**THE SAVING HABIT**

**GROWING INTO PURE BRED**

"Here is a real gold bond with the coupon still attached," the auctioneer remarked as a fine big cow with a husky calf at foot is led into the ring. The cow is a bit thin in flesh. She has been giving of her own body to feed her calf; but she is a good cow of a good type, with plenty of maternal qualities; and the calf is the very best possible evidence that she is tending strictly to the business for which she is kept, namely, reproducing herself.

But the bidding is not enthusiastic. She is started at a price far below the prices at which yearling heifers in full bloom have been selling; and notwithstanding the pleading of the auctioneer, she is knocked down at a price which her calf alone doubtless would bring under the same conditions six months afterwards. Her buyer is not, as might be expected, some man who is starting a pure bred herd, not some man who has a few cows already; but an old, experienced breeder who really is not in the market for anything just then, but who sees in this cow too good a bargain to let go.

Cows like this, regular breeders with five to eight years of breeding life yet before them, with calves at foot, are the very sort that should be picked up by the less experienced breeders. Our mind runs back twenty-seven years to another such cow. She was a big-square roan in quite thin flesh, with a five-months bull calf at foot, a splendid looking cow and a splendid looking calf. She was dragging along at something like eighty dollars. The writer happened to be sitting next to B. F. Elbert, an Iowa breeder who handled during his life some of the best Short-horns ever brought to the state. He said, "Young man, buy that cow and calf. You can't make a mistake. If she loses you any money, just send the bill to me, and I will make it good." We bought her at \$105. In three months we sold the calf for \$150; and for five years that cow every year produced a splendid calf, and there was never any trouble in finding a market for it.

The young breeder is too often carried away by the charms of a flashy heifer in full bloom. He pays three or four times as much for her as good, useful cows well along in calf, or with calves at side may be selling for at the same sale. If the young breeder has had considerable experience and buys these young things with judgment, we are not saying that he may not do all right with them; but if he is building up a herd and has no money to throw away, he is making a mistake to neglect the claims of good, useful, producing cows which show poorly because suckled down.

The prices at which pure bred cattle have been selling during the past year have been most gratifying not alone to breeders but to all who appreciate the importance of improving our grades of live stock in the corn belt. Robert Bruce Arnold, son of Lewis and Margaret Arnold, was born near Greencastle, Ind., January 20, 1864; came with his father's family to Monroe county, Iowa, in 1846; was married to Maggie Stamm, of Monroe county, January 1, 1860; lived in Monroe county, with the exception of two years in Davis City, Iowa, during the time of the war, and one year in Ottumwa, until the time of his death at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. D. Devereaux, at Albia, Iowa, October 5, 1916. The funeral was conducted from the Devereaux home Sunday, October 8, by Rev. Hankins, of Clinton, Iowa, a warm personal friend of the deceased.

His wife and two infant children have preceded him to the life beyond. He is survived by four children and nine grandchildren. His children are W. H. Arnold of St. Louis; W. S. Arnold, of Blakesburg, Iowa; Mrs. T. E. Horner, of Osage, Iowa, and Mrs. J. D. Devereaux, of Albia. He is also survived by two foster children, Bert Arnold of Moravia, and Mrs. Walter Lowry of Chicago. Mrs. S. W. Hurst, of Leon, Ia., is the only surviving member of the Arnold family.

We do not have corresponding figures for the Angus and Herefords, but relatively they have been selling as well. The breeder of pure bred cattle has been going thru a rather discouraging period, and he is fully entitled to the reward which he is now getting.

Naturally such prices are attracting attention to the value of pure bred. They will attract the speculators, who go in and out with the ups and downs of the business. They will also attract a number of farmers who have not that very much about the value of pure bred cattle heretofore. We are not offering any advice to the speculators, and the experienced breeders do not need any from us; but we wish to drop a word of caution to inexperienced men.

The pure bred business has its ups and downs from the beginning. The farmer who is attracted by the high prices and determines to go into it simply because he thinks he can make a lot of money in it is likely to be disappointed. The men who jump
