## Watts Is Victim Of Heart Attack

Stanley Watts, 65-year-old former state representative from Clarke county and a prominent Murray businessman, died unexpectedly late Friday afternoon after suffering a heart attack while attending a Democratic political convention in Chariton.


He had apparently been in normal health as he delivered a nomination speech for Bob Hutte in the convention hall only a few minutes before the attack. During a convention recess, Mr. Watts was walking outside of the National Guard Armory when he collapsed and was rushed to the Yocum hospital.

A senior partner in the Watts-Soll Furniture Store and Funeral Home, Mr. Watts was also active in Murray civic affairs, and had farming interests in Clarke county. He was a member of the Clarke County Farm Bureau and of the Masonic Lodge.

Mr. Watts came to Murray from Birmingham in the 1930's and had represented Van Buren county in the Iowa legislature before that time. He had been active in Clarke county Democratic circles and served a part of a term in the last legislature before losing the position in a re-count contest.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon in the Murray Methodist church with Rev. H. W. Kinzler, pastor, and Rev. Walter Williams, pastor of the Murray Church of Christ, officiating. Services and burial were held Monday afternoon in his native Birmingham community.

Survivors include his widow; a daughter, Mrs. Rolland Miller of Waterloo; one son, David of New York City; two grandchildren, and a sister, Mary Jane Watts of Lorimor.

**State Health Department**

**Public Fear**

Over the past 20 years an average of 23 persons each year have died of rabies. But the extent of the rabies problem not measured so much by relatively small number of human deaths as by the 60,000 man rabies exposures annually which require the expensive series of 14 to 21 days vaccinations, according to Iowa Department of Health.

Since it is common knowledge that there is no cure or recovery once the disease has developed severe anxiety and fear of rabies occurs in the more than 1 million persons bitten by animals each year.

The Iowa Department of Health reports that there were 230 cases of rabies in animals in Iowa in 1958. Of these 127 cases were skunks, 62 in cattle, 23 in cats and 12 in dogs. No human rabies has been reported in Iowa since 1951.

All animals can get rabies. The infection is caused by a virus.

Synthetic fabrics for "low wear, easy care" draperies offer these advantages — most are strong, durable, and easy to wash. Many resist sunlight, do not stretch or sag, or dry quickly and need no ironing.

Lillian Price, Clarke county extension home economist, suggests these precautions for sewing draperies from synthetics.

Cut and measure panels very accurately. Pin panels together before they're stitched so you can be sure the lengths are equal. Most synthetics don't stretch or shrink as easily as natural fibers. They'll pucker if you try to make panels of unequal length.

Stanley Stull Watts, the son of Amos and Anna Stull Watts, was born in Van Buren county, Iowa, on January 3, 1894, and departed this life at the Yocom hospital in Chariton, Iowa, on November 20, 1959, at the age of 65 years, 10 months and 17 days. He graduated from Birmingham High School and attended Iowa Wesleyan College, the State University of Iowa, and the Williams College of Embalming. He was married to Fannie Eide on Dec. 15, 1917, at Fairfield, Iowa.

During World War I, he served in France for thirteen months with Hospital Unit R of the United States Army and received a Distinguished Service Medal from the French Government.

He served as a member of the Iowa State Legislature from Van Buren and Clarke counties. He was a former school superintendent at Agency and Birmingham, Iowa, before moving to Murray, Iowa, where he has been engaged in business since 1935.

He was a member of the Murray Methodist church, the American Legion, the Lions Club, the Masonic Lodge, the Eastern Star, and the Iowa Corriedale Association.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by two children, Virginia Watts Miller of Waterloo, Iowa, and David Watts of New York City; a sister, Mary Jane Watts of Lorimor, Iowa, and three grandchildren, Sherry, Julie and Kent Miller.



## WILLIAM H. TATE

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable William H. (Bill) Tate, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

William Tate was born in Buchanan County, August 11, 1900, eldest of nine children of S. R. and Alice Ringold Tate.

He passed away September 21, 1959, at the age of fifty-nine years at a hospital in Des Moines. He had been ill for eight months.

Mr. Tate was a lifelong resident of Iowa. Reared at Independence, he held a bachelor's degree from Upper Iowa University and a master's degree from the University of Iowa. He was at one time superintendent of schools at Elma, Manly and Atlantic. He was from a family of athletes. He served in the Army in World War I and was gassed and wounded in action.

He married Vivian Bancroft of Monticello, Iowa, who survives him. Also surviving are: his mother, Mrs. Alice Tate, Franklin Park, Illinois; three daughters, Althea, at home, Mrs. Robert Wolf, Omaha, Nebraska, and Mrs. Robert Kimball, Rome, New York; two sons, William Tate, Jr., with the Air Force, and Thomas, at home; four brothers, Edward and Vern, of Waterloo, Paul, La Junta, Colorado, and Fae Robert, Humboldt; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Ritchie, Independence, and Mrs. John Greiff, Franklin Park, Illinois, and seven grandchildren.

Mr. Tate was a State Representative for Cerro Gordo County from 1950 to 1956 and State Senator from this district from 1956 to 1957. He resigned as Senator in 1957 to become real estate officer in western Iowa and north-west Missouri for the Post Office Department.

He was a member of the Wesley Methodist Church, Kiwanis Club, the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Masons and Elks.


#### FRANK A. WHITNEY

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Frank A. Whitney, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Frank A. Whitney, former Democratic Representative from Calhoun County, in the Forty-seventh session of the General Assembly, died August 4, 1959. He was born in Pocahontas County, Iowa, on a farm near Fonda, in 1882. He received his early education in the rural schools of Pocahontas County, graduated from the Fonda High School and completed a commercial course at the Northern Indiana Normal Training School. He returned to Calhoun County, Iowa, in 1900 where he married Bessie A. Moore and they had one daughter, Mary. Mr. Whitney served as cashier of the Somers Savings Bank of Somers, Iowa, for twenty-five years. He was active in local community affairs, was a member of the county school board and also a member of the Methodist Church. He was also a member of Masonic and I. O. O. F. lodges.



Other funeral directors were: J. W. Braman, first in Lorimor; Richard and Ramsey—Reed Kessler, Manager.


**Watts Funeral Home**

Mary Jane and Stanley Watts started their first funeral home in Macksburg and Murray in 1940. Mary Jane managed the Macksburg one and Stanley managed the one in Murray. They later closed the one in Macksburg and bought the C. C. Hunter home in east Lorimor. Mary Jane managed this one. In November 1955 fire destroyed the home in Lorimor and they bought the Shearer home. After Stanley's death Donavon Soll became Mary Jane's partner. He lived in Murray but helped at both homes. The name was changed to Watts and Soll. After Mary Jane's health failed her, Donavan continued to manage the homes until 1975 when the homes were sold to Vane Lindsay. The name was then changed to Watts-Lindsay.

In 1948 Stanley and Mary Jane Watts purchased the old First National Bank building on the north side of the street and opened a furniture store.
