Glenn Sorensen, missing since Sept. 6th, arrived in Des Moines Tuesday

Glenn Sorensen, 42, of Lincoln, Ia., a former Humboldt resident, reported to the Polk County sheriff's office at Des Moines Tuesday saying that he had lost his memory. Missing since September 6, Sorensen is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter B. Sorensen and son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Lindhart of Humboldt.

Sorensen had arrived at Des Moines from Omaha, Neb. He spent Tuesday night in the Polk County jail and was admitted to Broadlawn Polk County Hospital at Des Moines Wednesday. He is the owner of an Allis-Chalmers implement business at Lincoln, Ia., which has been operated by his wife, Doris, and son, Charles, since his disappearance.

At the hospital, Sorensen was reported as being in good physical condition.

Chief Jailer Howard Elde of the Polk County Sheriff's Office said that Sorensen carried social security and draft cards. Names and identifying number of the cards were erased. Also in his possession were bus ticket stubs from Springfield, Mo., to Oklahoma City, Okla., and from Oklahoma City to Omaha.

Sorensen was identified Wednesday afternoon by his wife and Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Lindhart. Sorensen was dressed in a gray suit and blue sport shirt. He had \$1 in change. The draft card was issued in 1948 in Humboldt County.

Sorensen heard a radio report Wednesday about 9:30 a.m. about the man who had reported to the Polk County sheriff's office with a loss of memory. She called the Lindharts and Mr. Lindhart contacted the radio sta-

tion who referred him to the Polk County sheriff's office.

After talking to the Polk County sheriff, Mr. Lindhart called his daughter at Lincoln.

Mr. and Mrs. Lindhart and their daughter, Doris, and her son, Charles, 21, and Barbara, 17, arrived at Broadlawn hospital at 2:00 p.m.

They recognized Glenn Sorensen but he said that he did not know them.

The oldest daughter of the Sorensens, Mrs. Lynn (Glenda) Slinning, resides at Sherman, Texas, where her husband is stationed in the army.

On the morning of September 6, Sorensen received a call from a customer near Reinbeck that a part on a tractor he had sold about a year earlier was missing. Sorensen drove to the tractor and said he would get a part for it. He left for Dysart, Ia., for the part but never arrived there. He was driving a 1953 Studebaker pickup.

The Tama County sheriff's office and planes searched Tama County in vain for the missing man.

Arsons suspected two Humboldt

Two recent fires in the Humboldt area are being questioned and Harold E. Schurtz, arson investigator for the State of Iowa, of the State Fire Marshall's Office in Des Moines, is investigating with the assistance of Humboldt County Deputy Sheriff Mervyn Johnson and of Bill Stow, chief of the Humboldt Volunteer Fire Department.

The officers stated that they do not feel that the fires were of natural origin.

Week end thefts undergoing investigation in Humboldt

Investigation by the Humboldt County Sheriff's Office in the theft of 21 geese and ducks from the Melvin Thorn farm at Rutland and the theft of \$64 from Johnny's Mobil station in Humboldt is still underway. As of Friday morning, no further clues to either theft had been uncovered.

Melvin Thorn is offering a \$50 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who stole the birds. According to Humboldt County Sheriff Marvin Andersen, the theft occurred sometime late Saturday evening, November 18, or early Sunday morning. The fowl were not missed until Sunday afternoon.

The cash stolen from Johnny's Mobil was believed to have been taken some time after 9:30 p.m. Saturday, November 18. According to the investigating officers, the thieves had broken a window on the south side of the building and unlocked it. Nothing besides the money was disturbed.

The only clues to the theft were some badly smudged footprints outside the window.

The station is owned and operated by John Van Horn of Humboldt.

For the past 12 years, Mervin Dobbs, a native of Wisconsin, but now a resident of Renwick, has been the head cheesemaker.

There are two milk truck haulers and on the average during the daily deliveries seven days a week, about 7½ million pounds of milk have been brought in for a year, producing about 740,000 pounds of cheese, averaging better than a 2,000 pounds each day.

For sometime now this milk has been made into Pioneer Colby Cheese. The Machas also produced a supply of brick cheese, Limburger, and Swiss cheese that was held for retail

be sweet for cheese making.

The original Pioneer Cheese Factory was started and built by ten farmers living in the area in 1888, the cost of the land was about \$123, the farmers being their own carpenters. It was owned as cooperative and the farmers hired a cheesemaker.

The new plant is a two story structure with a six room dwelling where the Macha's live.

Besides operating the factory, Mr. and Mrs. Macha farm several hundred acres of land.

Mr. Mervin Dobbs will be starting his new job at the Renwick Community Creamery as of Dec. 1.

Funeral services for Edward Oppedahl, 77, prominent Renwick farmer were held at 2 p.m. Monday, November 27, 1967 at Lake Lutheran Church with Rev. R. W. Hoppenworth officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery.

Mr. Oppedahl died Wednesday night at Lutheran Hospital in Fort Dodge, where he had been a patient for nine weeks.

Born in Goldfield, Mr. Oppedahl attended Iowa State University, and taught in the Goldfield area public schools from 1910 through 1915. He married Isadore Gangstead there in 1914. In 1915 he started farming specializing in feeding cattle. He was president of the Livestock Shipping Association of Renwick from 1925 to 1937, and president of the Humboldt County Farm Bureau from 1936 to 1946.

Mr. Oppedahl, a Republican, served in the Iowa Legislature from Humboldt County, 1951 through 1956, and in 1955-56 he was vice-chairman of the Iowa Tax Study Commission. Mrs. Oppedahl died in 1964.

Mr. Oppedahl married Georgia Paine at Renwick in 1966.

Surviving are his wife; four sons, Sherill, Goldfield; Paul, La Crescenta, Calif.; Robert, Renwick; Phillip U. S. Navy Air Corps, stationed on an aircraft carrier in Tonkin Bay, Vietnam; two daughters, Mrs. Carroll

Edward N. Ove was born January 1, 1891, in Aalborg, Denmark. He received his early education in the country schools of Denmark, and attended the Aalborg Technical School where he became a cabinet maker, bricklayer and civil engineer.

He emigrated to Canada in 1914 and to Grundy County, Iowa, in 1915, at which time he started working as a general contractor.

Mr. Ove was married February 26, 1917, to Anna K. Jensen, from whom he was later divorced, and on June 19, 1948, he was married to Gertrude Greer in Hutchinson, Kansas.

Mr. Ove served in World War I. He served as State Representative in the Forty-sixth General Assembly. He was later employed by the Corps of Engineers, the Department of the Interior, and the State Highway Department of South Dakota. In 1962, Mr. Ove retired and moved to Iowa City, Iowa.

He was a member of the First Church, the Elks Club, and the American Legion, all in Iowa City. He was a charter member and first commander of American Legion Post 471 at Dike, Iowa. He was past master of the Masonic Lodge and past worthy grand of the Odd Fellows Lodge. He was a member of Iowa Engineering Society and the National Society of Professional Engineers.

Mr. Ove passed away March 6, 1966.
