Ross S. Whisler, 89, a resident of 406 South 15th Street, Centerville, died at 3 p.m. Friday, July 31, 1981, in Audrain Medical Center, Mexico, Mo.

Born December 3, 1891, in Appanoose County, he was the son of Aaron S. and Mattie Ellen King Whisler. He was married to Lucile Ziegler at West Grove, Iowa April 15, 1917. She preceded him in death May 19, 1981.

He was a member of the Fairview Church of the Brethern near Unionville. He was a retired State Farm Insurance Company agent, and served as a legislator in the 61st General Assembly 1964-65, representing Appanoose and Davis Counties. He also had been treasurer of the Udell school board, and farmed many years n the Udell area.

Surviving are one son, Denny, of Mexico, Mo., a daughter-in-law, Earlene, two grandchildren, one great-grandchild, two brothers, Otto of East Moline, Ill. and Ivo of Oxnard, Calif. In addition to his wife, he was preceded in death by his parents, two brothers and four sisters.

Services will be Monday, August 3, at 1:30 p.m. at the Fairview Church of the Brethren, rural Unionville, with Robert Sifrit officiating. Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery. Visitation will be from 7 to 8 p.m. Sunday at Johnson Funeral Home, Centerville. A memorial has been established to Fairview Church.
