He moved with his parents to Athens County, Ohio in October 1824.

In July 1841 the family moved to Lee County, Iowa where he farmed and raised livestock on a farm near Fort Madison.

After serving in the legislature, he moved to Kansas in 1866 and located on a farm of 240 acres, an orchard of apples, peaches and cherry trees in Johnson County.

In the fall of 1871 he was elected to serve in the Kansas Legislature for 2 terms.

His wife, Sarah, died 25 Nov 1883. Eleven years later in 1894 he sold his farm and went to Oklahoma where he lived for 3 years.

He then returned to Johnson County, Kansas on his farm near Cedar Junction.

After a long illness he died at the home of his son, William, in Kansas City.

He served in the Kansas legislature from Johnson County. He was also a Johnson County commissioner.

In his youth in Ohio he rolled logs in the Ohio forests, broke the prairie into land that could be farmed.

He learned the cooper trade and the carpenter trade in his youth also.

An Old Johnson County Citizen Gone.

The funeral services of Thomas G. Stephenson were held in the Christian church Sabbath morning. Scripture reading and prayer by the pastor, Rev. Luther Moore, and Judge Burris, a life long friend of the deceased, delivered an address recounting many excellent traits of character and paying the dead man a merited tribute.

A friend hands the Tribute the following obituary:

Thomas G. Stephenson was born in Romney, Hampshire county, West Virginia, Feb. 15, 1823, and when twenty months old moved with his parents to Athens county, Ohio, where he lived until 1841. In the early part of that year the family moved to Lee county, Iowa, and settled on a farm near E. Madison, where he was married to Sarah D. Brown on Sept. 6, 1849.

To this union were born six children and when the youngest was near three years of age, he came with his family to Monticello township, Johnson county, Kansas, where he bought from an Indian the farm on which he settled May 8, 1866.

On November 25, 1883, his wife died and eleven years later he sold his farm and went to Oklahoma where he resided about three years, then returned to this county and settled on his present farm near Cedar Junction. After a lingering illness he died at the home of his son, William, in Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 22, 1907.

He is survived by five children, the eldest son, George, having died at Glamis, Calif., July 14, 1888. His daughters are Mrs. G. L. Collins and Mrs. O. E. Brown, of the old neighborhood, Mrs. Chas. Coddington, of Baldwin, Kansas, and Mrs. J. B.

Moore, of Kansas City, Mo. His son William also resides.

Like many other boys in those pioneer days when he was young, he was deprived of the advantages of an education at school, but being naturally intelligent and observing and having a remarkable memory, he acquired a store of knowledge that has always been a great comfort and benefit to his family.

While living in Iowa he served two terms in the Legislature in which position he gained distinction as an orator and statesman.

During the Civil war he was commissioned Lieutenant Colonel, but owing to an accident caused by his horse falling on him and crushing his knee, he was unable to fill the position.

After coming to Kansas he served one term as representative from Johnson county, in the Legislature, and was five years county commissioner, serving four years as chairman of that body, and, with the assistance of his associates, Thomas Pierce and Thomas Douglas, known as "The board of the three Toms," he effected a compromise of all railroads bonded indebtedness of Johnson county, reducing the sum of \$41,800 to \$28,000.

He was a charter member of the Clear Creek Grange, always a willing and untiring worker.

He was a pioneer in three different states; a log roller in the forests of Ohio in his youth, transforming the raw prairies of Iowa into productive fields; in his young manhood; performing a like service with the Indian lands of Johnson county in his middle age; his school days were confined to narrow limits. He yet found time and opportunity to master the cooper's and carpenter's trades, and his seemed to be one of those rare and happy mental organizations that seems to grasp nearly all knowledge of any

He was "Uncle Tom" to all who knew him—aside from his own family, where he was "father" in the broadest sense of the title—and his remarkable memory and seemingly inexhaustible fund of anecdote and humor captivated the attention and admiration of young and old alike.

In illustration of this we offer an extract from a letter recently received from a nephew: "The name of Uncle Tom meant something to me. To me he was famous—somewhere next to the President. He had been everywhere; seen everything, and he could sit from sunrise to sunset telling funny stories and never tell the same one twice. His coming meant a jolly time to me when a 'fellow' could have more fun in a week than could be ordinarily crammed into a whole year.

"I think it means something to be even a 'kid's' ideal of the fun and sunshine and good cheer of the world.

"Please don't forget, even when you are blue and discouraged, that, wherever you have gone you've many a one laugh and have a good time and made your visit stand out in their memory as the very best time they ever had."

During his protracted illness his only murmurings or regrets were expressed, not for himself, but in behalf of his loved ones, who were his constant watchers and attendants.

How to make Block System Safe.

In a secret effort to put to proof the carelessness and efficiency of its engineers and train crews, the Northwestern railway last year made a series of "surprise tests," resulting in the main agreeably to the best expectations. It was demonstrated that out of 1,625 tests of faithfulness in obeying the block signals there was not a single instance of failure to comply with the regulations. With respect to 1,621 tests of other descriptions there were only sixteen cases where the rules were not absolutely obeyed, a failure of only 1 per cent. As a result of these failures ten engineers were summarily discharged and the other offenders were severely reprimanded. They were told in plain language that it was no fault of theirs that an accident had not occurred, and that they had done every-thing in their power to contribute to such accident. This rigorous inspection and the certainty of swift punishment have not failed to bring the employes to an appreciation of their duty, and to reduce to a minimum the chances of a railway horror.

The point of this demonstration, apart from its application to one system, is that what has been accomplished by the Northwestern may be as easily brought about by any railway in the country. It shows with sufficient clearness that a rigorous and effective discipline is all that is necessary to the elimination of a too frequent cause of peril, and that it lies within the power of railway officials to make the block system a safeguard against terrible disasters

Hon. Thomas G. Stephenson, farmer, Post Office: Cedar Junction, Kansas, was born in Hampshire County, Virginia, February 15, 1823, and removed with his parents to Athens County, Ohio, in October 1824.

In July 1841, he removed to Lee County, Iowa, where he followed farming and stock raising.

He was for two years County Commissioner of that county and in the fall of 1861 was elected Representative to the State Legislature and served two terms.

He came to Kansas in 1866 and located on his present farm.

He has 240 acres of land, 85 of which is in cultivation.

He has an orchard of about four acres, apple, peach, and cherry trees.

In 1869, he was elected Justice of the Peace and served about four years.

In the fall of 1871, he was elected representative to the State Legislature (in the State of Kansas) for a term of two years and was re-elected in the fall of 1879 for a term of three years.

He was Chairman of the Board continuously for four years and with the assistance of his associates, effected a compromise of all the railroad bonded indebtedness of Johnson company, reducing the same from the sum of \$41,800 to \$28,800.

Mr. Stephenson was married in Denmark, Lee County, Iowa, September 6, 1849, to Miss Sarah D. Brown, daughter of William G. Brown, Esquire.

They have six children: Lucie, Marie, George, Susie, Frankie, and William T.






