in death by one daughter, Dorothy Ringgenberg in 1943; and two brothers, Frank in infancy and Calvin in 1964.
