

Arch McFarlane Services Will Be Wednesday; Stricken at Chicago

CHICAGO — Funeral services for Arch W. McFarlane, longtime dean of the Iowa legislature, will be Wednesday at 1:30 p. m. in Christ Episcopal Church in Waterloo.

Mr. McFarlane, 75, of 213 Parkview Blvd., died Sunday at 2:30 p. m. in the Iowa headquarters of the Palmer House Hotel in Chicago, where he was attending the national Republican convention.

The Rev. Charles Gunnell, pastor of Christ Episcopal Church, will officiate at the funeral. Burial will be in Fairview cemetery.

THE BODY OF Mr. McFarlane will arrive in Waterloo Monday evening. Friends may call at Parrott & Wood Funeral Home from noon Tuesday until 12:30 p. m. Wednesday. The casket will not be opened at the church.

The family suggests that friends who wish to do so may contribute to the Christ Episcopal Church memorial fund in lieu of sending flowers.

Mr. McFarlane came to Chicago by train with this reporter, with whom he had breakfast. After registering at his hotel he went immediately to Iowa delegation headquarters at the Palmer House.

MR. McFARLANE was stricken by a heart attack at the Palmer House while talking to Mrs. Anna Lomas, national committeewoman from Red Oak, and died almost immediately. He had been ill with a heart condition for more than three years, having first been stricken while serving his last session in the Iowa Senate during the spring of 1957.

Mr. McFarlane had come to Chicago on the Illinois Central Land O' Corn, which arrived in Chicago at 1:15 p. m. (CDT).

He checked in at the La

Salle Hotel and then had come to the Palmer House to visit with old friends at an Iowa delegation caucus and reception.

MR. McFARLANE was not a delegate to the convention. He had come to Chicago on special invitation of an old friend, Charles E. Wittenmeyer, Davenport, national committeeman.

Mr. McFarlane said a short time before he died that Wittenmeyer had promised him an assistant sergeant-at-arms badge to get him on the convention floor.

His death cast a pall over the Iowa delegation. Many of his lifelong friends were among the delegates.

At the time of his death Mr. McFarlane did not hold public office. He was defeated in his bid for reelection to the senate by Melvin Wolf, Waterloo attorney, two years ago.

HOWEVER, HE WAS a Republican candidate to the Iowa House, and his death has created a vacancy on the ticket that will have to be filled by the Black Hawk county Central committee.

Mr. McFarlane had been in the wholesale coal business all his life and was still active in that business at the time of his death. He maintained offices on the fifth floor of the National Bldg.

MR. McFARLANE was born in Waterloo April 14, 1885, the son of William W. and Emma J. Moss McFarlane. He married Elsie Hawkins April 6, 1908, in Clinton.

He is survived by his wife and one brother, Edward, of 419 Denver St. His parents and a sister preceded him in death.

He began his legislative career in 1914 when he was elected to the Iowa House of Representatives. He was re-elected in 1914, 1916, 1918 and 1920. In 1926 he was elected to the Iowa Senate, and in 1928 and 1930 was lieutenant governor of Iowa.

HE WAS AGAIN elected to the House of Representatives in 1932, and was reelected in 1934, 1938, 1940, 1942, 1944, 1946, 1950 and 1952. In 1954 he was elected to the Iowa Senate, the first man to represent the new senatorial district composed of Black Hawk county alone. The district had previously included Grundy county.

He was the only Iowan ever to preside over the senate as lieutenant governor and be sworn in as a returning House member on the same day. He was twice speaker of the House, and often cited his battle in 1917 to save the infant Iowa Highway Commission as the

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Seeks Unity In New York

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (AP)—Sen. John F. Kennedy said Monday he expects harmony can be achieved between squabbling New York Democratic factions and hopes he can strengthen his hand there in the November election.

New York Mayor Robert F. Wagner told the senator the Kennedy-Johnson ticket "will win big" in New York.

THE PRESIDENTIAL nominee told reporters in an informal news conference on the lawn of his summer home he had received some "very helpful" advice and suggestions from Wagner who participated in the news conference.

Kennedy and the mayor conferred for two hours this morning.

The senator, among other things, said he also has sent his brother, Edward M. (Ted) Kennedy to California with a message to Gov. Edmund G. (Pat) Brown.

"NEW YORK and California—because of their size and geographical locations — are the anchors to our success," Kennedy said. His message to Brown, he said, deals with campaign plans and stressed the importance he attaches to the drive to register eligible voters.

The senator said he had invited Wagner during the national convention in Los Angeles to come here "to discuss some of the problems and opportunities" faced in New York.

KENNEDY announced that Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, his vice presidential running mate, will arrive in Hyannis Port Friday for campaign discussions. Johnson previously

Kennedy Names Negro Lawyer as Assistant

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (AP)—Sen. John F. Kennedy, Monday appointed Frank Reeves, a Washington lawyer, as an assistant to travel with him in the presidential campaign.

Pierre Salinger, Kennedy's press secretary, said Reeves, who is a Negro, will have "a wide variety of duties — his job is not at all limited to civil rights."

MEMBERS OF the board of supervisors joined in paying tribute to Mr. McFarlane after voting to close all offices in the courthouse starting at 1:15 p. m. Wednesday, for the period in which funeral services will be in progress.

David Keith, board chairman, lauded McFarlane's character and his capacity for friendship. Francis Messerly called attention to the 45 years of public service, "a record which speaks for itself."

Ed Refshauge, in brief remarks, termed the life of McFarlane an example for all in pointing to his dedicated efforts in the interests of Black Hawk county and community.

GOV. HERSCHEL Loveless said Monday he was sorry to hear of the death of Mr. McFarlane.

In a statement, Loveless said:

"The death of Arch McFarlane saddens the hearts of all who knew him—particularly those who were associated with him in state government over the past half century.

"Mr. McFarlane's friends are many and devoted. His contributions to the state over a long period of years are written in Iowa's history. On behalf of the citizens of Iowa, I convey deepest sympathies to the McFarlane family."



Air Corps. Upon graduation from St. Ambrose College, Davenport, in 1949, Frank went on to the University of Iowa to secure a law degree in 1952. He married Mary A. Mallon of Cedar Rapids on June 21, 1952.

He was a member of the Cedar Rapids law firm of Martin and McGuire, from the summer of 1952 until his death.

Frank, as a boy, got his start in politics by helping his mother tack up Roosevelt posters. His first try in politics ended in defeat in 1956, but in 1958 he again sought and this time won election to the Iowa House of Representatives.

Despite only a single term in the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, Frank distinguished himself by winning widespread friendship and respect among the members of both parties. The *Cedar Rapids Gazette* editorialized, "Even though only a 'freshman' in service, he was credited with saving the proposed constitutional amendment for a non-partisan judiciary by proposing successfully a 10-year trial period amendment. Until his amendment was adopted, the resolution was headed for almost certain defeat. With his amendment, it passed with two votes to spare."

For those who knew him well, Frank's humor was his hallmark. Always smiling, he had a fund of stories for any occasion. His hearty and heartfelt laughter will be long remembered by his many friends.

The state was shocked to hear of Frank Martin's death from a heart attack on July 15, 1959, at the age of 33, and at the end of his first session as a Democrat representative from Linn County to the Iowa House of Representatives.

Mr. Martin is survived by a widow, and four sons, and a daughter, who was born shortly after the father's death. Also surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Martin, one brother and two sisters.

ARCH W. McFARLANE

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Arch W. McFarlane, begs leave to submit the following memorial.

Arch W. McFarlane was born April 14, 1885, in Waterloo, Iowa, the son of William W. and Emma J. Moss McFarlane. He passed away on July 24,

1960, while attending the National Republican Convention in Chicago, at the age of seventy-five years.

Mr. McFarlane was educated in the Waterloo schools. On April 6, 1908, he married the former Elsie Hawkins in Clinton, Iowa. They had no children. He was active in the wholesale coal business in Waterloo all his life and was still active at the time of his death. He was a member of the Episcopal Church.

Mr. McFarlane gave his first speech as a youngster in breeches in the early 1900's by delivering Lincoln's Gettysburg Address to a full house in the old Brown's Opera House in Waterloo. As a youth he was the first editor of the "Orange and Black," the Waterloo East High School paper. His wife was society editor of this paper.

Arch W. McFarlane, a Republican, began his legislative career in 1914 at the age of twenty-nine years, when he was elected to the Iowa House of Representatives. He was re-elected to the House in 1916, 1918 and 1920. In 1926 he was elected to the Iowa Senate, and in 1928 and 1930 he was Lieutenant Governor. In 1932 he was again elected to the House of Representatives; and re-elected in 1934, 1938, 1940, 1942, 1944, 1946, 1950 and 1952. In 1954 he returned to the Senate as the first man to represent the new senatorial district composed of Black Hawk County alone.

He was the only Iowan ever to preside over the Senate as Lieutenant Governor, and be sworn in as a returning House member on the same day. He was twice Speaker of the House, and often cited his battles in 1917 to save the infant Iowa Highway Commission as the incident that gave him the greatest satisfaction.

Arch McFarlane's activities and interests went further than politics. He was president of the Waterloo Baseball Association, a member of Waterloo's Lodge No. 105, the A. F. & A. M., a past patron of the Eastern Star, El Kahis Temple in Cedar Rapids, the Sunny Side Country Club, B.P.O. Elks 290, the Knights of Pythias, Loyal Order of Moose, United Commercial Travelers for 53 years, and was Supreme (international) Counselor in 1931. In 1958 he was presented with U.C.T.'s first "Most Valuable Member" plaque.

He was the first member of the Pioneer Lawmakers invited to join while still a member of the legislature. He was past president of this organization, which presented his portrait to the Iowa Historical Society in 1956. This portrait still hangs in the gallery of distinguished Iowans in the Historical Building.

In 1919, while Mr. McFarlane was Speaker of the House, the first memorial service for deceased legislators was held, under his direction.

He received many other honors. The Arch McFarlane State Park, located east of LaPorte City, was dedicated in 1959. In recognition of his service to conservation, the Black Hawk County Sportsmen's Council in 1958 presented him with an award for outstanding contributions to conservation. In 1957, capitol newsmen presented him with the Distinguished Service Award. He was Speaker pro tempore for the Thirty-seventh General Assembly and Speaker of the House for the Thirty-eighth, Thirty-eighth Extra and Thirty-ninth sessions.

He had been chairman of the advisory investment board of the Iowa Public Employees Retirement System, and a member of the "Little Hoover"

commission which studied problems in government reorganization and consolidation in 1956.

Mr. McFarlane was the Republican candidate to the House of Representatives at the time of his death. His survivors are his wife, and a brother, Edward.

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character, and public service of the late Honorable Clark H. McNeal, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Clark H. McNeal was born in Wright County, Iowa, on December 4, 1918, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. McNeal. He passed away on July 28, 1959, at Belmond, Iowa, at the age of forty.

Mr. McNeal was educated in the public schools of Clarion and of Rockford, Illinois, where his family moved about 1930. He was graduated from Cornell College at Mount Vernon in 1939, then continued his education at the University of Michigan, where he received a master's degree in public administration two years later.

Before making Belmond his home in 1942, he was employed as a branch manager for the Beneficial Management Corporation. He married Dorothy Courson on August 26, 1939, and it was to oversee the farm management business of her father, R. E. Courson, that Mr. McNeal came to Belmond upon the latter's death. He established the McNeal Grain Company at Clarion in 1953, which he continued to operate until his death.

Five children were born to Mr. and Mrs. McNeal: Clark E., 18 and now a freshman at Cornell College; David, 16; Kristin, 12; Tyler, 7; and Sherman, 3.

Belmond remained Mr. McNeal's home to the time of his death. The innumerable civic duties he performed in behalf of his community brought him in 1958 the Lions Club annual award as Belmond's Man-of-the-Year.

Mr. McNeal served five terms in the Iowa Legislature as Representative from Wright County and during the Fifty-eighth General Assembly filled the important position of majority floor leader in the House.

The State of Iowa benefited from the service and the efforts of this man.
