Five counties together in attracting

FORT DODGE, Iowa (AP) - Five Iowa counties are working together in hopes of attracting a new manufacturing plant that could offer 300 jobs.

Officials in Webster, Calhoun, Pocahontas, Wright and Humboldt counties hope their efforts to work together will convince Winnebago Industries to build a new 150,000-square-foot plant.

The Forest City-based company makes motor homes and recreational vehicles and is seeking a 20-acre site for a plant to make chassis, body and cabinet assemblies.

"This is a big, big deal," said Mike McCarville, chief executive of Webster County Development.

Robert W. Naden, 80, Webster City



Robert W. Naden, 80, Webster City, died Saturday, March 9, 2002 at Southfield Wellness Community in Webster City. Memorial services will be held at 11 a.m. Tuesday at the Asbury United Methodist Church, Webster City, with Rev. Mike Morgan and Cindi O'Brien, ministry assistant, officiating. Public burial will be in the Graceland Cemetery at 10:30 a.m. Visitation will be at the Foster Funeral Home from 5-9 p.m. Monday and until 10 a.m. Tuesday.

Robert William Naden, son of William and Ruth Gardener Naden, was born May 6, 1921, at Osage, at the home of his grandparents, Clara and William Gardner. At the age of 2, his family moved to Webster City. He attended Webster City Schools, graduating from Lincoln High School in 1939. He also attended Webster City Junior College and Iowa State College (University). He worked at the Naden and Sons Electric Scoreboard Company, which his father founded in 1935. On Nov. 8, 1942, he married Dorothy Russell at Webster City. Soon after their marriage, he was inducted into the U.S. Navy. He took his training for one year in Ottumwa then went to Officers Candidate School in Notre Dame, Ind. He received his commission in May of 1944 then served as engineering officer aboard a landing ship, LST #920 and spent ten months serving in the South Pacific. Following his discharge, he returned to Webster City and joined his father and brother in reopening Naden and Sons which had been closed during the war. The company name was changed to Naden Industries when they began making a line of aluminum boats. He had served as vice-president and president.

Mr. Naden is survived by his wife Dorothy; son and daughter-in-law, Russell and Sue Naden of Webster City; daughters and sons-in-law, Janet and Phil Wineland of Ponca, Neb.; Candace and John Myers of Englewood, Colo., Leah and Larry Hinderks of Webster City; 10 grandchildren; two great-grandchildren; sister, Doris Coppola, Des Moines; sister-in-law, Lela Naden, Pocahontas; several nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by his parents; brothers, Charles Naden, during W.W. II in a plane crash in England; Gardner Naden in 1988 while on a trip to Russia; brother-in-law, Joseph Coppola.

Mr. Naden was elected to the Iowa Legislature, serving in the House of Representatives for five terms. He was the Majority Floor Leader of the House in 1961-62 and became Speaker of the House in 1963-64. He was elected to the Webster City City Council in 1967 and served until 1981. During this time he was elected mayor five times, 1971, 1972, 1976, 1978 and 1979. He was a member of Asbury United Methodist Church where he served as Chairman of the Administrative Board, lay leader, taught Sunday School and served in various other capacities of the church. His other memberships included a Mason in Accia Lodge; Noon Kiwanis, serving as past president and past District Lt. Governor.

farming all this time. When World War I came along James enlisted in 1917. Following his service he married Lettie Scott on August 20, 1919.

Lettie Scott was born October 24, 1900. Her parents, Nettie Viola Duckett and William L. Scott, were married November 19, 1893. They had 3 boys (Grover Frank, Guy and Harold) and 4 girls (twins Ettie and Lettie) and Esther and Fern. Nettie's parents were Martha Brock and Jacob Duckett. Jacob was born in Kentucky around 1831. His wife Martha was born in Illinois. They had six children: Mary M., Martha, Nettie V., Emma A., Loisie and Elmer E. Martha died September 9, 1909.

William's parents were William Henry Scott and Priscilla Scott. William Henry was born in Indiana around 1840 and was a laborer. Priscilla was born in Missouri around 1845.

William and Nettie lived and farmed north of Stratford, Iowa. Lettie was educated in the White Elephant School, a one-room country school located about 2 miles east and 3½ miles north of Stratford. Following her marriage to James Munsinger they were farmers for a number of years in the Stanhope and Stratford area. They then moved to Stanhope where James went to work for Hamilton County maintaining county roads in 1930. He worked for them for 32 years. Lettie worked in the home rearing their family and in later years worked at the Stanhope Consolidated School in the hot lunch program as a cook. They had 3 boys and 2 girls: Marie, Marion, Marvin, Delbert and Doris. Delbert died at age 10. Lettie died on December 20, 1963. They are both buried in the Lawnhill Cemetery south of Stanhope.

Doris Maxine Munsinger was born on September 11, 1932, the youngest child of James and Lettie Munsinger. She was educated in the Stanhope Consolidated School where she graduated in 1950. While she was working as a secretary in Fort Dodge, Iowa, she met and married Lowell Eugene Kilmer of Farnhamville, Iowa. Following their marriage (December 9, 1951) they moved to Des Moines, Iowa to live while Lowell attended Drake University. After his graduation in 1954 they spent a year in Chicago, Illinois and 3 years in St. Louis, Missouri, where two of their children were born. They returned to Stanhope, Iowa on March 30, 1958 (Lowell's birthday). Their five children are William Lee, born January 6, 1956 in St. Louis, Mo.; James Frederick, born January 25, 1957 in St. Louis, Missouri; Janice Ann, born July 15, 1959 in Webster City, Iowa; Cheryl Kay, born November 21, 1961 in Webster City, Iowa; and Brian Lynn born February 15, 1965 in Webster City, Iowa. Harvey Blair Myers was born April 24, 1890 at Shell Rock, Iowa. His parents were Samuel Blair and Anna Augusta Myers. His brothers were Everett, Bert, Frank, Howard and George. His sister's name was Mary.

Harvey and his family moved from Shell Rock to DeSmet, South Dakota. He was 8 years old at the time of the move and he attended school there.

At the age of 18 he moved to Hamilton County and resided in the Blairsburg area. He dug tile ditches by hand, and also did farm work for Jim Hemminger.

In 1911 he was married to Florence Stone. They rode the train from Webster City to Fort Dodge where they were married.

They lived and farmed for one year on a Len Mason farm, then for two years, Harvey worked for Ed Miller. Their next move was to a Bessie Silvers farm south of Webster City in Freedom Township. They lived there for 13 years. Their next home was on a Blankenbuehler farm where a new house was built in 1932. They purchased 240 acres of this land in 1948.

Harvey's first tractor was a Titan, his first car was a Ford with side curtains. He traded with Seth Welch, giving him a horse for this car. They raised and canned most of their food, and they butchered their own meat. They bought ice at Zueblin & Garth Ice Company in the winter. This ice was stored in a cave and packed with sawdust for summer use.

This family liked to go visiting their neighbors and Harvey and his sons hunted rabbits.

They retired in 1958 and continued to live on this farm until 1981, at which time they moved to the Southfield Care Center. Harvey died January 25, 1985.

Florence Mabel Stone was born June 14, 1892 near Webster City in Blairsburg Township. Her parents were Peter C. and Mary Jane Stone. Her family members were Laura, Irving, Clarence, Sadie and Peter. Florence and her family moved into Webster City when she was 12 years old and lived at 1310 Second Street. She attended country school. Her father gave her a piano, and after learning to play it, she gave lessons. She spent many hours crocheting and doing other needle work. Much of which she gave to her family. She died August 10, 1981.

They have two sons, George Wilmer Myers is retired and lives south of Webster City. George is married to Neva Dick and they are parents of Eldon. He and his wife Beverly, live in Texarkana, Texas. They have three children, Scott, Shelly, and Stuart.

George and Nevas's other son, Howard and his wife Linda, live in Omaha, Nebraska, their children are: Randy and Denise.

Harvey's second son, Clifford Blair, married Alice Larson. They are retired and live in Webster City. Their daughter Sharon, who is married to James VanDoren, live in Stillwater, Oklahoma. They have three sons: Steven, Thomas, and Matthew.

Cliff and Alice also have a son Darle. He and his wife Peggy live on a farm north of Stratford and they have two children: Mindy and Daniel.

Harvey and Florence have one deceased grandson and also a deceased great-grandson.

NADEN, DOROTHY RUSSELL

Dorothy Russell was born in Webster City in 1923. She is a descendant of Margaret Funk Entriken, sister of Jacob Funk, one of Webster City's great benefactors.

Margaret was born in Chester Co. Pennsylvania in 1818. In 1852 she was united in marriage to Wm. E. Entriken. They moved to the Webster City area in 1872. They had five children, one of whom was Elmira Entriken, born in 1859. She was married to Wm. A. Johnson in 1880. They were married in the little red brick house out on the end of Edgewood Drive. Mr. Johnson was born in Northampton, Massachusetts in 1855. He moved with his family to Webster City in 1858. The Johnsons farmed south of town until 1905 when they moved into town, purchasing a home at 1627 Willson Avenue from the grandparents of MacKinlay Kantor. The Johnsons were parents of two children, Leah and Maris.

Leah, the mother of Dorothy, was born in 1883, attended schools in Webster City and also 2 years at State Teachers College in Cedar Falls. She, however, did not seek employment and soon met a young teacher from Kamrar, Iowa. After a courtship of eight years, they were married in 1910.

Thomas Hamilton Russell was born in Carrollton, Illinois in 1877, one of 7 children. He worked on his father's farm for awhile and then attended Drake University for two years, earning a teaching certificate. He soon decided teaching was not for him, and in 1905 he went to Canada to homestead some land in hopes of becoming a rancher. In order to

his he had to become a Canadian citizen. For paying the government \$10.00 he could homestead 160 acres. He later bought another 160 acres. When Leah and Tom were married, they moved to Canada and lived in a small two-room house. In the fall of 1913 when the little town of Kincaid was platted, they built a larger home and moved to town. When their two girls were born, Elmira in 1915 and Dorothy in 1923, Leah came home to Webster City so they would be born in the United States.

After Dorothy was born the family moved back to Webster City to stay. Life in Canada was too much of a hardship. They moved into Leah's parents' home at 1627 Willson Avenue. Tom Russell had a car agency for the "Star" cars at the corner of First and Des Moines Streets. Later he went into insurance and served for a time as Justice of the Peace. Dorothy can remember sitting on the stairs and peeking through as her father married young couples. There was no waiting period at that time. Dorothy can also recall crawling into her Grandfather's old Velie and riding out to the farm with him. That Velie sat in the garage until the war, and her mother had it hauled away. It was probably cut up for scrap.

Dorothy's grandfather was a director in the old Hamilton Co. Bank. When it foreclosed in the early 30's, he lost most of his extensive land holdings. He felt it was his obligation to pay off as much money to the depositors as possible. His wife, Elmira Entriken Johnson, had inherited 100 acres south of town from Uncle Jacob Funk and he continued to manage that farm.

Another recollection of the house on Willson Avenue were the marks on the doors. We were told they were made by young Mac Kantor when he lost his temper while living there with his grandparents. Mrs. Johnson died in 1929 and Mr. Johnson in 1940. Dorothy's father died in 1939 and her mother in 1953. They are all buried on the same lot in Graceland Cemetery.

Dorothy graduated from high school in 1941 and attended Junior College for one year. In November of 1942 she was married to Robert Wm. Naden. Her primary interests have been her family. She worked full time at Naden Industries while the children were going to college. Russell was born in 1944 and has a business degree from the University of Iowa. Janet, born in 1947, has a math education degree from the University of Northern Iowa. Candace, born in 1950, has a degree in education and a Masters in working with children with learning disabilities and the talented and gifted from Iowa State University. Leah, born in 1953, has a degree in recreation from Central Missouri State and also is a Licensed Practical Nurse.

Dorothy is a member of the Eastern Star, Chapter JE P.E.O. and Asbury United Methodist Church. She also belongs to two bridge clubs, delivers Meals-on-Wheels and works in the hospital gift shop. She really enjoys her grandchildren which, at this writing, number eight and range in age from 2 to 14.

At the age of 2 he moved to Webster City where his father was teaching in the public school.

Russell is presently sales manager at Naden Industries. Janet and Candy are teachers, and Leah is working in a clinic. The family were all members of Asbury Methodist Church, and Bob and Dorothy have served in various official capacities and as Sunday School teachers.

As a young boy Bob remembers traveling often to Osage to visit with his grandparents. In the winter time the children, covered with heavy feather comforters, slept out on the sleeping porch. W.I. "Bill" Naden was born Nov. 14, 1891 in Orchard, Iowa. His father was a farmer and a carpenter. Ruth Gardner Naden was born May 13, 1893 in Osage, Iowa. Her father was associated with his brother in the Gardner Nursery in Osage. Bill attended Stout Institute at Menomonie, Wis. Ruth attended Iowa State Teachers College. They were married in 1914. They had four children: Gardner, Doris, Robert and Charles. Bill taught in Corning, Red Oak, Deadwood, S. Dak., at the Normal School at Spearfish, S. Dak. and Eldora. In 1923 he accepted a position in the Webster City schools as the manual arts teacher and assistant coach. After ten years of teaching, he resigned his job to start a business of manufacturing scoreboards. For several years they were built by Gardner and a few men in the double garage at 854 Walnut St. Bill would load them into his panel truck and start calling on schools. They moved to a larger building at 1440 Second St. During the war the business had to close. It was impossible to get materials and their three sons were in service. Bill became an inspector-buyer for Martin Bomber in Omaha, Nebr., Wilmington, Del. and Grand Rapids, Mich. After the war, they returned to Webster City and started the business again. A larger building was built on Fair Ave. in 1948. The fiftieth anniversary was celebrated in 1983 with a picnic at Briggs Woods for the employees and their families. Scoreboards are now located in all fifty states and many foreign countries.

Their daughter, Doris, attended the Webster City schools and was a graduate in 1934. She also graduated from A.I.B. and was a secretary for many years in Des Moines. She married Joe Coppola of Des Moines. They have five children. Larry and Joe, Jr. are doctors in Flint, Mich. Charles and Frank are lawyers in Des Moines. Bobby married Mike McMurray, who is a contractor. They live in

Waukee. There are eighteen grandchildren. Joe Sr. died Feb. 9, 1978.

Charles was born in 1924 in Webster City. He was a graduate of Lincoln High School with the class of 1942. He joined the Air Force and was a tail gunner on a B-17. He lost his life during World War II when his flak-damaged plane crashed in England (Aug. 1944) after returning from a mission.

Mr. Naden died in 1960 and Mrs. Naden in 1966. Mr. and Mrs. Naden and Charles are buried in Graceland Cemetery in Webster City. They were members of Asbury United Methodist Church.

John Roswell Nail, born November 30, 1902 on a farm N.E. of Webster City, was my father. He was the son of A.G. (Bert) and Olive Christ Nail. In a family of nine children, he was the second child. Dad lived a long and very hard life. His mother died when he was young and he and his father raised the rest of the children together.

On May 10, 1923 he married Bertha Marie Reinhardt at Webster City, Iowa. She was born January 5, 1903, and was the daughter of Henry F. and Anna Reinhardt. They farmed in the Blairsburg area for several years. They were members of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Webster City.

Their family consisted of three daughters: Helen, born January 4, 1924, Ruth, born May 17, 1927, and Bettyann "Betty", born December 16, 1932.

It was in August, 1937 that Ruth fell when walking up some steps and broke the skin on her leg, which later turned into osteomyelites, now known as bone cancer. For months my parents made trips to Iowa City Hospital and then finally brought Ruth home. For 2 years my father and mother kept Ruth at home bedfast. Dad gave her shots to ease the pain, nursed her and stayed by her bedside for 2½
