TANK CASE AGAIN.

The Ambiguous Decision of Judge Whitaker Lead Us Into Error.

Judge Whitaker's decision in the tank case has been severely criticised by some. Pending the decision he had red the tank to be filled with water at it. Mr. Quackenbush could not do it as he had no water with which to do it. The city refused to attach a main saying that the tank was not theirs. As therefore no actual test of this tank has ever been made and as it was in the power of no one else than the city to make this test, the judge held as a matter of reason that the city should accept the tank and pay a reasonable price for it. While the decision is apparently against the city it makes a provision whereby the city may have redress in the event that the tank prove unsafe or fail to hold water. In case either of the latter conditions prove true, the decision rendered by the judge is subject to modification. With this provision in the decision it would appear to be just to both parties to the suit.

The foregoing appeared in the Daily Freeman-Tribune of yesterday, but members of the council say it is misleading in some respects. From a hasty reading of the decision and making inquiries of some of those who ought to know our reporter arrived at the conclusions above, but we are always glad to correct any errors that may appear in our columns, wishing only to report news correctly.

Members of the council insist that Judge Whitaker did not order the tank filled. The city's counsel asked for such an order, but the judge refused, merely requesting that it be filled by one of the parties to the suit. The city offered to furnish the water for Mr. Quackenbush but he declined to fill the tank. The city has not refused to pay for the main to the tank, but on the contrary such connection was made months ago.

ANOTHER PIONEER GONE

Hon. S. B. Rosenkrans Died at His Home in Perry Last Night.

AMONG WEBSTER CITY'S FIRST CITIZENS

A dispatch was received by friends here this morning conveying the sad intelligence of the death of Hon. S. B. Rosenkrans at his home in Perry, Iowa, last night. Deceased was a native of New York, born in Steuben county, April 27, 1824, being therefore nearly 77 years old at the time of his death. In March, 1856, Mr. Rosenkrans came to Webster City with his wife and made this his home continuously up till a few years ago when he removed to Perry. In the early days of Webster City he was engaged in the manufacture of lumber and the real estate business. In 1857 he was elected clerk of the courts of Webster county, which then embraced all the present territory of Webster and Hamilton counties. In 1859 he was chosen as representative in the state legislature from this district, then composing the counties of Story and Hamilton, serving in the sessions of 1859, 1860 and the special session during the rebellion. At the breaking out of the war he was appointed drafting commissioner by Gov. Kirkwood and held the position until the close of hostilities. During all the years of his vigorous manhood he was an enterprising and active citizen and was foremost in all good works for the material and moral advancement of the community in which he lived. He was mayor of Webster City and served several terms as councilman, always discharging his duties with conscientious regard and faithful stewardship. In the earlier days he was quite a factor in the upbuilding of Webster City and was a man of varied abilities, unswerving character and upright life, and his taking hence will recall many of the good deeds he did in the days when Webster City was on the frontier and when her people were experiencing the hardships and inconveniences of pioneer life. Selim B. Rosenkrans was in every sense of the word a good man, and during his residence of forty years in this community won the respect and good will of those with whom he associated. His was a genial nature, full of sunshine and hope, and nobody would make greater sacrifices for the benefit of friends and those he esteemed, nor do more for the welfare and good name of his town than Mr. Rosenkrans. When the history of Hamilton county is finally written his will be a position of honor and prominence in its pages and he will surely be remembered by future generations of the community as one worthy of veneration and respect.

A telephone message received this morning states the remains will be here tomorrow forenoon at 11:40, and the funeral will be held at the congregational church at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, Rev. J. O. Thrush conducting the service.

charged at Springfield, Illinois, in July, 1865. He returned to his native county and lived there until June, 1873, when he came to Iowa, and settled in Boone, now Independence, Township, Hamilton County, where he bought 160 acres of wild land, which he has improved and added to until he now has a good farm of 440 acres. Mr. Neely was married January 15, 1871, to Margaret McDervitt, a native of Edgar County, Illinois, daughter of Joseph and Sarah (Morton) McDervitt. To them have been born seven children, six of whom are living—Grace, Ethel, Mand, Alexis, Van and Percy. One child died in infancy. Mr. Neely has held many local offices of trust, and since 1887 has been sheriff of the county, a position he is well qualified to fill. He is a member of Acacia Lodge, No. 176, A. F. & A. M., and Winfield Scott Post, G. A. R. In politics he affiliates with the Republican party.

SAMUEL A. JAMESON, one of the pioneers of Hamilton Township, was born in Morgan County, Illinois, and when five years old his parents moved to Jefferson County, Iowa, and in 1855 came to Hamilton County, and settled in Homer. In 1863 our subject enlisted in the war of the Rebellion and was assigned to Company G, Seventh Iowa Cavalry, his two brothers, Charles M. and Jacob B., being members of the same regiment, and both died while in the service of their country. Samuel was accidentally injured, having his left hip dislocated and was discharged on account of disability, and has never fully recovered from the effects of this injury. He settled on the farm where he now lives in 1872, which contains 160 acres of good land, located on section 7, Hamilton Township. He is a member


of one of the well-known and representative families of the county, and is one of the prominent citizens of his township. He married Eliza Groves, a daughter of Jackson Groves, a pioneer of the county. They have two children—Lorinda Eva and Loranda Elva (twins), born February 24, 1868. In politics Mr. Jameson is a Republican, and an earnest advocate of the principles of his party. He is a member of the Baptist and his wife is a member of the Methodist Episcopal church.

AARON S. B. ROSENKRANS, proprietor of Rosenkrans' Park, is one of the pioneers and enterprising citizens of Hamilton County. He is a native of New York, born in Steuben County April 27, 1824, a son of Aaron and Hannah (Ager) Rosenkrans. His father was a native of New Jersey, a son of Levi Rosenkrans, also a native of New Jersey, and a grandson of John Rosenkrans, who was a native of Dutchess County, New York, born May 18, 1724. His great-great-grandfather was a native of Amsterdam, Holland, and was one of the first settlers of the State of New York. At the breaking out of the Revolutionary war John Rosenkrans and three of his sons enlisted and served in the defense of the colonies until the close of the war, the father being commissioned a Colonel. He was married August 8, 1751, to Margaret DeWitt, and in an early day they moved to New Jersey, where many of their descendants still live. Aaron Rosenkrans was reared in New Jersey and there married Hannah Ager. They subsequently moved to Hammonds Port, Steuben County, New York, where he engaged in farming and wagon making. They reared a family of seven children, four of whom are living. They were active members of the Presbyterian church, which de-

nomination he served as deacon and elder over half a century. Both died in Steuben County at the age of seventy-seven years. S. B. Rosenkrans, the subject of our sketch, spent his youth in attending school, and in assisting his father in the manufacture of wagons, and when he attained his majority was given a partnership in the business. In March, 1856, he moved to Iowa and settled in Webster City, where he engaged in the manufacture of lumber and the real estate business. The following fall he was elected clerk of the courts of Webster County, which then comprised the present limits of Hamilton and Webster counties, and served in this capacity two years. In 1859 he was elected to represent Hamilton and Story counties in the State Legislature, serving in the sessions of 1859, 1860, and the special session of 1861. At the breaking out of the Rebellion he was appointed drafting commissioner by Governor Kirkwood, holding the position during the war. He has held the positions of mayor and councilman of Webster City, and has taken an active interest in all enterprises for the advancement of the city and county. He was one of the incorporators of the Crooked Creek and Southwestern Railroad, and served as its secretary. He has for several years been engaged in the real estate business, and now devotes his time to the improvement and development of Rosenkrans Park. He has erected quite a number of the business buildings of the town and now owns several business houses and other improved property. Mr. Rosenkrans was married June 3, 1851, to Charlotte LarRowe, a native of Wheeler, Steuben County, New York, a daughter of Albutius and Jeannette (Auls) LarRowe, who were representatives of the oldest families of that county, the former a native of New Jersey and the latter of North Carolina. Mr.

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and Mrs. Rosenkrans are members of the Congregational church. In politics he is now independent, but was formerly a Whig and later a Republican.



M II. BRINTON, proprietor of the Keystone stock farm, which is located a half mile west of Ellsworth, is one of the leading citizens of Hamilton County. He is a native of Allegheny County, Pennsylvania, born September 16, 1856, a son of S. M. and Mary (McGrew) Brinton, natives of Pennsylvania, his father of Chester and his mother of Westmoreland County. His father entered land in Scott Township, Hamilton County, Iowa, in 1856, 1,800 acres of which are still in the possession of the family. Three dwellings are on the land and other valuable improvements, a large portion of the land being used for pasture and meadow land. The father died in April, 1883. He was a good business man and owned a large amount of property both in Pennsylvania and Iowa. The mother still lives in Washington County, Pennsylvania. They had a family of five children, M. II. being the youngest son. The Brinton family are the largest tax payers in Hamilton County. Their pasture land will rival the famous blue grass pastures of Kentucky. On the Keystone farm may be found some of the best short-horn and Hereford cattle in the State. M. II. Brinton was given good educational advantages, and graduated from the Jefferson College in Pennsylvania in 1879. He then remained at home and assisted his father until after the latter's death, and in 1884 came to Hamilton County and located at Ellsworth, where he has since been actively identified with its business interests. In addition to his large stock business Mr.

1843; he died at Clarinda, Iowa, on or about the 23d of January, 1902. The family moved to Palmyra, Wisconsin, in his boyhood. In 1862 he joined the 24th Wisconsin Infantry as a private, but was soon mustered out to accept a commission in the 37th Infantry of that State. He saw hard service, participating in many battles. He was wounded at Stone River. Transferred to the eastern army he was present at the blowing up of the mine at Petersburg, where he was made a prisoner. He was confined some eight months in southern prisons. After his muster-out he attended college and later studied law at Ann Arbor, Michigan. He settled in Boone, Iowa, in 1867, where he remained until his last illness during which he was taken to the hospital at Clarinda. He was elected to the Iowa House of Representatives in 1881, serving in that body the next winter. He was nominated for Congress, to succeed Ex-Gov. Carpenter in 1882. He served three terms in the House of Representatives, after which he held the position of sergeant-at-arms of that body during one or two terms. He was also elected city attorney of Boone. Maj. Holmes made an excellent record as a soldier, citizen, state legislator, and congressman. His death called forth many tributes of respect from the Iowa press.

DANIEL CAMPBELL was born in Ashland Co., O., April 13, 1823; he died in Chelan, Washington, February 3, 1902. His boyhood was passed on a farm, where he received only a limited education, but his natural force and ability made him a leader wherever he lived. He early took an interest in politics, and in 1856 was a candidate for sheriff in Ashland county. In 1861 he moved to Illinois, and became an ardent supporter of Stephen A. Douglas. In 1863 he removed from Illinois to Iowa and settled near Mt. Pleasant. In 1879 he was a candidate for governor on the greenback ticket; in 1880 he ran for Congress, in the Second District, on the same ticket. He then moved to Blencoe, Monroe county, where he continued to take an active part in politics and was elected to the House of Representatives of the 20th General Assembly, where he served with distinction. In 1883 he was a candidate for State treasurer on the greenback ticket. He was again elected to the legislature and took a prominent part as a democratic member in the 24th General Assembly. He ran again for Congress in the Eleventh District, but was defeated. This closed his political career and he soon removed to Washington, where a son was living. There were few better known politicians at one time in Iowa than "Honest Dan," as he was familiarly called.

SELIM B. ROSENKRANS was born in Steuben county, N. Y., April 27, 1824; he died at Perry, Iowa, January 7, 1902. Mr. Rosenkrans came to Iowa in 1856 and settled in Webster City, where he resided until two or three years before his death, when he removed to Perry. In 1857 he was chosen clerk of the courts of Webster county, which then embraced the present territory of Webster and Hamilton counties. He was elected to the House of Representatives of the State Legislature in 1859, serving in the regular session of 1860 and the extra war session of 1861. Sometime after the breaking out of the war he was appointed drafting commissioner by Gov. Kirkwood, holding the position until the close of hostilities. He was once elected mayor of Webster City and served several terms as councilman. He was one of the original members of the Congregational church of Webster City and was widely known throughout that organization. As a citizen he was active, enterprising, and public spirited, always enthusiastic in promoting the interests of his town and county.

DR. EPHRAIM M. REYNOLDS was born in Wayne county, Ind., in 1843; he died in Centerville, Iowa, January 8, 1902. He came to Appanoose

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
