

DIED.—On Thursday morning at 1 o'clock, at his residence in Nevada, Hon. **Thomas Clifton McCall.** Mr. McCall was a native of Ross County Ohio, being born on Sept. 4, 1827. In 1836 the family moved to Fulton County, Ill., and he came to Polk County in 1846, where he taught school for the time, afterwards going into the real estate in which business he continued up to the time of his death. In 1861 he was elected to the lower house of the State Legislature, as he was again in 1881 and 1883, and to the Senate at the last election and is the present Senator from this district comprising the counties of Boone and Story. In 1861 he went into the service at the call of his country and was made quartermaster of the 32nd Iowa Infantry and was afterwards promoted to the rank of Captain by President Lincoln and served as such until the close of the war in 1865. He was a member of the I. O. O. F. and G. A. R. orders and was held in high esteem by them as a member. He has been a respected member of the Presbyterian Church for nearly forty years being an elder in the same for near thirty years. He has been married three times, the present wife being Miss Clara Kennedy, of Carroll County, Ohio, who survive to mourn his loss. Several grown up children are now here to be present at the obsequies today.

The funeral service will be held at three p. m., today from his late residence in this city, the funeral services being under the directions of the I. O. O. F. order, and the sermon by Rev. Isaiah Reed, of Des Moines.

Mr. McCall has been so long a resident of this city and stood so high in the consideration of the public both in public and private that all comments at this time are superfluous. Suffice it that a good man has been called and gone to that realm above, and one who will be greatly missed by all with whom he has had dealings or business.

On the 20th of September, 1831, Mr. Hawley was united in wedlock to Miss Juliet Jones, of New York, by whom he had three children, two sons and a daughter. The eldest son is now dead.

The following extract from a paper published at his old home in Lyons, New York, gives an account of his death, and also the estimation in which he was held by his fellow-men:

COUNCIL CHAMBER, OTTUMWA, IOWA, October 26, 1872.

At a special meeting of council, held on Saturday evening, the 6th of October the following resolutions were introduced by the special committee, Messrs. Ballingall, Blake and Inskip, appointed at the last meeting of council to furnish resolutions on occasion of the death of James Hawley. Mr. Ballingall took occasion to make some appropriate remarks concerning the life and character of the deceased, after which the resolutions were adopted by the unanimous vote of the council:

WHEREAS, Intelligence has reached our city that our fellow-townsmen, James Hawley, died at Salt Lake City on the 21st, therefore,

Resolved, By the council of the city of Ottumwa, that in the sudden death of our esteemed fellow-citizen and former mayor, James Hawley, the city has lost one of its most enterprising and honored citizens, who for twenty-five years past has been prominently identified with its history and best interests; that while mayor of the city he discharged his duty faithfully and well, and, whether acting in official or private capacity, was ever actuated by the highest considerations of justice, honor and truth.

Resolved, That for ourselves, and in behalf of the people of the city, we tender to the family and friends of the deceased our sympathy in their severe and sudden bereavement, and mingle our sorrow with theirs.

Resolved, That these resolutions be spread upon the records of the city, and that a copy be furnished the family of the deceased and also to the several city papers.

The subject of the foregoing resolutions was for some time a popular merchant at Red Creek, in this county.

Thirty-three years ago he was elected by the whigs of this county to the office of clerk of the county, the duties of which he discharged with ability for the term of three years. He was a candidate for reelection, but failed for the reason that the democratic party was in the majority in the county. He ran considerably ahead of his ticket, and was defeated by less than a hundred majority. After closing his business here, and about the year 1844, he moved to the State of Ohio, afterward to Kentucky, and finally, in the year 1848, he took up his residence at Ottumwa, in the State of Iowa, where he spent the remainder of his life. Ottumwa, now a city of some seven thousand inhabitants, was then a mere hamlet. Here he at first pursued the business of a hotel-keeper and a merchant, and later that of a merchant only, in all which he was quite successful. He was for some time president of the First National Bank of Ottumwa; and retired from business a few years since.

Mr. Hawley was not a man of ponderous intellect, but possessed what was more valuable, a well balanced mind. He was a persevering, attentive, well judging, honest business man, and of course was successful. He was an intelligent, high-minded, liberal, patriotic citizen. In his deportment he was dignified, modest, pleasant and kind. In his domestic relations he was all that a husband and father should be, and enjoyed the affections of wife and children as such husbands and fathers are entitled to. He leaves a widow, two sons, a daughter and several grandchildren to mourn his departure. He died on the 21st of October last, at Salt Lake City, while on his way with his wife and eldest son to California to spend the winter. His funeral was attended at Ottumwa, on the 30th of October, by a large concourse of people. Few have died leaving a purer name or a larger circle of friends.

THOMAS C. McCALL,

NEVADA.

THOMAS CLIFTON McCALL, for more than thirty years a resident of Iowa, is of revolutionary stock, both grandsires participating in that war. His father was wounded in the second war with England, in the battle of McQuaggy, about the time of Hall's surrender. Thomas C. was a son of Samuel W. McCall and Ann Clifton, residing in Twin township, Ross county, Ohio, at the time of the son's birth, on the 4th of September, 1827. His father was a farmer, in rather delicate health, and was in office much of the time, being sheriff of Ross county some time and a justice of the peace many years. About 1836 the family moved to Canton, Fulton county, Illinois, where the subject of this notice had solid experience in agriculture, being obliged to work very hard.

He attended a school taught by his father two winters, and under that parent's instruction at home received knowledge sufficient to enable him to teach.

In the spring of 1846, in his nineteenth year, Mr. McCall came to Iowa, with an older brother, and taught the first school ever kept east of Des Moines, in Polk county. Teaching and farming were his

occupations until twenty-three years of age, when he started in trade, being the pioneer merchant at Rising Sun, and subsequently following the same business at Des Moines in company with Mr. W. W. Moore. At twenty-seven he went into the real-estate business in the same city, removing to Nevada in 1858, still following the same occupation.

In 1861 Mr. McCall was elected to the lower house of the general assembly, and served in the regular and extra sessions of 1862. In the interim he enlisted in the service of his country, going to the front in the autumn of 1862 as quartermaster of the 32d Iowa Infantry, with the commission of lieutenant. The regiment was in the sixteenth army corps, General A. J. Smith, commander, and he was with it in the famous Meridian and Red river expeditions.

At the end of about eighteen months, on the 22d of March, 1864, he received from President Lincoln the appointment of assistant quartermaster of volunteers, with the rank of captain, and in that capacity served until the 27th of November, 1865. He had millions of property pass through his hands, and

... with a full discharge, without the loss of a dollar to the government or himself. He went into the service not to enrich himself, but to aid in saving the country, and left a record as clean as his motives were pure.

Politically, Captain McCall is a republican, with free-soil, whig antecedents, and has usually been quite active. He has attended nearly all the congressional and state conventions of his party since settling in Nevada; has once been on the state central committee, and chairman of the county committee twice. He is a man of much influence in politics in the central part of the state.

In Odd-Fellowship he is also prominent, and has twice been a representative to the Grand Lodge of the state.

He has been a member of the Presbyterian church for twenty-four years, and an elder of the Nevada body the last half of that period. He is a man whose purity of motives and of life secure him great respect.

Captain McCall has had three wives, the first being Miss Sarah Garrett, of Polk county; married on the 1st of March, 1849. She had four children, and died on the 19th of January, 1855. Only one of her children, John A. McCall, attorney, of Des Moines, is

now living. His second wife was Miss Mary A. Boynton, of Marion, Linn county; married on the 28th of October, 1858, and dying on the 4th of August, 1875, leaving three children, four preceding her to the land of spirits. His present wife was Miss Clara Kennedy, of Carrollton, Ohio; married on the 19th of October, 1876. She has one child.

Captain McCall came into Iowa driving an ox team, with no capital but a resolute will and a small fund of learning acquired in the home circle, and by his own application, energies and business talents has become one of the wealthiest men in the county. Two years after he came to Iowa, his father, who was not in good health, joined his sons, who had provided him a home in Polk county, where he died, and where the step-mother of Captain McCall still resides.

The subject of this sketch gave his entire earnings to the family until after he became of age, all of his accumulations having been made since he was twenty-three years old. He has a great deal of village property, and at least twenty-four hundred acres of land in Story county, fourteen hundred acres of it under good improvement. He has always been a fair, straightforward dealer, patient and obliging, and for integrity, no man's character in the county stands better.

HON. WILLIAM H. SEEVERS,

OSKALOOSA.

WILLIAM HENRY SEEVERS, the junior member of the supreme bench of Iowa, is a native of Shenandoah county, Virginia, and dates his birth on the 8th of April, 1822. His grandfather, Henry Seevers, settled in the State of Pennsylvania. James Seevers, the father of William H., was born in Virginia, and was a private in the war of 1812-15. He was a general business man, and is now, at the age of eighty-five years, living with his son. The Seevers family have some Huguenot blood in their veins. The wife of James Seevers was Rebecca Wilkins, who died in 1875.

The subject of this sketch spent his boyhood near Winchester, Virginia, farming, attending a common and select school, and clerking in a country store. He commenced reading law in his native state in 1843; removed to Oskaloosa, Iowa, the next year, where he finished reading; was admitted to the bar in 1846, and has since attended steadily to his pro-

fession, except when serving his constituents in some other capacity.

He was elected district attorney in 1848 and served one term; was elected judge of the third judicial district in 1852; served nearly five years in all, and then resigned; was a member of the lower house of the general assembly at the session in 1858, the first session held at Des Moines, and again in the session of 1876, and resigned in February of the latter year to accept an appointment to the supreme bench, serving as chief justice the rest of that year. In the autumn of the same year he was elected by the people, and hence is now the junior member of the supreme bench. Before he went on the bench he was regarded as one of the most adroit and best read practitioners in the state. His knowledge of the practice of the law is immense. He was the editor of the code in 1873. His opinions are very high authority with the bar of Iowa.

On the 28th of December, 1898, Mr. Larson was united in marriage to Miss Ella Walker, a daughter of Torkel Walker, a native of Norway, who came to America when a young man and passed thirty-three years of his life in Polk and Story counties. He is a carpenter by trade but has also successfully engaged in farming and is now living in Slater. Unto Mr. and Mrs. Larson three children have been born: Cecil Anselm, Leslie Truman and Miriam Lucile.

Mr. Larson gives his adherence to the republican party and his voice is often heard in its councils in his part of the county. He has served many times as a member of the town council and also for eight or ten years as mayor of the town, being recognized as one of the most efficient executive officers the town has known. He is a valued member of Slater Lodge, No. 384, I. O. O. F., and he and his wife are connected with the Rebekahs and the Lutheran church. He is a staunch friend of education and always lends his aid to the public schools. As a citizen he is patriotic, prompt and true to every obligation and as a man he is held in the highest honor and esteem by all classes.

CAPTAIN THOMAS CLIFTON McCALL.

For many years one of the most distinguished citizens of Story county, Captain Thomas Clifton McCall, now deceased, gained a reputation for enterprise, sound judgment and integrity which has been accorded few men in this part of the state. In both private and public affairs he was eminently successful, gaining a fortune and at the same time proving by his useful and honorable life a constant source of inspiration to those with whom he was associated.

He was born in Ross county, Ohio, September 4, 1827, a son of Samuel W. and Ann (Clifton) McCall. The father was born in Kentucky in 1792 and the mother in Ross county, Ohio, in 1795. In his early manhood Samuel W. McCall was a soldier in the war of 1812 and was wounded at the battle of Maguauga, which occurred about the time of Hull's surrender. He came to Iowa and located in Polk county, where he died in 1864, his wife having passed away in Ross county, Ohio, in 1833. He was a son of Samuel McCall, who was born about 1750 in Maryland and was a soldier in the Revolutionary war. He was drowned in Licking river, Kentucky, in 1795. Our subject's maternal grandfather, Thomas Clifton, who was born in South Carolina about 1740, fought under General Nathaniel Greene in the war for independence and later settled in Ross county, Ohio, where he died about 1830.

In 1836 Thomas Clifton McCall came with his father to Burlington, Iowa, where they remained during the summer, removing in the fall to Fulton county, Illinois, where he lived on a farm for ten years. At the

age of nineteen he began teaching, having charge of the first school that was opened east of the Des Moines river in Polk county. After a short experience as a schoolmaster he embarked in the mercantile business at Lafayette, Polk county, in partnership with A. Y. Hull, continuing for three years, when he became the pioneer merchant of Rising Sun, in the same county. From the beginning he had shown a decided ability in business affairs and in 1855 he entered the real-estate business at Des Moines, coming to Nevada three years later, where he dealt quite extensively in land for many years, becoming the owner of about three thousand acres in Story county. He was a man of quick discernment and wide observation and as time passed he became remarkably proficient in knowledge concerning current events, especially those of public and political interest. In 1861 he was chosen to represent Story county in the state legislature and served in the regular and special sessions of that year and also in 1862, this being a period of unusual importance on account of the Civil war.

In October, 1862, Mr. McCall proffered his services to the government and was sent to the front as quartermaster of the Thirty-second Iowa Infantry with the commission of lieutenant and continued with his regiment in the field. He was appointed by President Lincoln assistant quartermaster of volunteers with the rank of captain, March 22, 1864, and served in that capacity until November 27, 1865, when he received his honorable discharge. He performed the arduous duties devolving upon him during these trying years of the war with absolute fidelity and his army record was a source of just pride to himself and is a splendid heritage for posterity. After resuming peaceful pursuits he was, in 1881, again sent to the legislature from Story county, being reelected in 1883, and was state senator, representing Boone and Story counties in 1892 at the time of his death. He was one of the most active and efficient representatives that this county has ever sent to the general assembly and by his efforts and personal influence accomplished much work that has been of special benefit to the county and state.

Captain McCall was three times married. By his first marriage he had one son, John A., who is now practicing law at Des Moines. His second wife was Mary A. Boynton and by this union three children were born: Minnie Ellen, now Mrs. A. C. Cronenwett, of Monrovia, California; Fred C., a record of whom appears elsewhere in this work; and Edward M., a practicing attorney of Nevada. The third wife of Captain McCall bore the maiden name of Clara Kennedy. She is now living in Nevada but the son born of this union died at the age of five years.

Captain McCall passed away August 11, 1892, being then sixty-five years of age and an acknowledged leader in the business and financial circles of Story county. He early realizes the value of industry and perseverance and his life was a remarkable exemplification of those principles carried to a legitimate conclusion. He was generous in his judgment and friendly toward every cause calculated to advance the public interest and in

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numberless ways contributed to the welfare of his fellowmen. For almost fifty years he was a member of the Presbyterian church and was seldom absent from religious service when circumstances made it possible for him to attend. He became an Odd Fellow in 1853, joining the order at Des Moines and representing it a number of times in the Grand Lodge of the state. He was also a valued member of the Grand Army of the Republic and was one of the best friends the old soldiers of Story county have known. The death of Mr. McCall deprived the community of one of its most loved and respected citizens, one who was eminently successful in his efforts to make the world better and whose memory will long be revered by those who knew him.

CLARK CHAMBERS.

Among the business men of Collins, Clark Chambers occupies an honorable place, having won his way through many obstacles. Today he is recognized as one of the thoroughly substantial citizens of the community and has the satisfaction of knowing that he has gained his present position through his own unremitting diligence and sound judgment. He was born near Decatur, Illinois, November 15, 1873, a son of James A. and Mary (Clark) Chambers. The parents were both born in Ohio and were married in that state, subsequently removing to Illinois. The mother passed away in 1878 and the father has since been twice married. His present wife was Miss Caroline Smith, whom he married in Guernsey county, Ohio, and they are now living upon a farm in Tuscarawas county, that state.

At fifteen years of age Clark Chambers began his battle with the world. Going to Bloomington, Illinois, he worked as a farm laborer for a year and then returned to Ohio, where he was employed for two years in a sawmill. Once more starting westward, he reached Collins, Iowa, where for four years and four months he was employed by Charles Fish, an extensive stock feeder of this section. Not having seen enough of the world, Mr. Chambers decided to visit the great west and accordingly he took a trip through the Dakotas, Idaho, Utah and the Pacific northwest, working at various occupations as opportunity presented. He was absent for two years and in February, 1902, returned to Collins, with a mind richly supplied with experience which has been to him of inestimable value. Soon after reaching Collins he became connected with the meat and provision business, with which he has ever since been identified, being now a member of the firm of George W. Baldwin & Company, general merchants, also handling meat and provisions upon a large scale.

On the 20th of May, 1902, Mr. Chambers was united in marriage to Miss Mary Wood, of Des Moines, and by this union five children have been

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
