Obituaries

James E. Briles

James Edward Briles, 66, long-time Iowa legislator, died July 11, 1992, at Clarkson Memorial Hospital in Omaha, Neb.

Services will be held at 3 p.m. Thursday (today), July 16, at the United Methodist Church in Corning with burial at the Cromwell Cemetery. Coen-Beaty Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Briles, son of Edward L. and Doris Simpson Briles, was born March 31, 1926, in Prescott. He graduated from Prescott High School and entered the U.S. Army, serving two years during WWII as a combat infantryman in the Asiatic-Pacific Theatre. He received four bronze stars and other merits. He was a member of The VFW and the American Legion Ourcq Post 117.

Mr. Briles moved to Corning in 1949 and worked in real estate for 30 years and as an auctioneer for 33 years. He became interested in politics and served southwest Iowa as a member of the House of Representatives for eight years. In 1965 he was elected to the Iowa Senate where he served until his retirement in 1984. He was one of the best senators at introducing his bills early in the session to make sure they would be debated. He was remembered for his chairmanship of the County Government Committee.

He is survived by his wife Marilyn of Corning; three daughters, Dory Briles of Des Moines, Mary Briles of Corning, and Coleen Schlesler of Caladonia, Minn.; five sons, Dr. Ed Briles of Buhl, Idaho; Dr. Jim Briles of Terra Ceia, Fla.; Dr. Tom Briles of Kansas City, Mo.; Rick Jessen of Corning, and Gary Jessen of Nodaway; a brother, Harvey Briles of Creston; and nine grandchildren.

Officiating will be the Rev. Richard Layman of Corning and the Rev. Jeanne Groom of Prescott. Pallbearers will be Duane Birt, Joe Jones, Francis Mack, Robert Bell, Dr. G.R. McAlpin, Horace Daggett and Jack Nystrom.

He participated in baseball, basketball and football, later in town team baseball and basketball, helping to keep the Prescott Indians alive for many years.

July of 1944 he entered the U.S. Army at Fort Leavenworth, the 161 Infantry Regiment as a combat infantryman, mess sergeant, serving in Southern Philippines, Luzon and Japan. He received 5 medals (4 bronze stars): Army of Occupation, Asiatic Pacific Campaign, Good Conduct, Philippine Liberation and World War II Victory, being discharged August 17, 1946 at Camp Beale, California.

Jim worked at Owen's Service Station, the bluegrass yards, did painting, carpentry, auctioneering (was part owner of Adams County Auction) and as a realtor associated first with Fred Andrews then "Mick" McClelland.

In 1957 he was elected to the Iowa House of Representatives, serving eight years (defeated one term by Albert Lund) — then was elected to the Senate in 1956 serving until retiring in 1984.

On October 1, 1949 Jim married Lorene Doris Tindall at Tecumseh, Nebraska. This marriage is now dissolved.

Lorene, daughter of Charles and Cordelia (Carr) Tindall was born March 11, 1920 at the farm home. She attended Douglas #2, Carbon and Corning High Schools, graduating in top ten. Too young to teach she was hired at Douglas #2 to help in the high enrollment coal mine school. She later taught at Lincoln #8, then went back to Douglas #2 her home school. She attended college at Cedar Falls (2 years) then Radio and Television Institute in Omaha. During World War II she worked at Air Service Command, Dayton, Ohio doing teletype to supply depots. Returning home to teach at Prescott — 7th-8th then 5th-6th grades. She quit in 1951 to raise her family. She taught 3rd grade Sunday School and did lots of substitute teaching in Corning and area towns. She also clerked auctions and at the sale barn and

still does. She is presently assistant librarian at the Corning Public Library. She loved her home and family dearly.

Their first home was at 205 12th Street (a basement then) moving to the present home at 806 7th Street in 1952 the day James Alan was born.

Five children were born at Rosary Hospital: Edward Charles, June 29, 1951; James Alan, September 30, 1952; Doris Lorene, August 19, 1954; Mary Renee, September 30, 1956, a birthday present for her brother James (spoiled his birthday party); and Thomas Eugene, July 30, 1958. She was on the Honor Roll four years; member of Y-teens four years; Prom server; on the class play crew; in band; out for basketball and track; and in self supervision. She was in 4-H work, doing many projects but the outstanding one for her was dog training using the family pet, George, an English Springer Spaniel. They won the blue ribbon.

Mary attended Central College at Pella, Iowa for two years. Her major was Math with a minor in French.

The light of her life was B-B (Little Black Burger), a black miniature poodle, which was the main prize given by Rosemary Stewart when she opened the first Craft Mart on the East side of Main Street.
