Roosevelt off for the South and West.

President Roosevelt left Washington Monday morning on a two months' trip to the west and southwest. The first object of the trip is the reunion of his rough riders regiment of the Spanish war at San Antonio, Texas, next Friday. There will be a number of brief stops en route to San Antonio, where the president will make addresses. Leaving San Antonio there will be a brief address at Fort Worth, which will terminate the public part of the trip, following which the president is to be hunting in the Panhandle of Texas and later in Colorado.

Arrangements have been made whereby the president will keep in touch with public affairs both during his railroad ride and while hunting, so that he will be enabled to pass on all matters requiring his attention. The president will be accompanied by Secretary Loeb, Dr. Alexander Lambert, General S. M. B. Young, Lieutenant Rescue, M. A. Latta, J. L. McGrew and stenographers and representatives of newspaper associations.

The first stop will be made at Louisville, Ky., Tuesday morning. The president and party will pass in procession through Louisville and the president will make an address. The train will pass through St. Louis Tuesday night and take the Missouri, Kansas & Texas road for San Antonio. Wednesday evening Dallas will be reached, and after a public address the president will attend a dinner.

A speech on Thursday April 6, the president will speak briefly. He will reach Austin Thursday afternoon, address the joint session of the legislature at the capitol, and later speak to the public on the law of the capitol.

OLD SETTLER GONE.

Hon. Hartley Bracewell, one of the Pioneer Citizens of Wayne County Passed Away Tuesday.

Was A Good Man.

The subject of this sketch, Hon. Hartley Bracewell, died at the home of his son, Broughton Bracewell, on Tuesday the 4th day of the present month. Mr. Bracewell was born in Lancashire, England, March 3, 1822. He came to America in May, 1849, and settled in Green county, Illinois, where he continued to reside until October, 1854 when he moved to Wayne county, Iowa, locating on a farm in Warren township. He resided there until 1868 when he moved to Corydon, Iowa.

On account of ill health he spent a portion of each year for several years past in Southern California.

July 8, 1844, he was married to Miss Margaret Broughton. She died at the family home in Corydon on September 21, 1891.

For a number of years in his later life he was cashier of the Wayne County Bank. Under his management the bank was very successful. From his early life he was a member of the Masonic Order.

In politics Mr. Bracewell always affiliated with the Democrat party. He represented Wayne county in the Eighth and Ninth General Assemblies of Iowa.

For half a century he was one of the most public spirited and successful citizens of this county. During all the years of his residence here he ever did his full share towards the up-building of the community in which he lived. In church and in all religious matters he cheerfully assisted with a liberal hand. In all things pertaining to the public welfare and progress he never failed to do his full share towards their promotion. The next year after he immigrated to America he entered the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and although he never devoted his whole time to the ministry, he very frequently for many years filled the pulpit and was always recognized as a thoughtful, able and eloquent minister. His mental endowments were of the highest order, and his mind was active and his judgment always well balanced. Of the leading characteristics of his life were sincerity of purpose and the moral convictions upon which he acted. Ever firm in his convictions, yet never censorious and intolerant toward those who differed from him, he conceded to them the same independence of thought and action that he exercised himself.

Mr. Bracewell was a modest, unassuming, and faithful man and citizen. He was ever ready and willing to perform with zeal and fidelity the duties that fell across his pathway in life. He was always active, industrious and diligent in all his undertakings in business affairs. In all his dealings he was prompt, upright, honorable and honest. Thus pursuing his journey through a life of more than eighty-three years he always deserved and had the esteem and confidence of all who knew him. Those who knew him best respected him most.

His kind and courteous treatment to all persons and at all times was a prominent feature of his life.

He was a firm believer in the immortality of the soul and in the undying faith of the Christian. He had full faith that when death should come to him that he would pass to eternal life—to immortality.

We live, we pass from this life. After a long life Mr. Bracewell has gone from among us.
