This community was thrown into deep sorrow again on Saturday by the death of Elder C. J. Jackson, which occurred at 3:30 p.m. at the residence, one mile north of Rose Hill, March 3, 1900. The deceased was born in Union county, Indiana, December 2, 1820; was the son of Joseph and Lydia Jackson. His parents were natives of North Carolina but removed to Indiana in 1817. His mother died February 8, 1841, and his father died July 20, 1851, at the old home in Indiana. The subject of this sketch removed from Indiana to Des Moines county, Iowa, November 14, 1842, and made that his home until 1864, when he came to White Oak township, this county, where he has resided until a few years ago he built a fine home just over the line in Monroe township on the north side of his farm. C. J. Jackson was married to Eliza Hood. By this union there were eleven children, seven of whom are still living, namely: Jennie, Belle, Frank, John, William, Mary and Allie. Mrs. Eliza (Hood) Jackson died March 23, 1883, leaving that excellent record to be cherished by the family and friends of a life spent in the service of the Christ. On January 24, 1884, Mr. Jackson was again married to Miss Parthenia Gilchrist, of Oskaloosa, and to them was born one son, Harry D., on December 12, 1886. Mr. Jackson had been a member of and a teacher in the Church of Christ for forty years, and always held up the Christ in such a way as to be felt in the community in which he lived. He had done a great deal of good in former years by teaching and preaching the gospel of Christ. He had been an elder in the Church of Christ for nearly half a century and gave his whole life, as it were, to the service of the Master. In politics he was an ardent republican and held many offices of trust at the hands of his party, serving in the state legislature as a member from Des Moines county in '61-62 and in the special called session of '63. He has been a member of the board of supervisors of Mahaska county two terms, and held township offices of minor importance, and has always been looked to as a man to give good and safe counsel. About a year ago he was stricken down with paralysis, and since that time has been in very poor health. He was taken violently worse the middle of last week, having had the second stroke of paralysis about one month ago. Through all this ordeal of affliction he was very patient, bearing all with that Christian fortitude that always marks the life of those who put their trust in the Lord. The funeral was held from the family residence on Monday at 1:30 p. m., conducted by Rev. W. T. Fisher, of ... etery, one-half mile west of town. The pall bearers were L. Jensen, A. W. Hollingsworth, G. Stringfellow.

Biographical Sketch of Edwin Markham.

[Read by Mr. Louis A. Coburn, at the "Fortnightly Club" of Chadron, Neb., at its last meeting in February.]

We are familiar with the three means by which greatness is attained —by birth, by achievement, or by the bestowal of our fellow men. The subject of this sketch, like most of the men of our country who have risen to a high place in any department of life, has earned renown, not by birth, but by doing something, and doing it so well as to receive the plaudits so justly bestowed upon him.

Charles Edwin Markham, or Edwin Markham, as we know him, comes of an old family, descending on the paternal side from Col. Wm. Markham, first cousin and secretary to Wm. Penn. His mother, Elizabeth Winchell Markham, traces her lineage back to Robert Winchelsea, Archbishop of Canterbury, in 1292. Our own country is so new that these dates seem very remote to us, but is it not apparent that we too are shaking off our swaddling clothes, when we find a man whose years have nearly reached the half century mark, born west of the Rocky mountains?

Mr. Markham's parents were among those pioneers who undertook the long journey from their home in Michigan across scorching plain and over snow clad mountain to far away Oregon. Later I became a farmer and behind the plow, turning up the rich loam of the foot-hills and preparing it for the harvest. Money that I
