Fred Schwengel, 86

Fred Schwengel of Arlington, Va., born in rural Sheffield and served Iowans in the U.S. House of Representatives for eight terms, died Thursday, April 1, 1983, in Virginia. He will be buried Thursday, April 8, in Davenport, where he worked in the insurance industry from 1937 to 1954. Schwengel, 86, died of heart and kidney failure at Arlington Hospital.

Fred was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gayhart Schwengel, born about six miles east of Chapin, and attended No. 9 West Fork country school. Entering high school, he attended the Chapin Consolidated School for several years, and in 1924 was a star basketball center on the Chapin team. He graduated from Sheffield High School several years later.

Fred graduated from Northeast Missouri Teachers College in Kirksville in 1930 and attended graduate school at the University of Iowa from 1933 to 1935. He served in the House from 1954 to 1964 and from 1966 to 1972. He also served in the Iowa House from 1937 to 1954. He founded the U.S. Capitol Historical Society in 1962. He was the president of the society until 1982 and was chairman of its board of

directors until his death.

Schwengel is survived by his wife, Ethel; two children; a brother; a sister; five grandchildren; one great-grandchild.

Donald M. Logan, 78, of Dougherty, died Saturday, April 3, 1983, at the Veterans Administration Medical Center, Des Moines.





SCHWENGEL, Frederick Delbert, 1906-1993

SCHWENGEL, Frederick Delbert, a Representative from Iowa; born on a farm near Sheffield, Franklin County, Iowa, May 28, 1906; attended the rural schools in West Fork Township and high schools in Chapin and Sheffield, Iowa; graduated from Northeast Missouri Teachers College at Kirksville in 1930, and attended Iowa University graduate school 1933-1935; athletic coach and instructor of history and political science in public schools of Shelbina and Kirksville, Mo., 1930-1937; engaged in the insurance business in Davenport, Iowa, from 1937 to 1954; served in the Missouri National Guard 1929-1936; member of the State house of representatives 1945-1955; member, Iowa Development Commission, 1949-1955; elected as a Republican to the Eighty-fourth and to the four succeeding Congresses (January 3, 1955-January 3, 1965); unsuccessful candidate for reelection in 1964 to the Eighty-ninth Congress; elected as a Republican to the Ninetieth and to the two succeeding Congresses (January 3, 1967-January 3, 1973); unsuccessful candidate for reelection in 1972 to the Ninety-third Congress; founder and president of the Capitol Historical Society, 1962 to present; founder and president, Republican Heritage Foundation; was a resident of Arlington, Va., until his death on April 1, 1993.

continued enlargement of its work in every department, and the extending to deserving youth of opportunities to acquire an education in the liberal arts, together with the rich background of Catholic tradition.

Following the tenure of office of its first president, Father A. J. Schulte, the presidency of St. Ambrose College was entrusted to the Very Rev. J. T. A. Flanagan, who served until 1907. Msgr. William P. Shanahan was its third president, from 1907 to 1915, and was succeeded by the Very Rev. Ulrich A. Hauber, Ph. D. He served from 1926 to 1930, and Msgr. Martin Cone, Ph.D., was its president from 1930 to 1937. The Rt. Rev. Carl Meinberg was president from 1937 to 1940, and he was succeeded by the Rt. Rev. Ambrose Joseph Burke, who is the president of St. Ambrose College at this time.

The Rt. Rev. Burke was born at Sigourney, November 27, 1895, son of John and Julia (Manion) Burke. He was educated in the Sigourney Schools and at St. Ambrose College, which he attended from 1913 to 1915. He thereafter entered St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore, Maryland, receiving his degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1917. Father Burke continued his studies at the Catholic University at Washington, D. C., was granted the degree of Bachelor of Sacred Theology in 1921, and has pursued further studies at Yale University, and has done research work in England. He received the degree of Master of Arts in 1929, and that of Doctor of Philosophy in 1936. Ordained to the priesthood on May 26, 1921, Father Burke's first appointment was as English teacher at St. Ambrose College, a post which he held until 1928. During the scholastic year 1929-30, he was high school principal at St. Ambrose College, and from 1930 to 1932, again English teacher. He became chairman of the English department in 1936, serving until 1940, when he was elected president of the college. Father Burke is as esteemed and respected in the lay world as in the field of Catholic education, and participates actively in many phases of Davenport life. He is a member of the city's Chamber of Commerce, and of the Catholic fraternal order, Knights of Columbus. He also belongs to the Modern Language Association.

FREDERIC D. SCHWENDEL, district manager of the American Mutual Life Insurance Company, has shown marked abilities and made rapid progress in his chosen field of endeavor. With offices in Davenport, he was recently advanced from the position of general agent, and his present territory covers western Illinois and eastern Iowa. In addition, he has made a spectacular success in politics, having served in the Iowa Legislature and filled other political capacities; and in business connections, church work, and club and fraternal activities is no less active and prominent.

Born in Franklin County, near Sheffield, May 28, 1907, Frederic Delbert Schwengel is a son of Gerhardt and Margaret (Stover) Schwengel. His father, who was born in the Province of Oldenburg, Saxony, came to the United States in 1902 and settled at Sheffield, Iowa. He had served his two years of military service in the German Army, and on settling in Iowa became a farmer, and aided the cause of his community as a member of the school board at West Fork Township, Franklin County. He was a son of Frederick, who was born at Saarbruck, Saxony, and later moved to Oldenburg. The Schwengel family dates back to 1380 to an Ulrich Zwingle, who was of

Swiss descent. On migrating to Germany, the family adopted the German spelling of its name.

Frederick and Margaret (Boehlje) Stover, parents of Margaret (Stover) Schwengel, also came from Germany, arriving in the United States in 1896 and settling in Iowa, where they became farmers.

Frederic Delbert Schwengel is the eldest of six children of Gerhardt and Margaret (Stover) Schwengel. He attended rural schools in West Fork Township, and high school at Chapin, graduating from Sheffield High School in 1926. He thereafter attended Northwest Missouri Teachers College in Kirksville, Missouri. While there he played on the football team, was captain of the college track team, and was awarded the Blue Key in recognition of leadership qualities. He graduated from the Kirksville college in 1930, then attended the Iowa University graduate school.

On completing his education, Mr. Schwengel first struck out in the direction of becoming an educator. He taught school in Missouri for seven years, but has been in the insurance business in Davenport ever since. His first connection in that business, dating from September 1, 1937, was with the Home Life Insurance Company, with which he remained for eleven months. Associating himself with the American Mutual Life Insurance Company in August, 1938, he began a period of rapid advancement. From special agent he became general agent, and now holds the responsible position of district manager, his territory taking in western Illinois and eastern Iowa. Mr. Schwengel is a member of the Iowa State Underwriters Association. He was a director of the Junior Chamber of Commerce and later state president, and while at Kirksville, Missouri, was a member of the Lions and the Metropolitan Club. In 1944, Mr. Schwengel was elected to the Iowa Legislature. He was no political novice at the time despite his youth, for he had been county district chairman of the Young Republicans, and had served on the congressional committee. While a member of the legislative body he was a member and chairman of the School Textbook Committee. He is former president of the Scott County and First District Young Republicans, and past president of the Iowa Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Schwengel has often shown his value to the community as an active citizen. He has served on Red Cross drives, and is on the board of the community chest. Every worthy project having as its goal the betterment of the community in which he lives has Mr. Schwengel's wholehearted support; and his enthusiasm and co-operative spirit has made him one of the most popular of the young business men.

Church work is of particular interest to him; he is a trustee of the Baptist Church, and very active in its work, having also held the responsible position of deacon. Fraternal activities constitute one of his hobbies. Mr. Schwengel is a Mason, a member of Zarephath Consistory at Davenport of which he is Venerable Master; Kaaba Temple, Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine; and all York Rite bodies. He is also a member of the De Molay Legion of Honor. He belongs to the Independent Order of Odd Fellows at Sheffield, is active in the work of the Boy Scouts of America, and retains membership in the Phi Sigma Epsilon and Blue Key fraternities. Since his undergraduate days, Frederic Schwengel has been interested in athletics, and while teaching in Missouri was coach and instructor at Shelbina,

National Convention at Cleveland, Ohio, in 1936; elected as a Republican to the Seventy-ninth and Eightieth Congresses (January 3, 1945–January 3, 1949); unsuccessful candidate for reelection in 1948 to the Eighty-first Congress; elected to the Eighty-second Congress and served from January 3, 1951, until his death in Alexandria, Va., April 2, 1952; interment in Memorial Park Cemetery, Tulsa, Okla.

SCHWABE, Max (brother of George Blaine Schwabe), a Representative from Missouri; born on a farm near Columbia, Boone County, Mo., December 6, 1905; attended the public schools and the University of Missouri at Columbia, completing a major in political science and taking a course in law; engaged in the life insurance business in Columbia, Mo., 1926–1942; elected as a Republican to the Seventy-eighth, Seventy-ninth, and Eightieth Congresses (January 3, 1943–January 3, 1949); unsuccessful candidate for reelection in 1948 to the Eighty-first Congress; is a resident of Columbia, Mo.

SCHWARTZ, Henry Herman (Harry), a Senator from Wyoming; born on a farm near Fort Recovery, Mercer County, Ohio, May 18, 1869; educated in the public schools of Mercer County and Cincinnati, Ohio; engaged in the newspaper business at Fort Recovery, Ohio, 1892–1894 and at Sioux Falls, S. Dak., 1894–1896; studied law; was admitted to the bar in 1895 and commenced practice in Sioux Falls; member of the South Dakota House of Representatives in 1896 and 1897; chief of the field division of the United States General Land Office, at Spokane, Wash., and Helena, Mont., 1897–1907; special assistant to the Attorney General in 1907; chief of field service, General Land Office, Washington, D. C., 1907–1910; moved to Casper, Wyo., in 1915; president of the Casper Board of Education and the Natrona County High School Board 1928–1934; trustee of Memorial Hospital, Casper, Wyo., 1926–1932; member of the Wyoming State senate 1933–1935; chairman of the Democratic State committee 1932–1936; delegate to the Wyoming Democratic State conventions 1927–1935; delegate to the Democratic National Conventions in 1928 and 1932; unsuccessful candidate for election to the United States Senate in 1930; elected as a Democrat to the United States Senate in 1936 for the term commencing January 3, 1937, and ending January 3, 1943; unsuccessful candidate for reelection in 1942; appointed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt to the National Mediation Board on February 26, 1943, and served until February 1, 1947; resumed the practice of law in Casper, Wyo., until his death there April 24, 1955; interment in Highland Cemetery.

SCHWARTZ, John, a Representative from Pennsylvania; born in Sunbury, Northumberland County, Pa., October 27, 1793; received a limited schooling; at the age of ten years was apprenticed to a merchant in Reading, Pa., and became a partner at the expiration of his apprenticeship; served in the War of 1812 as a major; engaged in the manufacture of iron products; elected as a Democrat to the Thirty-sixth Congress and served from March 4, 1859, until his death in Washington, D. C., June 20, 1860; interment in Charles Evans Cemetery, Reading, Berks County, Pa.

SCHWELLENBACH, Lewis Baxter, a Senator from Washington; born in Superior, Douglas County, Wis., September 20, 1894; moved to Spokane, Wash., with his parents in 1902; attended the grade and high schools in Spokane and was graduated from the law department of the University of Washington at Seattle in 1917; assistant instructor at the University of Washington in 1916 and 1917; during the First World War served from July 26, 1918, as a private in the Twelfth Regiment, United States Infantry, until discharged as a corporal February

14, 1919; was admitted to the bar in 1919 and commenced practice in Seattle, Wash.; State commander of the American Legion in 1922; member of the board of regents of the University of Washington in 1933 and 1934, serving as president in 1933; chairman of the Democratic State convention in 1924; chairman of the King County Democratic committee 1928–1930; unsuccessful candidate for nomination for Governor in 1932; delegate to the Interparliamentary Union at The Hague in 1938; elected as a Democrat to the United States Senate and served from January 3, 1935, to December 16, 1940, when he resigned; was not a candidate for renomination in 1940, having been appointed United States district judge for the eastern district of Washington, in which capacity he served until his resignation to become Secretary of Labor; appointed Secretary of Labor by President Harry S. Truman and served from June 1, 1945, until his death in Walter Reed Hospital, Washington, D. C., June 10, 1948; interment in Washelli Cemetery, Seattle, Wash.

SCHWENGEL, Frederick Delbert, a Representative from Iowa; born on a farm near Sheffield, Franklin County, Iowa, May 28, 1907; attended the rural schools in West Fork Township and high schools in Chapin and Sheffield, Iowa; graduated from Northeast Missouri Teachers College at Kirksville in 1930, and attended Iowa University graduate school 1933–1935; athletic coach and instructor of history and political science in public schools of Shelbina and Kirksville, Mo., 1930–1937; engaged in the insurance business in Davenport, Iowa, from September 1, 1937, to December 31, 1954; served in the Missouri National Guard 1929–1936; member of the State house of representatives 1945–1954; member, Iowa Development Commission, 1949–1955; elected as a Republican to the Eighty-fourth, Eighty-fifth, and Eighty-sixth Congresses (January 3, 1955–January 3, 1961). *Reelected to the Eighty-seventh Congress.*

SCHWERT, Pius Louis, a Representative from New York; born in Angola, Erie County N. Y., November 22, 1892; attended the public schools in Angola and Lafayette High School, Buffalo, N. Y.; was graduated from Wharton School of Commerce, University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, Pa., in 1914; played professional baseball with the New York American League Ball Club 1914–1917; during the First World War served in the United States Navy as a yeoman, first class, and later was commissioned as an ensign; engaged in mercantile and banking pursuits in Angola; president of the Bank of Angola, N. Y., 1921–1931; member of the first salary survey committee of Erie County in 1932; moved to Buffalo, N. Y., and served as county clerk 1933–1938; elected as a Democrat to the Seventy-sixth and Seventy-seventh Congresses and served from January 3, 1939, until his death in Washington, D. C., March 11, 1941; interment in Forest Avenue Cemetery, Angola, N. Y.

SCOBLOCK, James Paul, a Representative from Pennsylvania; born in Archbald, Lackawanna County, Pa., May 10, 1909; attended the public school and St. Thomas High School, Scranton, Pa.; was graduated from Fordham University, New York, N. Y., in 1930 and took postgraduate work at Columbia University, New York, N. Y.; member of the Department of Public Assistance Board of Lackawanna County, Pa.; engaged in fruit growing and processing since 1937; elected as a Republican to the Seventy-ninth Congress to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of John W. Murphy and at the same time was elected to the Eightieth Congress and served from November 5, 1946, to January 3, 1949; unsuccessful candidate for renomination in 1948; resumed former business pursuits; is a resident of Archbald, Pa.

SCOFIELD, Glenni William, a Representative from Pennsylvania; born in Dewittville, Chautauqua County, N. Y., on

Missouri, public schools (1930-32). From 1932 to 1937, also during the teaching years, he was coach and head of physical education at Kirksville, Missouri. He has been a national committeeman of the National Amateur Athletic Union Code. He is also a former National Guardsman. He has been national executive secretary and treasurer, since 1936, of Phi Sigma Epsilon, and was national president from 1932 to 1936. He also belongs to Phi Epsilon Kappa. In addition to fraternal and athletic interests, he greatly enjoys poetry.

At Unionville, Missouri, August 15, 1931, Frederic Delbert Schwengel married Clara Ethel Cassity, of Purdin, Missouri. She, too, is a graduate of Northeast Missouri Teachers College, and is at present a member of the Women's Club, the Book Club, and the Baptist Church. Mr. and Mrs. Schwengel are the parents of the following children: 1. Franklin D., born September 1, 1933, now a junior high school student. 2. Dorothy Jean, who was born February 12, 1935, and is now a student at J. B. Young Public School.

RALPH JAMES LEYSEN, managing editor of the Davenport "Times," has had over forty years of experience in the newspaper business, and has occupied his present position since the 1920s. He came up to this post of public responsibility without special opportunity, manifesting a forcefulness of character and abilities which admirably qualify him. He has also taken a vital part in the civic life of Davenport, particularly in work designed to benefit the city and its people.

Born at Muscatine, June 23, 1888, Ralph James is a son of Jacob P. and Jane (Cassidy) Leysen. His father for many years owned and operated a retail shoe store in Muscatine. He was in turn a son of Peter and Mary Leysen, one of whom was a native of Luxembourg, the other of Alsace-Lorraine. Peter Leysen had settled in Muscatine shortly after his arrival from Europe, and served the cause of the Union during the Civil War. William Cassidy, Mr. Leysen's maternal grandfather, came from Ireland. He was one of the first locomotive engineers in Iowa, arriving there in the early pioneer days of the state. One of his duties in the pursuit of his occupation was transporting troops during the Civil War. His wife was Jane Morris, of Nottingham, England.

After receiving his education in the Muscatine public schools, Ralph James Leysen accepted employment as a reporter of the Muscatine "Journal" in 1905, and has been in the newspaper business ever since. He first became city editor, then managing editor of the "Journal," and, in 1922, upon the death of James Hardman, managing editor of the Davenport "Times," he moved to that city and assumed the editorship of the paper. He has filled the position since, and is also vice president of the Times Company.

Mr. Leysen visited England in the fall of 1944, as a guest of the British Ministry of Information, and France, through accommodations extended by the ordnance department of the Army. He has served his community as a member of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce, and is a member of the board of the Davenport chapter of the American Red Cross, a member of the advisory board of the Salvation Army, and a member of the Davenport Library board. He also belongs to the American Society of Newspaper Editors, the Washington, D. C., National

Press Club, the Contemporary History Round Table of Davenport, the Davenport Club, and the Outing Club. He is a Republican in his political affiliations.

At Des Moines, on December 1, 1934, Ralph James Leysen married Ann Gault Witcher, and they are the parents of a daughter, Jancey, now Mrs. Walter D. Stockly, who resides in Wilton, Connecticut, where Mr. Stockly is an editor of "Time" magazine.

WILLIAM WADSWORTH BRUBAKER, formerly an assistant county attorney of Scott County, is a man with ample qualifications for the public service. He established a sound legal practice in the years before his selection as assistant county attorney, is active in political affairs, a popular member of fraternal groups, and a leader among those local residents who are interested in his hobby of amateur moving pictures.

Mr. Brubaker is a native of Davenport, born January 29, 1907, son of Christopher and Nellie (Miller) Brubaker. His father was the son of Isaac Brubaker, who settled in Whiteside County, Illinois. The five brothers who originally brought the Brubaker family name from Switzerland in 1752, settled in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. The father of William Wadsworth Brubaker, together with his brother Miles, came to Davenport, and became an extensive land owner in that region. He died in 1928, although Nellie (Miller) Brubaker is still living. William Wadsworth was their only child.

Educated in Davenport grade schools and graduating from high school there in 1924, William Wadsworth Brubaker entered Augustana College, where he received the degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1928. Continuing his advanced education at the State University of Iowa, he was granted his degree of Juris Doctor by that institution in 1933. During his college years he had been a noted athlete as well as receiving scholastic honors. He was on the honor roll at Augustana College, and a member of the varsity football team, 1926-1927, captain of the track team in 1928, and a member of Gamma Alpha Beta and Delta Sigma fraternities. At the University of Iowa he was a member of Sigma Nu, a social fraternity, and Phi Delta Phi, legal fraternity. He established his practice of law in Davenport in 1933, in which year he had been admitted to the Iowa state bar, and continued independent practice until 1939, when he became assistant county attorney. He is at present a member of the firm of Wells and Brubaker, which was formed on January 1, 1946. A member of the Scott County Bar Association, he is at present on the board of its executive council, having previously served as vice president and secretary. A Republican in politics, and active in the councils of that party, he was a director of the Young Republicans Club. Born to Gerhardt and Margaret (Stover) Schwengel on a farm near Sheffield, Iowa, May 28,1907, Fred Schwengel attended rural schools and high school at Chapin. He graduated with a B.S. from Northeast Missouri Teachers College (now Northeast Missouri State University) at Kirksville, Missouri, in 1930 and took post-graduate work during summers at the University of Iowa from 1933 to 1935. After a stint of coaching and teaching in public schools in Missouri, Schwengel entered the insurance business in Davenport, Iowa, in 1937 and from 1938 to 1955 was an agent of the American Mutual Life Insurance Co

Schwengel was a member of the Public Works Committee, the House Administration Committee, and the Joint Committee on the Library. Before his defeat in 1964, he served on the District of Columbia Committee. He was also a member of two commissions, the National Visitor Facilities Advisory Commission and the Commission on Highway Beautification. The Week in Washington Program for Iowa college students and professors was introduced by him. He also instigated a Research Team at the University of Iowa using students to help with legislative research

Schwengel was the Vice-Chairman of the Civil War Centennial Commission. In Congress he authored bills to commemorate the 150th anniversary of Lincoln's birth, the 100th anniversary of the Civil War, and the 100th anniversary of Lincoln's first and second inaugurals. After leaving political office, Schwengel served as president of the U.S. Capitol Historical Society.


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
