Robert Glasgow's Sudden Death.

Another landmark is gone. Last Saturday morning our citizens were shocked to hear of the death of Hon. Robt. Glasgow. He had been ailing for some time, but his sudden death was a great surprise. He retired in the evening, no worse than usual, and about 9 o'clock next morning, when the family went to call him, he was asleep in that sleep from which none awake till the angel's trumpet call shall be heard on the morning of the resurrection.

Robt. Glasgow was born in Adams county, Ohio, April 12, 1820, and in 1854 he moved to this county, where he resided on a farm till some years ago, when the family moved to this city.

Mrs. Glasgow died very suddenly, also, in 1884, a peculiar coincidence.

Mr. Glasgow had received but a limited education in his youth, yet by constant reading, study and meditation, he is reputed to have been one of the best informed men in the county.

Bible study was his especial delight and in that he was most proficient, so much so that he had few equals as an authority on the scriptures. He was a man of firm convictions, yet considerate of others' opinions; liberal and progressive. In 1860 he was elected to the Iowa legislature. In 1864 he enlisted in Co. H., 2d Iowa volunteers, and served to the close of the war, being present at the grand review at Washington. After the war he served as county treasurer for eight years. He was an estimable, exemplary Christian man.

His funeral occurred Sunday, conducted by his pastor, Rev. J. R. Logue. A good man has gone to his reward, but his life had been a useful one. Let many emulate his example.
