Killed by the Cars.

A telegram received in this city Sat-
urday afternoon announced the sad in-
telligence that Lot Dorsey, son of An-
thony Dorsey, a well known citizen of
this place, had been seriously injured by
falling between the cars of a moving
freight train at Pacific Junction. A few
hours later another dispatch announced
his death from the injuries received. He
had been in the employ of the C. B. &
Q. company for about two months as a
freight brakeman and was on duty at the
time of his misfortune. He had been
working at the head of the train and
while returning had his attention attracted
by others of the train men to some
other work. Walking backward or side-
wise he stumbled and fell between the
moving cars and the ponderous wheels
almost severed his legs from his body
near the upper part of the thigh. He
was taken to Glenwood for medical aid
and died there about five hours later.
Lot was nineteen or twenty years of age,
a hard-working, steady, industrious boy,
and popular with his fellow workmen
and comrades. The remains were brought
to this city Sunday morning and inter-
red here that evening. Father Morgan

Death of Mrs. Jewett.

A Good Man Gone.

We regret to learn of the death of C.
O. Stanton, an old and respected citizen
of Pleasant Plain, which occurred in
that place Friday evening of last week,
after an illness of but a few days, his
death resulting from a third stroke of
paralysis. Mr. Stanton was about sixty
years of age, and removed to this coun-
ty from Ohio early in the '50s. He was
an ardent anti-slavery man, and for a
long time was an energetic worker in
the underground railway, and used to
exhibit a coat perforated by a bullet
from the gun of a slave-holder. He re-
presented this county in the lower house
of the legislature in 1856, and has held
the office of justice of the peace and
other minor positions in his township.
He was twice married, and leaves several
children. His funeral occurred Saturday
evening, and was largely attended. In
the death of Squire Stanton a good citi-
zen and a man of integrity is gone.

A War Relic.

Jas. Potts, of Liberty, showed us a
war relic Monday—a piece of a bone
about six inches long and an inch square,
carved and polished, on which was en-
graved, on three of the sides, "W. C.
Blanton." "Mississippi toothpick." It
had probably been a knife handle, and
had been made of the thigh bone of a
Union soldier. It was captured in a
rebel camp at Grand Gulf, near Vicks-
burg, Miss., by Potts' company. At
the same place was found a skull, in use
as a wash basin, the carving on which
stated that it was the skull of a Union
soldier who had been killed at Bull Run.
Did heathen ever practice more hideous
barbarities than these? The "Mississ-
ippi toothpick" may have done its work,
but it is to be hoped that its fiendish
owner has met his just deserts long ere
this. Such relics are not calculated to
soften the heart of a northern man to-
ward the southern chivalry.

Farmers' Club.

The attendance at the regular meeting
last Saturday was very slim, slender and
attenuated. Not over a dozen farmers
were present, but they nearly all partici-
pated in the discussion of the creamery
question. George Cochran and Theo-
dore Dixon gave some interesting figures
in relation to the profit on steers and
cows, the former believing steers to be
more profitable, while the latter thought
that cows when properly cared for would
yield a better return for the money in-
vested. Mr. Dixon, whose wife is a
noted gilt-edge butter maker, thought
that as good butter could be made on
the farm as in the creamery, but that
no one farmer made enough of it to jus-
tify him in expending money for ma-
chinery. He thought the farmer who
sold to the creamery made about 12 1/2
per cent, and the creamery about 15 per
cent. His business on the farm was so
great that he patronized the Fairfield
creamery and saved his wife much labor.
Messrs. Ireland, Campbell and Bell also
presented some interesting ideas. The
question for discussion at the next regu-
lar meeting, Saturday, June 25th, is:
"Resolved, That the agricultural inter-
ests of the country fail to receive the
recognition due to their importance as
compared with other interests, because of
ignorance or insincerity on the part of
farmers, and their consequent neglect of
all movements promotive of their pros-


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Stanton-Warren Family Tree


