


D.C. Nolan, Former State Senator, Dies

D. C. Nolan, 70, a former state senator and Republican floor leader, died Sunday at a Des Moines hospital following a stroke. Mr. Nolan was stricken Wednesday while he and his wife were visiting their daughter in Des Moines.

Mr. Nolan served in the Iowa Senate from 1953 to 1965 and chaired legislative committees on highways, judiciary and insurance. He was elected Senate majority leader in 1957.

He was a graduate of Creighton University, where he played football, and practiced law in Des Moines before moving to Iowa City in 1931.

In Iowa City, he was a charter member of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, past president of the Iowa City Chamber of Commerce and the Johnson County Bar Association, Elks, Moose, St. Patrick's parish and was a 50-year honorary member of the fourth degree Knights of Columbus.

He was the first chairman of Young Republicans League of Iowa, and was active in state and national bar associations and Boy Scouting.

Born Aug. 29, 1902, at Panorama, Iowa, he was the son of Marlin J. and Anna Hanley Nolan. He was married to Margaret Schwertley at Missouri Valley, Iowa, Dec. 29, 1927.

Pentagon

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon warned North Vietnam today that because of new fighting in Laos, it may order U. S. planes to begin a new bombing campaign there.

Pentagon spokesman Jerry W. Friedhelm said North Vietnamese forces led by tanks had over-run a town defended by Royal Laotian forces near the Plaine de Jarres in Laos within the last several hours.

He described it as "a major violation of the cease-fire."

The Pentagon said an announcement whether U.S. B52 bombers would come from Command headquarters Hawaii later today.

U.S. bombers have been hitting Cambodia for about six weeks. There has been no American air strikes in Vietnam since the cease-fire was signed Jan. 27.

Decision To Be On Shopping C

Plans for a proposed \$10 million shopping center here will be brought back before the city's Planning and Zoning Commission in the near future, a spokesman said this morning.

Marvin Christensen of General Growth Properties, a Des Moines real estate development firm that contemplates building the shopping center here, said company representatives intend to appear before Planning and Zoning next week.

Planning and Zoning will be asked to rule on a request for commercial rezoning for a 32-acre site in southeast Iowa City for the shopping center.

Little has been heard about the shopping center proposal since last summer, when Planning and Zoning deferred action on General Growth's request that the proposed shopping center site be rezoned C2 commercial.

The property is zoned R1A single-family residential, a classification which prohibits commercial development.

Planning and Zoning clear last summer the turn down C2 zoning, and members of the commission indicated they might request a change to PC commercial zoning, a more restrictive classification.

Christensen said General Growth is prepared to accept either C2 or PC, and applied economic and zoning information that must be filed with a request for rezoning. Christensen was in this afternoon with General Growth's Iowa City representative to review the request and to discuss the firm should ask for PC zoning.


Former Cook At County Jail Faces Charges

I have forgotten how many times I have been asked why a subject's eyes will come out a startling red color at times. This problem, known as "Red Eye" is caused by the light from your flash being reflected by the Chornoid layer in the eye.

One answer is to move the flash unit, hold it over the camera or to one side. Another is to have the subject look at a bright light for a few seconds so the pupils close down. And of course, you can always have your subject look, not at the flash, but away from it.

Thirdly, if your camera uses flash cubes, a very inexpensive accessory will cure this common problem. As you can see, it is easily avoidable. Look for it when you shoot, and it won't happen! Stop in and we'll show you how to avoid it.

Mr. Judd, who has had extensive engineering and sales experience, has won the esteem of his colleagues in industry, and has achieved official positions in several of their organizations. His qualities of leadership are demonstrated, too, in civic activities.

Mr. Judd is a son of H. D. and Anna B. (McLennan) Judd. He was born in Cottonwood, Minnesota, May 13, 1901, and attended public schools in several cities in Minnesota. In 1919, he graduated from the St. Francis, Minnesota, High School, after which he entered the University of Minnesota, and received the degree of Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering in 1923. While resident at the university, Mr. Judd was a member of Alpha Sigma Phi, social fraternity, and Chi Epsilon, honorary civil engineering fraternity.

In the year of his graduation he became associated with the sales engineering department of the St. Paul Foundry Company, at St. Paul, Minnesota, remaining there until November, 1924. He then moved to Mason City, and became a sales engineer with the Mason City Brick and Tile Company, with which he has remained ever since. From 1928 to 1933, he was transferred to Minneapolis, Minnesota, in the capacity of branch manager, but except for that period has been connected with the home office of the Mason City Brick and Tile Company in Mason City.

On his return to the Iowa headquarters in 1933, Mr. Judd was made vice president and sales manager, which position he held until 1946, when he was elevated to his present office. For some time he has been president also of the Rolfe Products Company, which is also situated in Mason City. He has grown in stature as a business executive in that community, and his counsel is respected among its leaders. Among the organizations of his colleagues in industry, he has also exerted considerable influence. He served many years as a member of the executive committee of the Structural Clay Products Institute at Washington, D. C., and as president of the Structural Clay Products Institute at Ames, Iowa.

Locally, Mr. Judd is a member of the Mason City Chamber of Commerce, and the Rotary Club. While in Minneapolis, he became affiliated with the Minneapolis Club, which membership he retains. He is a member of the Euchre and Cycle Club, and the Country Club, of Mason City, and the Des Moines Club of Des Moines. Interested in the scouting movement, he has served as a member of the Cub Scout Committee, Boy Scouts of America. Mr. Judd belongs to the local lodge of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, holding the Thirty-second degree in the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite and is also a member of the Shrine. Golf and scouting are his hobbies; and in religious faith he is a communicant of the Methodist Church.

In St. James, Minnesota, on May 16, 1925, Maurice Dale Judd married Blanche E. Anderson, and they have become the parents of three children: 1. Roger Dale. 2. Stanley Allen, twin. 3. Sally Ann, twin. The family resides in Mason City, and Mr. Judd's business address is 200 Brick & Tile Building.

DANIEL CLIFFORD (CLIFF) NOLAN—throughout the state, Daniel Clifford (Cliff) Nolan of Iowa City is known not only for his leadership at the bar but for his active interest in such important aspects of life as Boy Scouting, politics, civic develop-

ment, agricultural pursuits and public service in general. He has held high posts in county and state bar associations and served as a special attorney of Iowa City. He was Iowa's first chairman of the Young Republicans.

Mr. Nolan was born at Panora, Guthrie County, on August 29, 1902. His birth occurred on a farm. His grandfather, Dan Nolan, was an early settler in Guthrie County, Iowa, and farmed there the balance of his life. He died in 1914, at the age of eighty-five. The lawyer's father, Martin J. Nolan, also a native of Guthrie County, was also a farmer. He died in March, 1925, at the age of fifty-two. His widow, Anna (Hanley) Nolan, another native of Guthrie County—she was born in 1873—now resides at Des Moines.

Daniel C. Nolan received his early education in the public schools of Guthrie County. In 1921, he was graduated from the Perry High School. He proceeded to Creighton University, in Omaha, where he took liberal arts and prepared for the bar. In 1926 he was admitted to the Iowa State Bar. From 1926 until 1931 he practiced in Des Moines, and in 1931 moved to Iowa City, where he and his family have since lived. His office is at 405 Iowa State Bank Building, in that city. Aside from his legal practice, Mr. Nolan owns and operates farms in Johnson, Keokuk and Guthrie counties.

He is a former president of the Johnson County Bar Association and a former member of the board of governors of the Iowa State Bar Association. He is also active in the American Bar Association and in Delta Theta Phi, legal fraternity. His other fraternity is Delta Kappa Delta. Organizer in 1932 of the Young Republicans of Iowa, Mr. Nolan served as chairman of that group from 1932 to 1936. He continues an influential member of the Republican party. His civic activities have included, aside from service as special city attorney, service as president of the Iowa City Chamber of Commerce and as president of the Iowa River Valley Council, Boy Scouts of America. He is at present a national counselor of the Boy Scouts of America. Mr. Nolan's hobby is farming. Golf is now his favorite game, but in his Creighton days he played football and went out for track.

On December 28, 1927, in Iowa City, Mr. Nolan married Margaret Schwertley, the daughter of Frederick and Elizabeth (Tovey) Schwertley, both of whom were born in Harrison County, as was Mrs. Nolan. Mr. Schwertley, who was a farmer in that county, died in 1918. Mrs. Schwertley now resides at Missouri Valley. Mr. and Mrs. Nolan are the parents of seven children: 1. Elizabeth Ann, who was born in September, 1928; a graduate of Iowa City High School, who, in 1949 was attending St. Mary's College at South Bend, Indiana. 2. Mary Barbara, who was born in October, 1930; also a graduate of the Iowa City High School and a student at St. Mary's. 3. Daniel F., born in May, 1932, a student at Iowa City High School. 4. Mary Kathryn, born in December, 1933, also in high school. 5. John Thomas, born in March, 1936. 6. Richard J., born in November, 1939. 7. Mary Frances, born in February, 1947. The family resides at 513 South Summit Street, Iowa City, and attends St. Patrick's Church of that city.
