Leroy S. Miller 67, former resident of
Shenandoah died of an apparent heart
attack while duck hunting near Riverton,
Iowa this morning. He was born Nov. 28,
1914 in Yorktown, Iowa.

A former president of Miller Tractor
Company, he had served in the Iowa
House of Representatives from 1963 to
1971.

When living in Shenandoah, Leroy was
a member of Elks, Masons, Chamber of
Commerce, Jr. Chamber of Commerce,
City Council, Izaak Walton League and
Rotary Club. He was also a member of the
First Presbyterian Church. He was a
member of the Shriners organization in
Wichita, Kansas and Knights Templar in
Dodge City.

He is survived by his wife Beulah of
Dodge City, Kansas, two daughters and
their husbands Marsha and Ave Walker of
Mansfield, Texas, Nancy and Rodney
Carnagey of Shenandoah. Also surviving
are six grandchildren: Scott Johnson,
Kevin Walker both of Mansfield, Texas;
Tim, Julia, Brain, and David Carnagey
all of Shenandoah, one brother Lyle Miller
and one sister Bertha, Mrs. Fred
Tomlinson and his mother-in-law Cora
Otte all of Clarinda.

Leroy Stitt Miller, son of Inez (Stitt) and Leroy Fleetwood Miller, was born on a farm near Yorktown in Page County, Iowa on November 28, 1914.

He attended Yorktown elementary school and was graduated from Clarinda High school in 1932.

Mr. Miller was united in marriage to Beulah Mary Otte on Feb. 14, 1935 at the bride's home near Clarinda, Iowa. To this union two daughters were born. They are Mrs. David (Marcia) Walker and Mrs. Rodney (Nancy) Carnagey.

He began farming in the county directly out of high school. The family moved to Shenandoah, Iowa in 1946, where Mr. Miller opened Miller Tractor, Inc., a farm equipment dealership. The business was sold in 1965. While a businessman in Shenandoah, he was active in many organizations including: Jr. Chamber of Commerce, Chamber of Commerce, Izaak Walton, Rotary International, Masonic Lodge No. 300, B.P.O. Elks, Shenandoah Industries, Shenandoah City Council, Order of Eastern Star No. 81, an honorary member of FFA, and the Mid-West Implement Dealers Association.

During his membership in many of the above organizations he held numerous offices.

While the Millers resided in Shenan-

doah, he was an active member in the First United Presbyterian Church. Mr. Miller held office on all the church's governing bodies.

For many years he was secretary of the Page County Angus Association, which he helped to found.

In 1963, Leroy was elected as a Republican to represent Page Co. in the Iowa state legislature as a State Representative. He served in this capacity through 1970.

Following his years in politics, he was employed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in Washington, D.C., transferring to Des Moines, Iowa, later to Jackson, Miss., and most recently in Dodge City, Kansas. While living in these cities he was active in numerous organizations. His involvement in church activities continued with his moves.

Death came from a heart attack while vacationing in Iowa on an overnight hunting outing with his grandchildren, David and Jennifer Carnagey at Taylor Lake on November 5, 1982, at the age of 67 years 11 months and 7 days.

Preceding him in death were his parents and two brothers, Lawrence K. and James Harold. He is survived by his wife, Beulah of Dodge City; two daughters, Marcia of Mansfield, Tex. and

Nancy of Shenandoah, Iowa; seven grandchildren, Scott Johnson and Kevin Walker of Mansfield, Texas; and Tim, Julie, Brian, David and Jennifer Carnagey of Shenandoah, Iowa; a brother, Lyle and a sister, Mrs. Fred (Bertha) Tomlinson, both of Clarinda, and numerous other relatives.

Funeral services were held Nov. 8, 1982 at the First United Presbyterian Church in Shenandoah. The rites were conducted by the Rev. Frank Leeper. Casket bearers were nephews of the deceased. They are Jerry Clay, Tom Miller, David Sjoberg, Robert Sjoberg, Mark Sjoberg, Ed Miller, Glenn Otte, and Ernie Tomlinson. The Spratt and Ridlen families were of Irish and Scottish ancestry. Joy's Grandfather Spratt came to America from Ireland. They settled around Dixon, Illinois. LENORE JOHNSON MILLER

Lenore Johnson Miller, of Clarinda, was born in 1909 on a farm in Amity Township to John Addison and Anna Brown (McKeighan) Johnson. The Johnson family has long been in Page County, her great grandparents coming here in 1858. James P. Johnson and his wife, Margaret Ann Rouse were natives of New York. The Johnsons were established in New York at the time of the Revolutionary War. James' father, Shubal Johnson, married Harriet Goodrich. The Johnsons and the Rouses moved to Pennsylvania, and it was there that James P. married Margaret Ann.

Lenore's grandfather, Casper Meade Johnson, was born in Erie County, Pennsylvania, and moved with his family to Illinois in 1850. At the age of eleven the family moved to Amity Township, where he spent his formative years and remained there until he died. Casper Meade established his saddlery and harness business in 1868, the same year that he married Lavinia Truthura Bullock. Lavinia was also a native of Pennsylvania, and of English descent. Her parents moved to Page County in 1857, settling in the Blanchard area. The marriage of these two united two of the early families of Page County.

Casper Meade Johnson built a beautiful two story home in Amity Township in 1892, close to the southwest corner of Maple Hill Cemetery, where he and his wife are now buried. They had a family of nine children, seven of them reaching maturity. The children received their education in the Amity schools.

John Addison Johnson was born November 21, 1882 at College Springs, and after attending school at Amity High School, went to Des Moines to study optometry at Still College. He then went to the Tarvox Optical School in Omaha where he graduated and received a life time membership in the American Optical Association. Dr. John

and his brother, Dr. Ben Johnson, located at Albia, Iowa, where they maintained an optical office for two years. Returning to Page County, he worked in the offices of Drs. Miller, Wycoff and Davies at College Springs for seven years.

John Addison married Anna Brown McKeighan at Shelby County, Iowa on June 4, 1908. Anna was born June 15, 1886 at Shelby County, the daughter of Samuel and Amanda Eveline (Owings) McKeighan. Samuel McKeighan's parents were from Ireland and Scotland, but were married in Pennsylvania. Samuel was born in New Jersey, and came to Marshall County, Iowa where he married Amanda Owings. Amanda was descended from two of the very early families of Maryland, the Cockeys and the Owings. Both of these families rendered service in the Revolutionary War.

John and Anna were the parents of seven children: Lenore Lavinia, Howard William, Dwyland Edwy, who died at the age of four, Casper Meade, James Benjamin, John Addison, Jr., and Hollis Edwy.

In 1934 John suffered a stroke, leaving him partially paralyzed. In 1939 he and Anna moved to Buffalo, Dallas County, Missouri, and operated a poultry farm there with his son, John, Jr. and his wife. He died there in 1956. Anna remained in Buffalo until 1968, when she returned to Clarinda, and made her home close to her daughter, Lenore. She died in 1977, at the age of ninety-one.

Lenore Johnson attended Amity High School and graduated in the Class of 1928. On February, 20, 1939, she married Ted True Miller, a widower with two children. Ted was born in 1904 in Clarinda, the son of Charles Andy and Minnie Ices (Byers) Miller. He married Pauline Robinson, and they have two children, Ted Irwin, known as Tim, and Dorothy Elaine. A third child, Lola May, was born on September 17, 1937, the mother and child dying at her birth. Lenore raised these two children as her own, and assisted in operating their dairy farm in Page County, Iowa. Lenore and Ted moved to Clarinda in the mid-forties, and Lenore still maintains their home on East Garfield. Ted died in Clarinda on March 5, 1976.

Tim married Shirley Davis and they are the parents of two children; Linda Kay, a registered nurse in Houston, Texas, and Ted Owin Miller who is now married and living at Beatrice, Nebraska. Dorothy married Vernon Journey and they have three daughters; Paulia of California, Jonith of Florida, and Angela of New Market, Iowa. Dorothy and Vernon make their home in rural New Market, Iowa, and they have two grandchildren, Justin and Jonelle.

Lenore, after moving from College Springs, has never lost her love for the town and Amity High School. The Amity School Reunions are one of her major interests. LEROY FLEETWOOD MILLER

Leroy Fleetwood Miller, oldest child of Webster Clark and Maggie Ann Sloan Miller, was

born December 8, 1879 in Nodaway Township at the family's farm home.

He spent his life as a farmer of Page County until moving to Shenandoah in 1947. He retired from the farm only to go to work with his son, Leroy, who owned a farm equipment dealership. He was known as "Fleet" to all those who knew and loved him. He was an avid fisherman and enjoyed taking his grandchildren with him.

Inez Stitt was born to William D. and Sarah Nancy Payton on September 28, 1884. She spent most of her life on the farm also. After retiring from farm life to Shenandoah, she spent many hours nurturing her babysitting charges. For many years she was the babysitter during church services for the Presbyterian Church.

Fleet and Inez were married by her brother, S. Forrest Stitt, a Presbyterian minister, at Yorktown on December 20, 1906. It was reported to be the wedding of the season. To this union five children were born: James Herald, October 31, 1910, married Grace Bergman of Dwight, Illinois; Lawrence K., August 6, 1912; Leroy S., November 28, 1914, married Beulah Otte of Clarinda; Ermal Lyle, March 9, 1916, married Fern Wilson of Clarinda; and Bertha, October 23, 1918, married Fred Tomlinson of Clarinda.

Herald (Harold) died December 4, 1952 after heart surgery. He is buried in Dwight, Illinois. Lawrence died October 10, 1912 and is buried at Summitt Cemetery northeast of Yorktown beside his parents on land given as a cemetery by his grandfather, William D. Stitt.

Fleet passed away June 22, 1962 after suffering several months from a stroke. Inez died September 4, 1963 from a stroke also.

LEROY S. MILLER

Leroy S. Miller was born on a farm in Nodaway Township November 28, 1914. He was the son of Leroy Fleetwood and Inez Stitt Miller.

Leroy started farming when he graduated from Clarinda High School. As a farmer, he

established a herd of Angus cattle. Three other men joined in purchasing a good bull to upgrade their Angus herds. He served as secretary for the Page County Angus Association for many years.

His interest in soil conservation, where he was an early advocate, was kept throughout his life.

In school he was a member of Future Farmers of America, receiving an Iowa Farmer Degree and chosen an honorary member of FFA for his services to that organization, while a business-man.

The Miller family moved to Shenandoah in 1947, establishing a farm equipment dealership, continuing in that business through 1965.

Leroy felt he must give back to the community, what he felt had been given him and became involved in many civic affairs. He served terms as president of both Junior Chamber of Commerce and Senior Chamber of Commerce. Among the organizations of which he was a member and held offices were: Izaak Walton, Rotary International, Masonic Lodge, B.P.O. Elks, Shenandoah Industries, Order of Eastern Star, ZA-GA-ZIG Shriners, and Midwest Implement Dealers Association.

He was an avid hunter and fisherman where he spent many happy hours.

In 1961, he was chosen National Brand Names Retailer in the Farm Equipment category. The family traveled to New York City for him to accept the award.

The following years after the sale of the business in 1965, were spent in employment of the United States Department of Agriculture. He served areas in Washington, D.C.; Des Moines, Iowa; Jackson, Mississippi and Dodge City, Kansas.

In 1962, he was elected State Representative from Page County to the Iowa Legislature, serving through 1970.

He was married to Beulah Mary Otte, daughter of Henry and Cora Cagley Otte, February 14, 1935 in Page County. Beulah was born January 22, 1913 in Nodaway Township. She also graduated from Clarinda High School.

To this union two daughters were born: Marcia, February 28, 1940, now Mrs. David Walker of Mansfield, Texas; and Nancy, August 25, 1943, Mrs. Rodney Carnagey of Shenandoah, Iowa. They have seven grandchildren; Scott Johnson and Kevin Walker of Mansfield, Texas and Timothy Carnagey, Knoxville, Iowa, Julie Carnagey, Ames, Iowa, Brian, David and Jennifer Carnagey of Shenandoah.

Both their families ancestors were early pioneer farmers of Page County. Leroy's great-grandfather, Elijah Miller being the first county surveyor, also the first county superintendent of schools.

They were active members of First Presbyterian Church in Shenandoah, both of them serving many official boards of the church. Their church involvement continued as they made their many moves.

Beulah was also involved in civic affairs serving as Girl Scout leader, Mother Advisor for Rainbow Girls, Sunday School teacher and also an active participant in the United Way, serving as co-chairman in West Page County. She was elected president of the Legislative wives of the State of Iowa and later served on the official board.

The organizations capturing her interest were Nautilus Study Club, Antique Club, Order of Eastern Star and she served as an officer in each.

Beulah was an avid gardener, loving flowers both indoor and outdoor. Many folks were recipients of bouquets or a start from her perennial bed. Many kinds of needlework interested her especially needlepoint and quilting.

Leroy died of a heart attack on November 5, 1982 while living in Dodge City, but visiting in Shenandoah.

MAX MILLER

Max Miller lived his entire life on the farm in Tarkio Township, Page County, Iowa. He was born at his parents home October 28, 1916. There were five children in this family. Max was the only son. His parents were Fredrick Isaac and Essie O. (Maxwell) Miller and paternal grandparents, Tom and Maude (Weaver) Maxwell. John Miller, the ancestor of this family, came from England in the early 1740's and Isaac Miller was the early pioneer coming to Page County and settling in Tarkio Township in 1852.

Max attended country schools in Tarkio and Norwich and graduated from the Shenandoah High School. After graduation in 1934, he went into his lifelong career of farming on the farm which had been owned by his great grandparents, grandparents and parents. It was at this time he became interested in aviation, took lessons in flying and earned his private pilot's license. He and John Speery of Clarinda became owners of a Piper Cub which was enjoyed and kept at the Miller farm. Life became too busy; they sold their plane in 1951.

Max was a member of Young Farmers and Page County Junior Farm Bureau. There was learning but also parties and dancing.

In 1939, Max met Florence Mildred Darland. April 14, 1940 they were married at the Methodist Church, Farragut, Iowa by the Reverend Carl Corrie.

Mildred was the daughter of Don Leo and Florence May (Eacrett) Darland, descendants of early southwest Iowa pioneers.

Max and Mildred lived on his father's farm north of Norwich. In the early 1940's, they purchased the farm from his parents. The farm has been owned by the same family for more than one hundred years making it a Century Farm. We received our award sponsored by Farm Bureau in 1976.

We were blest with five children: Marsha Ann who married Bruce Nelson, they have four children; William Brownlow who married Leesa (Webb) Porter, three children; Elizabeth Jane who married Gary Gloede, two children; David Mark who married Carol Lea Kling, two children; and Jonathan Max Miller.

The family enjoyed the life of the farm. Max was a member of Farm Bureau and all the family were interested and active in 4-H. We were members of the Norwich Methodist Church and later the First United Methodist Church in Shenandoah. He was a member and past master of the Masonic Lodge and other fraternal organizations.

Max died at age fifty-nine of a heart attack at our home July 2, 1976. He is buried at Rose Hill Cemetery at Shenandoah.

The Millers lived on a farm three and one-half miles south of Clarinda where Ross farmed till the same farm that his great-great Aunt Mary Whitehill had homesteaded in 1855 and had also been farmed by his father and grandfather before him. It is a Century Farm and in 1970 Ross received a certificate at the Page County Fair from the Iowa Agriculture Department for over fifty years on a family farm. Son, Dale now lives on the farm.

Ross, his father, grandmother, children as well as some of his grandchildren attended the Old Branch school. Ross served as Treasurer of the school board for over twenty years. The Miller attended the United Presbyterian Church in Clarinda where Ross served many years as trustee and later as an elder. Cassie was an active member of the Missionary Society and the W.C.T.U. Ross served on the board of the Farmer's Union Shipping Association for twenty-one years. For many years Ross did custom threshing for area farmers. He was a veteran of World War I.

Ross had a wonderful memory and entertained his children, grandchildren and many others with poems, stories and passages from the Bible. He loved to share some sayings such as: "I was so busy keeping the wolf away from the door that the stork kept sneaking in the window" and "I kept looking for my ship to come in but all I got was a raft of kids". Cassie often heard to say, "There's always room for more". Many children loved to visit the farm and enjoy a fried chicken dinner and homemade ice cream with the Millers.

Ross and Cassie spent much of their time helping people in need and faithfully sharing Christian faith, encouragement and hope. When there was sickness, trouble and need, they gave freely of themselves and their means. Cassie especially enjoyed caring for those who were in need and providing haircuts to family, neighbors and friends. Cassie was an excellent seamstress and loved making clothes for her family, friends and grandchildren.

Cassie died July 26, 1971 and Ross died October 16, 1973. Both are buried in the Corner Cemetery, southwest of Clarinda. Submitted by Marilyn Ives
