Donald was born in Bancroft, Iowa, on June 1, 1923 to W. Arthur and Elizabeth (McDonald) Murray. BUSINESSES TODAY

KEMNA CHEVROLET GARAGE

The site of the Kemna Garage was platted by the Western Town Lot Company in September, 1881. At that time the area was 2523 feet by 1728 feet, and contained lots 8, 9, 10 of Block 4. Ambrose Call sold lot 8 to F.W. Kinne and Olof Pearson in 1890. They in turn sold to Andrew Smith in 1892-1893, who sold it to the Elmore Mill Company the same day. Apparently the Mill Company fell on hard times and the lot was sold for delinquent taxes of \$2.38 to Gardner Cowles on January 3, 1896. It may have been at this time the location was used as a Livery Stable. Mr. Cowles made money on the deal when he sold to W.H. Riley in 1901, but five years later Mr. Riley took a substantial loss when he sold to P.J. Higgins. Mr. Kinne and Mr. Pearson also acquired lots 9 and 10 from the Call family. After several sales the property of three lots was sold to J.H. Devlin in 1913. He had a garage there for five years. It was sold twice before the County again sold lots 8 and 9 for taxes to L.F. Kennedy. Following his death by drowning on June 23, 1932, title was eventually given to the Farmers and Traders Savings Bank and A.W. Kennedy acquired lot 10 in 1935.

Lots 6 and 7 changed hands several times. Editor Verne Ellis owned them in 1889, E.A. Howe in 1901, two Swea City men for a time until Devlin bought them in 1913. W.D. "Bill" Lattimer bought the garage in 1919 and later the same year sold to his brother, Hugh Lattimer. The Farmers and Traders Bank again owned the property in 1924 and sold the garage location to Henry Deitering in 1925. The Deiterings, father and two sons, Albert and Cletus, operated the Chevrolet Garage until 1950 when Henry and Albert sold their share to Cletus. Cletus died of a heart attack on September 15, 1955, and his widow Monica sold to Joe H. and Lawrence Kemna the next February.

Joe Kemna was in partnership with Duane Widdle at Armstrong in a DeSoto-Plymouth Agency for two years before moving to Bancroft in 1955 when he operated as a Dodge-Plymouth dealer in a building on Highway #169 south of Bancroft, the old Drive-In and what is now a home.

The two brothers dissolved their partnership on January 30, 1963. Lawrence is now employed by his brother as manager of the repair and parts division.

A new building was erected in 1974 just east of the old garage. It is 70 by 140 feet, with a new show room, a repair department with all the latest equipment, and the old garage space was turned into a new car display lot. The area across the street was purchased from the railroad as a Used Car display area. Today the garage is operating with fourteen full time employees.

In July 1977, the business was awarded the Service Supremacy Award which is the highest Service award available to a Chevrolet dealer.

A new addition to the west of the building was begun in October of 1980.

ELEVATOR

Joe Murray bought the grain and feed business located on the south side of Main Street from J.B. Carr in 1895. Others had owned the business before Mr. Carr. In the early days there was also a livestock yards adjacent to the railroad tracks with holding pens for stock until the train arrived to transport it to Chicago. Coal bins were also located along the track. The coal was shoveled by hand from the train cars to the bins.

Flour and salt were also sold by the elevator.


W.A. Murray took over the business from his father in 1915-1916. While he spent a short time in the army in World War I the Quaker Oats Co. leased the facilities until he returned. In 1926 Mr. Murray took over the Farmers Elevator on the north side of the street. The main office of the business was moved to the north side and the old office was occupied by Dr. E.A. Howe, a veterinarian.

The Farmers Elevator was started in 1889 by John Winkel and he conducted his business for twenty-two years before the stock company was formed and bought the business in 1911. The Farmers Elevator directors when it was organized were James Nelson, E.C. Smith, Jos. Baltz, J.P. Mousel, Chas. Ame, John Krapp and Joe Hatten.

W.A. Murray died in 1948 and the business was then taken over by his sons, Joe and Donald, until it was sold to Milo Johnson in August, 1967. Rath Feeds took it over when Mr. Johnson ran into financial problems and was in charge from 1969-1971. The business was closed for three years while bankruptcy proceedings and court settlements were being worked out. Clarence Kruse bought it in 1974 and in 1977 sold it to the Lone Rock Co-op Exchange.

Wilbur Fox began work for Mr. Murray in April, 1929, and remained as the various changes took place through the years, as a dedicated and loyal office employee. Elevator and Wilbur became synonymous. He was always there and he knew what was going on.

Ed Richter was named manager under the Lone Rock Co-op. Wilbur Fox and Dennis Lynch are part-time office employees. Gerald Rahe is in charge of the mill and Dennis Becker is at the elevator.

WELP DRUG STORE

In 1954, Donald J. Welp purchased the Carmean Drug Store building and business from Jessie Carmean. The retail drug store was started on May 1, 1954, under the name of Welp Drug Store.

Don, the son of Raphael and Rosella Welp, had graduated from the University of Iowa College of Pharmacy in 1952 and had worked as a pharmacist for the Schlegel Drug Stores in Davenport, Iowa and Moline, Illinois.

The business was operated in the old Carmean building for 15 years. In 1969 plans were formulated to build a new store. The barber shop was purchased from Don Schultz and the building demolished. Lots adjacent to Roy's Grill were purchased from Roy Fox. A 50'x70' block building was erected and the contents of the old drug store were moved (with the assistance of many friends) on the weekend of August 2 and 3, 1969. The new store opened for business on August 4.

Besides furnishing a complete prescription drug service for the area, a complete line of drugs, first aid supplies, health and beauty aids, jewelry, gifts, greeting cards, toys, box candy, school and office supplies, photo supplies, religious goods and many sundry items are stocked.

Don married Carole Finn of Algona in January, 1958, and they have six children, Kevin, Anne, Timothy, Molly, Susan and Elsie.
