Wright County Economic Development

The Wright County Economic Development Commission is considering a second housing program (in addition to the First Time Home Owner program) and needs the help of the public.

H.O.M.E. (Home Ownership Made Easy/Home Investment Partnership act) is a new program offered Iowa cities and counties this year. Eligible activities include: moderate/substantial rehabilitation, acquisition, new construction (discouraged for Iowa), reconstruction, real property acquisition, site improvement, conversion, demolition, relocation assistance, financing costs, and tenant-based rental assistance.

For Wright County, housing rehab seems to be the most essential and desirable facet of H.O.M.E. But before they apply for a grant, the WCEDC is polling Wright County property owners to find out if there are enough willing participants to make the grant application worthwhile.

Also, since none of the grant money can be used for administration, the county wants to be sure the program is needed before the supervisors allocate funds for a program manager.

Iowa will get about \$9 million for H.O.M.E. project funding. Wright County would probably apply for about \$500,000 or enough to do 20-30 homes. These homes can be anywhere in Wright County, except in a small rehab area currently being upgraded by the City of Clarion.

Here's how you can help. If you own a vacant house, or know of someone who does, and would be interested in applying for grant funds to fix up the dwelling (maximum \$20,000) to then be rented for at least five years, please send, write or call the information to the WCEDC (532-6422) at the courthouse, lower level, in Clarion.

There is no obligation, and conversely, no obligation on the county to accept houses offered. This is a preliminary survey only, and its results will determine whether or not the WCEDC proceeds with an application.

Steve Hoesel of MIDAS (Council of Governments) believes there are houses in rural Wright County that could qualify and would be rental sources for the dozens of workers to be needed in the poultry plants.

Homes in town are also covered under the program. According to Vicky Fluhrer, Clarion City Administrator, several others outside the city's rehab zone, have indicated a desire to have their homes renovated.

Reconstruction includes roofs, siding, electrical, plumbing, foundations, walls, septic systems, sidewalks, etc.

Time is of the essence, and we need input as soon as possible.

After graduating from Royal High School in 1931, he attended the University of Iowa where he received his B.A. and J.D. degrees and met Maxine Sheldon of Rowan. They were married in Rowan on June 18, 1938. During World War II, Ray served as a U.S. Civil Service investigator and patent advisor to the War Department. Following the war, Ray and Maxine moved to Clarion where they raised their family and where Ray practiced law and managed their farm properties before moving to their home on Lake West Okoboji in 1974.

Ray Bailey gave tirelessly of his time and talents to many civic and professional organizations and as a public servant. He was three times elected to the Iowa House of Representatives and served for 12 years on the state Board of Regents. Ray and his beloved Maxine, who died in November, 1990, were dedicated supporters of the University of Iowa. In 1991, the Iowa Alumni Association presented Ray Bailey with the University's highest honor, the Distinguished Alumni Award.

Ray was a loving and devoted husband, father and grandfather. He is survived by two sons, Theron and his wife Cherry, and Bryan and his wife Joanie, one granddaughter and two grandsons.
