He served as liaison between the legislative Committee on Education and the Iowa College Foundation. He also was the organizer of the Annual Summer Sweet Corn and Chicken Roast, a Mahaska County Republican fundraiser, which now bears his name.

He was on the board of directors of Quad County Grain and was involved in its organization and original construction of the physical facilities.

He was married to Lucile Krizer on June 28, 1926 at Rose Hill. She died on May 9, 1966. On Nov. 9, 1969 he married Elizabeth Picken at Wanatah, Ind.

He is survived by his wife; two sons, Royce D. of Oskaloosa, and Arvid L. (Shorty) of Pella; a step-daughter, Judith M. Picken of Wheaton, Ill.; 10 grandchildren; 13 great-grandchildren, and one brother, Robert L. Pierson of Oskaloosa.
