Death of Thomas Moorman.

Thomas Moorman, the well known Fairfield township farmer, died at his home six miles northwest of this city, Tuesday evening. He had been in failing health for several years, confined to his bed for three months past, and his death was not unexpected. Mr. Moorman was born in Highland county, Ohio, September 7th, 1809. In 1833 he was married to Miss Margaret Canaday, and in 1844 the family removed to this county, locating in the northwestern part of Fairfield township, where they have since resided. In 1859, several years after the decease of his first wife, Mr. Moorman was married to Mrs. Leah Robinson, who survives him. He was the father of eight children, six of whom are now living—C. W. and W. T. Moorman and Mrs. P. B. Grafton of this county, Mrs. W. B. Searle of Ottumwa, Mrs. Wilkins Warwick of Wellington, Kansas, and Mrs. W. M. Campbell of Alabama. Deceased was a most excellent man in all the relations of life. In his earlier days he was an industrious, progressive farmer and at the time of his death was a large landholder.

Death of Solomon Light.

Tuesday evening about 4 o'clock many friends in this city were startled at the announcement of the death of Solomon Light, a well known citizen of Fairfield. Death had resulted from apoplexy, after scarcely an hour's illness. Mr. Light had been in his usual health for some time past, although it was ascertained when too late that a numbness in an arm was a premonitory symptom of the disease whose attack proved fatal. On the day in question he had been engaged in light labor about his home. What he thought a slight indisposition induced him to go into the house, he died while a messenger was gone to the physician. Mr. Light's age was 49 years, 11 months. He was born in Harrisburg, Pa., and was a California '49er. On October 3d, 1852, at Berne, N. Y., he was married to Catherine B. Nimmons, who survives him. Four children of this marriage are now living, Ex Auditor Frank Light and daughters, Mary and Kate, in this city, and Samuel Light of Des Moines. Deceased came to this city from Pymouth, Ohio, in 1858, and it has since been his home. He was in business for many years in the Wells block, east side, and later was quite an extensive grower of trees and fruits. For several years he has spent much of his time in Kansas, where he was engaged in ranching. A plain, unassuming man Mr. Light was an excellent and highly respected citizen. The ceremonies attending his funeral took place yesterday afternoon, and the remains were laid away in the cemetery near his home which has long borne his name.

Mr. Mendenhall was the first gunsmith in Fairfield, and his services in that early day were in great demand. MITCHELL, H. B., farmer, Sec. 28; owns 295 acres of land, valued at \$40 per acre; born in Claremont, Sullivan Co., N. H.; came to Jefferson Co. in 1840. Married Oct. 26, 1847, Miss Maria E. Tool; had ten children, nine living—Susan D., born Sept. 4, 1848; Effie I., born July

20, 1850; John D., born Feb. 26, 1853; Helen M., born May 22, 1858; Marietta and Henrietta (twins), born Aug. 11, 1860; Cora A., born April 5, 1863; Carrie T., born March 17, 1866; Thomas A., born Sept. 12, 1870; William H., Oct. 17, 1865, deceased. Mr. H. B. Mitchell, and his brother Thomas, built, in 1841, the first frame dwelling-house west of Fairfield; Mr. M., since his arrival in this county, has been an active participant in political matters, holding at different times various offices of trust in the county and township; in 1852, was elected to the House of Representatives—then Territorial Legislature; was the first Whig elected from this county; has been a member of the Agricultural Society since its organization, and its President six different times; member of the Board of Supervisors two years; President of the Board of Directors of Fairfield Township for seventeen years. Mr. M. saw the first hack that carried passengers, the first four-horse coach, the first train of cars, and the first telegraphic message that ever came to Fairfield. Mr. Mitchell has been closely identified with all the best interests of the county.

ued at \$35 per acre; born in Highland Co., Ohio, in 1809; moved to Jefferson Co. in 1844. Married, in 1833, Margaret Canaday; married his second wife, Miss Leah Brooks, in 1859; has eight children—Anna E., born 1834; Eliza E. (now deceased), born 1835; Manda J., born 1837; Charles W., born 1839; Albert M. (now deceased), born 1841; Martha, born 1844; Wm. T., born 1846; L. W. MURRAY, W. B., clerk, Fairfield; born in Fayette Co., Va., Dec. 8, 1835; moved with parents to Jefferson Co., Iowa, in 1837, and, in 1856, commenced teaching; in 1861, went to Salt Lake; on his return, did teaming to Denver; from there, worked his passage to Council Bluffs and on to Fairfield. Enlisted in Co. A, 4th Iowa Cav.; went with the regiment to Batesville, Ark., and was mustered out on account of sickness; in the fall of 1862, enlisted in the 37th Iowa Inf., but when examined was rejected; in the spring of 1863, enlisted as recruit to the 14th Iowa Inf.; went with the regiment to Cairo; was on detached service as Post Orderly under Gen. N. B. Buford; in May, 1864, was promoted to Second Lieutenant in the 1st Iowa Colored Inf.; was detached and placed on Gen. N. B. Buford's staff; was there till the spring of 1865; joined his company at Little Rock; was sent to do Provost Marshal duty at

Powhatan; in October, the company was ordered to join their regiment at Duvall's Bluff; mustered out and sent to Davenport in November, 1865. In 1866, he took a provision train to Denver for the Federal Union Mining Co.; with them till 1867; then traveled through Minnesota; was correspondent of the *Home Visitor* in 1868; appointed Inspector of Timber and Ties for the U. P. R. R.; stationed at Wyoming Territory; also correspondent of the *Brighton Pioneer*; in 1870, was Purchasing Agent of the S. W. R. R., and had charge of the building of bridges in 1871-72; in the same business on the C. S. R. R., through Canada. Has collected quite a cabinet of geological specimens, fossils and minerals. Married Sept. 22, 1872, Martha Beaumont, of Canada. Members of the Baptist Church; Republican.

he yet keeps himself well informed on matters of general interest. His term of apprenticeship to his chosen trade having expired, he followed that pursuit in Albany and vicinity for several years, but at length he came to the West to try his fortune upon its broad prairies. In 1846 he purchased two hundred acres of raw land and began the development of a farm. He was then a single man, but after having made some preparations for a home, in 1847 he returned to his native State, where was awaiting him a lady who had promised him her hand in marriage. The wedding of Mr. Ten Eyck and Miss Christina M. Bink was then celebrated and with his bride he returned to Iowa. Her parents, Philip and Mary (Harrington) Bink, were natives of New York and of German descent. Of this marriage three children were born, all of whom are deceased.

The young couple began their domestic life upon a farm in Chequest Township, which at one time comprised three hundred acres, but it now embraces one hundred and forty acres of highly cultivated land, he having disposed of the remaining portion. In 1849 he went to St. Louis, where he spent one year working at his trade, but with that exception he has continuously made his home in Van Buren County since 1846. He has carried on agricultural pursuits and also done considerable carpentering, by which means he has acquired a good property which now places him in comfortable circumstances.

Mr. Ten Eyck was called upon to mourn the loss of his wife in 1854, and in 1856, in Van Buren County, he wedded Rosannah Elizabeth Sellers, a native of Indiana, and a daughter of Benjamin Sellers. Both her parents died in Indiana. By this union has been born four children, three of whom are deceased; the one living, Oliver E., married Mary Vincent, daughter of S. E. Vincent, and is now engaged in teaching school in this county. Mr. and Mrs. Ten Eyck have a pleasant home situated only a short distance from Lebanon, in fact that town was built upon a part of his farm. They are highly respected throughout the community, and their home is the abode of hospitality. Mr. Ten Eyck is a Democrat in politics and is a member of the School Board. The cause of education

finds in him a warm friend, and he has done effective service for her interests. Large-hearted and liberal, he is a friend to the poor and needy and his has been the helping hand stretched out to many who, had it not been for his timely aid, would doubtless have been involved in bankruptcy. At one time he bid in a farm that was sold at a sheriff's sale and thus gave the previous owner a chance to redeem his home. His life is made up of such commendable acts as that, and in consequence he has won the lasting regard and respect of those with whom he has been brought in contact.



HON. THOMAS MOORMAN, deceased, an early settler and honored citizen of Jefferson County, was born in Ohio on the 7th of September, 1809, his parents being Charles and Elizabeth Moorman. In the county of his nativity he was reared to manhood and learned the trade of manufacturing saddle-trees, which business he followed for some years though he made farming his principal occupation through life.

In Highland County, Ohio, on the 16th of April, 1833, Mr. Moorman was united in marriage with Miss Margaret Canaday, a native of that county, and by their union were born unto them the following children—Anna E., who was born January 29th, 1834, and is the wife of Parker B. Grafton of Polk Township, Jefferson County; Eliza E., born March 9, 1835, became the wife of Matthew Junkin and died in September, 1870; Amanda J., born March 13, 1837, is the wife of Wilkins Warwick, of Kansas; Charles W., born November 2, 1838, was a soldier in the late war, married Etta Smith and is now living in Black Hawk Township; Albert M., born January 6, 1841, died October 31, 1847; Martha M., born August 4, 1844, is the wife of Dr. Webster Searle, of Ottumwa; William T., who was born December 4, 1846, and was also in the late war, married Anna Greenwood and lives in Fairfield; Lewis C. born March 2, 1849, died

February 6, 1850; Sarah A. born August 19, 1850, is the wife of William Campbell, of Florence, Alabama, and the youngest of the family.

Hearing favorable reports of Iowa and the advantages afforded her early settlers, Mr. Moorman determined to make a location within her borders and in 1844, accompanied by his family, settled on a farm in Fairfield Township, Jefferson County. Again beginning life in earnest, his efforts were crowned with success and everything passed along well until 1854, when the wife and mother was called to her final rest, her death occurring on the 22nd of January 1854. Mr. Moorman was again married on the 19th of April, 1859, his second union being with Mrs. Leah B. Robinson, widow of Dr. Sawyer Robinson, whose sketch appears elsewhere in this work. She was born in Butler County, Ohio, June 2, 1826, and is a daughter of Finley M. and Elizabeth (Gray) Brooks. Her parents were early settlers of Brookville, in Locust Grove Township, she having accompanied them to the county in 1846. One child has been born to Mr. and Mrs. Moorman, Eva C., who was born July 2, 1863, and became the wife of J. L. Ganier, of Fairfield, her death occurring March 22, 1885.

Mr. Moorman continued his farming operations up to the time of his death. As he possessed energy, good management and business ability, he met with success in his undertakings and became owner of a fine farm of three hundred and five acres in Fairfield Township, which has since been divided among the family. In his earlier years, he took an active part in public affairs and was an influential citizen of the community. In the legislative assembly of 1857, and 1858, he served as a member and was also Justice of the Peace for several years. He was reared in the faith of the Society of Friends but about 1863 joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, to which his wife has belonged for half a century. Ever faithful to his religious duties, the church suffered a loss at his death and in other good works his absence has also been keenly felt.

The temperance cause found in him one of its strongest supporters and other enterprises for the advancement of the community were sure of his

sympathy and co-operation. In his earlier years, in politics he was a Whig but on the organization of the Republican party joined in its ranks. His death occurred March 26, 1889, and was the occasion of deep regret on the part of a large circle of friends and acquaintances.

Mrs. Moorman is still living on the old homestead, of which she owns eighty acres, together with ninety acres in Locust Grove Township, the whole yielding her a good income which places her in comfortable circumstances. Like her husband she delights in doing good, her life abounds in deeds of charity and benevolence and her many excellent qualities make her greatly beloved.



HIRAM BARNES is a retired farmer and honored citizen of Birmingham, Van Buren County. Known to many throughout the county, and held in the highest esteem by all, his sketch will be received with interest by many of our readers. His birthplace is in Harrison County, Ohio, and the date on which he first opened his eyes to the light, March 18, 1818. He is a son of James A. Barnes and a grandson of Leonard Barnes, who was probably a native of Ireland. From Maryland he removed to Ohio, where he spent the remainder of his life engaged in farming. James Barnes was born in the Buckeye State, and on reaching the age of twenty-one married Miss Elizabeth Barnett, also a native of Ohio. Her father was a Frenchman and her mother's people belonged to the Society of Friends. Mr. Barnes improved a new farm after his marriage, and later moved from Tuscarawas County to Holmes County, where he resided some four years. It was in 1839 that he first set foot upon Iowa soil. Crossing the Mississippi, he continued his journey to Van Buren County and made a location about a mile south of Birmingham, where he entered one hundred and twenty acres of land. After building a log cabin, he began the improvement of a farm, while the family lived in true pioneer style. He was called
