

TWO OTHERS ARE SERIOUSLY INJURED

A tragic motor vehicle crash on Highway 28, a mile north of Norwalk, last Thursday morning claimed the lives of two of Madison county's best known citizens, and brought serious injury to two others.

Killed in the crash were Mr. and Mrs. Claire D. Seibert of St. Charles. Mr. Seibert was the state representative from Madison county. He long had been active in this community, and his wife was equally well known.

Seriously injured in the accident were Mrs. Dale Beaman of St. Charles, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Seibert, and Mrs. Dick Howard of St. Charles. Both are receiving treatment at a Des Moines hospital.

The accident occurred about 10 a.m. last Thursday as the four from St. Charles were enroute to Des Moines. A pickup driven by Leo K. Daugherty of near Des Moines was driving south on Highway 28, when he came up behind some slowly moving traffic, as the Seibert car was approaching from the south. Daugherty told officers that when he applied his brakes to slow up, the pickup started skidding on the wet blacktop highway, and slid out directly into the path of the Seibert car. As each car was estimated to have been moving at 45 to 50 miles per hour, there was tremendous impact in the resulting head-on crash.

Mr. and Mrs. Seibert died almost instantly. Mrs. Beaman received a fractured jaw, and shattered bones in her face, among other injuries. Mrs. Howard was reported to have received a spinal fracture, several fractured ribs, and a broken leg and pelvis. She is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd McFarlin of Winterset. At latest reports, both Mrs. Beaman and Mrs. Howard are making progress toward recovery.

Mr. Seibert was serving his first term as state representative from the Madison-Adair county district. This position will remain vacant, until the next regular election, unless a special session of the Iowa assembly is called. In this case, it would be necessary to call a special election to fill the vacancy.

A crowd estimated at 800 persons, including many ranking Iowa state officials, attended the double funeral services held Monday in the St. Charles school building. The Rev. Leonard Root, pastor of the St. Charles Methodist church, conducted the services. Burial was in the Charles cemetery.

CLAIRE D. SEIBERT

Claire D. Seibert was 54 years of age at his death. He was born at Clearfield on March 9, 1911, a son of Walter C. and Dora Darlington Seibert, and spent his early life in that community.

He was married at Creston on June 10, 1938, to Lois Florence Swan. All of their married life had been spent in Madison county.

He long had been active in the affairs of his community. He had served on the Madison county Extension council, was a member of the Masonic lodge and Eastern Star, and the St. Charles Lions club. He was active in the St. Charles Methodist church, serving on the church board.

He was active in the Democratic party in Madison county, and in 1964 was elected the first state representative from the newly created Madison-Adair county district.

In addition to his daughter, he is survived by two sons, Wally and Bill Seibert of St. Charles; Winterset; and two brothers, Dr.

Cecil W. Seibert of Waterloo and Ivan Seibert of Washington, D. C.

Lois Florence Seibert was born at Clearfield, May 15, 1917, and was 48 years of age at her death. She was the former Lois Florence Sw., daughter of Charles J. and Nellie Kling Swan.

Her early life was spent in Clearfield, until her marriage to Claire D. Seibert on June 10, 1938. Since then her home had been in Madison county.

She was active in the St. Charles Methodist church, serving as treasurer. She was a member of Eastern Star.

Mrs. Seibert is survived by the daughter, Mrs. Dale Beaman, and the two sons, Wally and Bill Seibert, both of St. Charles; her mother, Mrs. Nellie Swan of New Market; three sisters, Mrs. Mary Anderson of New Market, Mrs. Margaret Zeller of Des Moines, and Mrs. Susan Manlon of Lakeville, California; and two brothers, Wally and Charles Swan of Peoria, Ill.

Claire D. (Dutch) Seibert was born on a farm 3/9/1911 near Clearfield, Iowa. He was the third son of Walter and Dora (Darlington) Seibert. He graduated from Clearfield High School in 1929. He farmed in the Clearfield area. Dutch was always very interested in sports, with baseball being his favorite game as a player in his younger years and spectator in later years.

On 6/10/1938, he was married to Lois Florence Swan of Clearfield, Iowa. Lois was born 5/15/1917, at Clearfield, and was the third daughter of Dr. C.J. and Nellie Swan. Lois also had two brothers. Lois taught school in the country schools in Ringgold County after graduating and before her marriage. In 1939 Lois and Dutch moved to the farmstead known as the "Queen Place" in Scott Township. They lived there until 1948 when they moved to a farm 7 miles west of Indianola. In 1956, the family moved back to a farm in South Township, south of St. Charles. In March, 1959 they moved to a farm north of St. Charles. They lived at this residence until their death.

Dutch and Lois had three children. Mary Kathleen was born 9/19/1941. She graduated from St. Charles Consolidated School in 1959. She married Dale E. Beaman, Sr. from St. Charles, on 6/15/1963. C.D. Seibert was elected on the Democratic ticket to serve his first term in the 61st General State House of Representatives in 1964, representing Madison-Adair Counties.

Dutch and Lois were killed instantly in a car accident north of Norwalk, on December 30, 1965, and are buried in the cemetery at St. Charles. Their daughter, Kathleen, and friend Mrs. Richard (LaMarian) Howard were also in this accident and both received multiple serious injuries.

Both Dutch and Lois were very active in church and many community affairs, such as Eastern Star, Masonic Lodge, Lion's Club, Farm Bureau and Madison County Extension Council. CLAIRE D. SEIBERT

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Claire D. Seibert, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Claire D. Seibert was born March 9, 1911 on a farm near Clearfield, Iowa, the son of Walter and Dora Darlington Seibert. He graduated from Clearfield High School in 1929. On June 10, 1938 he married Lois Swan of Clearfield. To this union were born one daughter, Kathleen, and two sons, Walter J. and William C.

Mr. Seibert moved to St. Charles, Iowa and farmed continuously there, with the exception of seven years spent in Warren County. He owned and operated a 240-acre stock and grain farm in Madison County at the time of his death.

He was a member of the Masonic Lodge, Eastern Star, Lion's Club and Farm Bureau. He was a member of the St. Charles Methodist Church, having served as chairman of the Official Board and in other capacities. He was a former school board member, on the Madison County Extension Council and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Mr. Seibert, a Democrat, was serving his first term in the Sixty-first General Assembly House of Representatives from Madison-Adair Counties.

Mr. Seibert was killed December 30, 1965 in an automobile accident that also took the life of his wife, Mrs. Lois Seibert. Surviving are their daughter, Mrs. Dale Beaman, two sons, Walter J. Seibert and William C. Seibert, two grandsons, all of St. Charles, and Mr. Seibert's mother, Mrs. Dora Seibert of Winterset.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE SIXTY-SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF IOWA: That in the passing of the Honorable Claire D. Seibert, the state has lost an honored citizen and a faithful and useful public servant, and the House by this resolution would express its appreciation of his service, and tender its sympathy to the members of his family.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That a copy of this resolution be spread upon the Journal of the House and that the Chief Clerk be directed to forward an enrolled copy to the family of the deceased.
