"I think the governor is a great guy, and he did everything he said he was going to do," Failor said.


Pataki, who is known as a moderate, was among the most active of potential GOP presidential candidates in campaigning this fall for Republicans in local elections.

Maverick director Altman dies

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Robert Altman, a five-time Academy Award nominee for best director whose vast, eclectic filmography ranged from the dark war comedy "M-A-S-H" to the Hollywood farce "The Player" to the British murder mystery "Gosford Park," has died of complications from cancer. He was 81.

"He had lived and worked with the disease for the last 18 months, a period that included the making of his film "A Prairie Home Companion," the director's Sandcastle 5 Productions in New York said in a statement Tuesday. "His death was, nevertheless, a surprise: Altman was in pre-production on a film he had planned to start shooting in February."

He died Monday at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center, surrounded by his wife and chil-

...uesday. His death, nevertheless, a surprise: Altman was in pre-production on a film he had planned to start shooting in February."

He died Monday at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center, surrounded by his wife and children.

When he received a lifetime achievement Oscar in 2006, Altman revealed he'd had a heart transplant a decade earlier. "I didn't make a big secret out of it, but I thought nobody would hire me again," he said after the ceremony. "You know, there's such a stigma about heart transplants, and there's a lot of us out there."

Altman was to begin work on "Hands on a Hardbody," a fictionalized version of the documentary about a Texas contest in which people stand around a pickup truck with one hand the vehicle, and whoever lasts the longest wins it. The film would have been vintage Altman.

While he was famous for his outspokenness, which caused him to fall in and out of favor in Hollywood over his nearly six decades in the industry, he was perhaps even better known for his influential method of assembling large casts and weaving in and out of their story lines, using long tracking shots and intentionally having dialogue overlap.

His most recent example of this technique, this year's "A Prairie Home Companion," starred such varied performers as Lily Tomlin, Meryl Streep, Woody Harrelson, Kevin Kline and Lindsay Lohan. It was based on the long-running radio show from Garrison Keillor, who said Altman's love of film clearly came through on the set.

"Mr. Altman loved making movies. He loved the chaos of shooting and the sociability of the crew and actors - he adored actors - and he loved the editing room and he especially loved sitting in a screening room and watching the thing over and over with other people." Keillor, who also wrote and co-starred in the film, told The Associated Press.

He gave 50 years of faithful service as director of the 21st Degree team of Whiting, was a 50-year member of the Scottish Rites, a member of the 1942 Sioux City Consistory class, a member of the Sioux City Abu Bekr Shrine and a 33rd Degree Mason.

He counsel was sought by family, friends, neighbors, fellow Masons and politicians, especially his good friend, Maurice Baringer.



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

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

At left Edward M. Cassady (1848-1928) pioneer farmer and Whiting businessman, was elected Republican representative from Monona County in 1906 and served two terms in the legislature. He came to this area in 1868 with his widowed mother, Julia, after service in the Union Army during the Civil War and the Indian uprisings in Minnesota. They bought land in West Fork Township which was later part of his Walnut Ridge Stock Farm. Cassady was postmaster in West Fork the last four years before the office was moved to the new town of Whiting in 1873. With his brother-in-law, Will C. Whiting, he organized Cassady & Whiting general store in 1880, started a lumber yard two years later, also operated a bank and grain elevator. In 1878 he married Ida Whiting (1854-1937), daughter of C. E. Whiting. Their children were Raymond, Edith (Mrs. Nev McBeath) Edward Jr., and Lloyd.



Up right, A. B. (Bert) Elliott, as a young man. He was Monona County's Republican representative in the legislature in 1913. Bert learned the grain business from his father, George Elliott, sold the elevator on the north side of street to a farmer's stock company in 1916, later purchased the Cassady & Whiting elevator on the south side of the street.



Left, Harold Lewis Pike (1880-1957) as a young man. While attending business school in Des Moines in 1903 he was first elected to the Iowa State Fair Board, was later its president, served 53 years. Also served on the Whiting school board as secretary, director, president from 1919 to 1955.




Right, Raymond Cassady (1881-1924), about the time he was a student at the University of Iowa. In his sophomore year he was one of a group who kidnaped the freshman president and entertained him at a rabbit hunt on a distant farm while he was supposed to be presiding at the freshman banquet. The sophomores were expelled, not without support from a minority of the faculty who thought the prank showed great ingenuity. No doubt, Raymond's father, E. M. Cassady, felt it was time to lower the boom, though the local paper merely reported that Raymond had returned from his studies at Iowa City to get some practical experience in the bank. Later he enrolled at the ag college at Ames where he made a fine record and was a member of the championship livestock judging team at the International Stock Show in 1909. In partnership with his father he became a successful farmer and Hereford breeder and was appointed Iowa's first secretary of agriculture in 1923. He married Flora Whiting, (1883-1967) daughter of Charles I. Whiting of Mapleton in 1910, and they were the parents of Raymond, now of Emmetsburg, Nancy of Iowa City, and Betsy Cassady Nims who lives in the East.



Right, Jewell Waugh, Whiting farmer, was Monona County representative in the state legislature for three terms, beginning in 1967. He was elected on the Republican ticket. Jewell was a longtime school board member, active in Masonry, and pioneered the growing of sugar beets here in the 1960s. He married Cieta Harding in 1930 and they have two daughters, Phyllis (Mrs. Robert Clayton) and Janice (Mrs. Lowell Dendinger).




