# Former state lawmaker remembered for service

## Hartley native served in Iowa House for 10 years

HARTLEY—Ingwer "Ing" Hansen, a lifelong Hartley resident who spent a decade in the Iowa House of Representatives, died Monday at the Senior Wellness Center in Hartley. He was 87.

Hansen, who served in the House 1972-82, rose to become assistant majority leader.

Hansen also was a member of the board of directors of Village Northwest Unlimited in Sheldon, president of the O'Brien County Board of Education and an original member of the Community Memorial Hospital in Hartley. In addition, he served on the Northwest Iowa Community College Board of Directors and was president of the college founda-

tion.

"Ing was one of those individuals who approaches things very practically," said Carl Rolf, NCC president. "He had a lot of experience to draw on so he was an asset to the board and the foundation."

According to Rolf, Hansen's experience and clear thinking made him an asset in all his public service.

"He was just an individual who had a lot to give," he said.

Hansen was a rural mail carrier for 42 years before he retired in 1972. After his time with the Iowa Legislature he enrolled at Worthington Community College and received his associate degree with highest honors.

Funeral services for Hansen were Thursday. He is survived by a son, Ingwer "Orv" Hansen Jr. of Sheldon and two daughters, Mary Ann and her husband Kenneth Gregory of Dysart and Jane and her husband Ronald Kauzlarich of LeMars.

HARTLEY—Ingwer Lamont Hansen, 87, Hartley, died Monday, Feb. 7, at the Senior Wellness Center in Hartley.

Services were Thursday, Feb. 10, at Trinity United Church of Christ in Hartley, with the Rev. John Rosenberger officiating. Burial was at Pleasant View Cemetery in Hartley, under the direction of Warner Funeral Home in Hartley.

Ingwer Hansen, son of Ernest and Augusta (Jurgens) Hansen, was born Aug. 8, 1912, in Hartley. He received his education in Hartley and graduated from Hartley High School. He married Patricia Greenlee on April 7, 1939, in Canton, SD. They lived in Hartley their entire lives. He entered the U.S. Army on April 11, 1944, at Camp Dodge and while in the Army he was awarded the American Service Medal, Good Conduct Medal and the World War II Victory Medal. He was given his honorable discharge on March 10, 1946, from Fort McPherson, GA. Following his discharge he came back to Hartley, where he was a rural mail carrier for nearly 42 years and a member of the Rural Letter Carriers Association. Hansen died May 9, 1988.



He was a member of Trinity United Church of Christ and the Consistory, a 50-year member of the Masonic Lodge, Abu Bekr Temple, Shrine Club and American Legion and had been the district commander of the American Legion, a member of the Lions Club, a member of the Order of Eastern Star, a member of the O'Brien County Board of Education and served as its president, and an original board member of the Hartley Community Memorial Hospital and its first president. He was also secretary of the Chamber of Commerce for 33 years and a lifetime member. He also was on the board of directors of Village Northwest in Sheldon; the Iowa Department of Aging Beer and Liquor Control Commission, board of directors at Northwest Iowa Community College in Sheldon and president of the NCC Foundation. For 10 years he was in the House of Representatives from northwest Iowa and had served as assistant majority leader. Following this, he attended Worthington Community College and received his associate degree with highest honors.

Survivors include his son, Ingwer "Orv" Hansen Jr. of Sheldon; two daughters, Mary Ann and Kenneth Gregory of Dysart and Jane and Ronald Kauzlarich of LeMars; two grandchildren; a sister, LuVerne Katz of Chatham, NJ; and a brother, Kermit of Thousand Oaks, CA.

Survivors also include his wife, Patricia, and his parents.
