early Saturday afternoon along

The car was found on the Rock
 Island Railroad tracks, just off the
 highway and adjacent to a ditch.
 Authorities believe Schoultz had

hundred persons in the northern
 portion of the county without power.
 By the time that problem was
 alleviated later during the night,
 freezing rain and strong winds were
 beginning to take a toll of lines and
 poles.

Officials of the company said most
 of the power outages were in the
 northern portion of the county which
 apparently received more freezing
 rain prior to the change to snow.

Crews of the company had
 problems Saturday during the
 height of the storm simply in
 reaching downed lines and replacing
 poles with about 50 poles snapped off

electrical power restored.

The new snow removal policy of
 the Iowa of Transportation (DOT)
 had its first real test of the winter in
 Buchanan County over the weekend,
 and the new policy initiated this
 winter of leaving 'spur' roads to last
 to be cleared of snow may have been
 found somewhat wanting.

DOT began the program in order
 to reduce overtime hours of
 operators of removal equipment
 with only high priority highways
 receiving immediate attention.

As a result, at one time during the
 height of the storm Saturday
 morning, Buchanan County highway
 W45 was cleared of snow from
 Winthrop about 8½ miles north to
 the junction with state highway 284
 and was also cleared from Aurora
 north to the Fayette County line, but
 a mile stretch of state highway 284
 from Aurora south was not cleared
 by the state. With about 10 miles of
 the 11 mile stretch from Winthrop
 north to Fayette County cleared of
 snow, some nine vehicles were stuck
 on the roadway or in ditches along
 the one mile stretch of state high-
 way.

Buchanan County engineer Randy
 Murdock explained Monday that
 snow removal equipment of the
 county actually went over the mile
 stretch of state highway to go from
 one portion of W45 to the other, but
 under an agreement with the state
 that the county cannot maintain
 state highways, the operators lifted
 the blades, leaving the mile stretch
 uncleared.

According to a spokesman for the
 DOT maintenance garage here,
 highway 284 was cleared of snow
 Sunday evening, more than 24 hours
 after the snowfall ended. He ex-
 plained that with blowing snow and
 icing conditions due to thawing and
 refreezing Sunday making it dif-
 ficult to keep high priority highways
 open coupled with a DOT policy
 against having operators work more

Former legislator Harrington dies

Raymond Patrick Harrington, 71,
 of Independence, died Friday, Feb.
 20 at People's Memorial Hospital in
 Independence.

Born May 4, 1904 at Norway, Iowa
 he was the son of Andrew and
 Johanna Flaherty Harrington. He
 was united in marriage to Lillian D.
 Nelson on Sept. 14, 1923 at In-
 dependence.

He was a retired Independence
 businessman and a former State
 Representative, having served two
 two-year terms, and was first
 elected in November, 1958.

He was a former member of the
 Independence Area Chamber of
 Commerce. He was a member of St.
 John's Catholic Church.

Survivors include six daughters,
 Mrs. R. Fae (Helen) Tate of Em-
 metsburg, Mrs. Louis H. (Marjorie)
 Kayser of Mt. Vernon, Ohio, Mrs.
 Vincent (Mary Lou) Brannon of
 Dubuque, Mrs. Walter H.
 (Josephine) Johnson of Marion,
 Ohio, Mrs. Wendell W. (Alice)
 Circus and Mrs. George S. (Ann)
 O'Loughlin both of Independence;
 one son, Raymond N. Harrington of
 Denver, Colo.; 22 grandchildren and
 three great-grandchildren; and one
 brother, Charles Harrington of
 Cedar Rapids.

He was preceded in death by his
 parents, his wife in 1970, one brother
 and two grandsons.

Funeral services were held
 Monday, Feb. 23 at 10:30 a.m. at St.
 John's Catholic Church with Rev.
 John Gossman officiating. In-
 terment was in St. John cemetery.
 The parish rosary was recited at 3
 p.m., the Catholic Daughter's
 rosary at 7:30 p.m. and the Catholic
 wake service at 8 p.m., all on Sun-
 day, Feb. 22 at White Funeral Home
 Chapel in Independence.
