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**Carlisle Answers Gorman's Resolution as to the Use Made of Reserve in Treasury.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—The use committee on rules has decided make the bond resolution from the ways and means committee a special order for the day. A vote on the resolution will be taken at 5 p. m. No amendments will be allowed, the committee holding that there is no time anything of the sort.

**The House.**

There was much excitement on the floor at the opening, as it was known that an attempt would be made today to pass a resolution authorizing the issue of 3 per cent gold bonds. Catchings, from the committee on rules, reported a special order that the house proceed at once in a committee of the whole to the consideration of the bond resolution. That at 5 p. m., the previous question shall be considered, ordered and without any intervening vote shall be taken till disposed of. Catchings demanded the previous question on the order and it was carried, 111 to 56.

After some delay in securing a quorum, the special order was adopted 28 to 28. Wilson and Reed, in favor of the proposition, and Hopkins of Illinois and Bryan of Nebraska against, were allowed an hour each in debate, the remaining hour to be under the five minute rule.

**Carlisle's Statement.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—Carlisle at the senate in reply to the Gorman resolution asking what portion of the gold reserve in the treasury January 1, 1913, was used for the current expenses and how much of the fund realized from the recent sale of gold was so used. The secretary says the original reserve, augmented by the proceeds of the bond sale, had diminished during the twenty-five months to an extent of \$172,674,315, of which \$5,002,143 was directly or indirectly voted to the current expenses and \$167,672,172 converted into notes by the process of redemption, is still on hand. The secretary says that when United States notes or treasury notes are redeemed in gold, they are held as part of the general cash in the treasury and paid out when necessary to defray public expenses. Whenever possible, the learned notes are used to procure gold by an exchange with banks. This is done to a large extent in the sum-

**ILLINOIS LEGISLATURE**

**Bill Making Insanity a Ground for Divorce Defeated.**

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 14.—In the house Eakins introduced a bill for the establishment of parental schools for cities of over 40,000 inhabitants. They are intended to be schools for incorrigible children.

Kaiser's bill to prevent boys carrying firearms passed. Adjourned.

**The Senate.**

Bogardus introduced a bill to prevent train robbing, with a minimum penalty of ten years' imprisonment and a minimum of death.

Dwyer introduced a bill making it unlawful for a physician or surgeon to charge more than \$100 for a surgical operation.

The bill making insanity a ground for divorce was defeated, 45 to 79.

Mehans introduced a bill for the protection of interest on all public money from the officials having it in charge.

Coon's bill granting townships man suffrage was defeated. Coon gave notice of a motion to reconsider.

Morrison's resolution for a committee to investigate the charge of pure food fed domestic animals was adopted. Adjourned.
