



GRANT'S PASS NOTES.--

Mrs. Lucy Allen, an old resident of this county, and of this town for the past two years, drove out to Woodville on Thursday, and while sitting in her buggy, fainted and fell out upon the ground, striking her head, and broke her neck, causing instant death. Mrs. Allen was favorably known, and leaves many friends to mourn her death.

A BEAUTIFUL MONUMENT.--There are many handsome monuments and memorial stones in the Ashland cemetery, but among the most beautiful of all is the one just set up in the family burial lot of Capt. Thos. Smith. The sub-base, or pedestal, is of blue sandstone from the Tolman quarry, and the whole monument above it is of beautiful white Vermont marble. Above the base are the usual fascies for inscriptions, these are surrounded by a pyramidal shaft, and above the capital the monument is completed by a draped urn. Above this, on the north side, is the memorial inscription: "Margaret, wife of Thos. Smith, died Oct. 22, 1874, aged 51 years, 5 months, 12 days." and the lines: "Faith points to hope above the sky, where ransomed spirits never die." Upon the south face is the following yet unfinished memorial: "Capt. Thomas Smith, born in Campbell county, Ky., Sept. 14, 1809." This shows that the Captain is in his 81st year, but he bids fair to prevent the completion of the inscription for a goodly number of years yet. Several of the Captain's old friends, learning that a family monument was being prepared for his lot, requested permission to have the following inscribed upon it, which was placed upon the west face, and signed "by old friends:" "Capt. Thos. Smith crossed the plains in 1849. Located alone in this valley, Nov. 11, 1851, amid hostile Indians, who learned to fear (as we learned to value) his prompt, dauntless, but careful leading of volunteer companies that held at bay the savage foe. May he be remembered by all as a benefactor."

The east face of the monument is left for future record of the family.

Another of the most beautiful monuments in the cemetery is that which marks the resting place of the late Dr. J. H. Chitwood

persecuted lovers had flown. The name of the young lady to the transaction was Miss Letta Wilkinson, whose home is in Reno, Nev., and the young man whom her father and family objected to having her marry is named Applegate. About three weeks or more ago, the young lady left her home in Reno, telling her folks that she was going to take the train to visit relatives or friends at a neighboring place. According to previous arrangements Applegate met her on the train, and the couple proceeded to Truckee, Cal., where they were married. Here, too, they separated, Applegate sending his wife to this county to stay with relatives until he could return to Reno, and prepare for settling down to house-keeping. Meantime the girl's parents had gotten wind of the affair and were decidedly wrathful at their daughter's actions, refusing to allow her own property to be removed from their house, and refusing to make reconciliation. Two weeks ago young Applegate arrived in this county and Saturday, the 24th ult., left with his bride for Reno, where it is to be hoped that the couple may enjoy their wedded life just as if they had secured the parental consent. Miss Wilkinson is a very bright girl of about 18, while Applegate is 21 and said to be a worthy young man in business in Reno.

J. R. Rice, one of the hoodlum terrors of Jacksonville about six years ago, has returned a street Evangelist. His conversation certainly is more remarkable than Saul's and is another illustration of the fact that there is more need of home mission work than there is in foreign fields. He has a fine baritone voice and his singing is highly appreciated.

John A. Love, who has been ill for a number of months past with pulmonary disease, died at his home in this place Saturday last, June 7th, and his remains were followed to their last resting place in the Jacksonville cemetery Sunday afternoon by a large concourse of sorrowing friends.

MEDFORD INDEPENDENT ORDER OF ODD FELLOWS WAS ORGANIZED THE 16th OF JULY 1886. THAT YEAR THEY ESTABLISHED A CEMETERY. PRIOR TO THAT TIME A FEW BURIALS HAD BEEN IN THE VICINITY OF WEST MAIN AND LINCOLN STREETS. THEY WERE TRANSFERRED TO THE NEW CEMETERY THAT ACCOUNTS FOR A FEW EARLIER BURIALS. AN AREA OF 20 ACRES ON A HILLSIDE IN EAST MEDFORD WAS SET ASIDE FOR THE CEMETERY.

IN 1925, G. D. MASON BUILT THE FIRST MAUSOLEUM: ABOUT 1944 MORE WERE ADDED.

FOR 86 YEARS THE I.O.O.F. LODGE OPERATED AND CARED FOR THE UPKEEP AND MAINTENANCE OF 7000 BURIALS. THE LODGE WAS NOT ABLE TO HANDLE THE FINANCIAL BURDEN ANY LONGER. FIRST THEY MET WITH THE CITY OF MEDFORD OFFICIALS AND THEN WITH THE JACKSON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS WHO PROMISED TO SHARE WITH THE OPERATION AND THE UPKEEP OF THE CEMETERY.

IN THIS CEMETERY ARE MANY EARLY MEDFORD CITIZENS AND MANY EARLY PIONEERS. A MOST INTERESTING ARTICLE, WITH PHOTOS, APPEARED IN THE MEDFORD MAIL TRIBUNE 7 SEPTEMBER 1969 TELLING OF THE MANY WHO ARE BURIED HERE.

TO LOCATE EASTWOOD I.O.O.F. CEMETERY, TURN OFF SOUTH RIVERSIDE ON TO 10th STREET AND FOLLOW TO SISKIYOU BOULEVARD. ON YOUR LEFT, JUST BEFORE SISKIYOU CROSSES HIGHLAND DRIVE, A NARROW ROAD LEADS BETWEEN A HOUSE AND BEHIND A STORE TO THE CEMETERY. OR, YOU CAN TURN OFF SOUTH RIVERSIDE AT BARNETT, LEFT ON HIGHLAND DRIVE, THEN LEFT ON SISKIYOU.

TO COMPILE THIS RECORD, SEXTON RECORDS, DEATH RECORDS, THE 1935 D.A.R. RECORDS AND OBITUARIES FROM AREA NEWSPAPERS WERE USED.

they and their one son came across the plains to Rogue River valley in Southern Oregon.

Father Beeson was in many respects an exceptional character. He possessed remarkable mental activity, and had the temperament of the mental pioneer and reformer. He was first a Methodist, then a Universalist, and then a Spiritualist. He was well informed in general history and theology; had great moral courage and followed his convictions conscientiously, even, as was often the case, when they led him into antagonism with the vast majority of his friends and the public generally. He conceived the opinion that the Indians of Southern Oregon were not treated justly by the pioneers, and undertook to right the wrongs in a way which aroused the hostility of nearly, if not quite, every other settler of the region. Ever since then he has been writing and lecturing upon the wrongs of the Indians, and several times in years past has been in council with prominent philanthropists and with members of the Indian bureau at Washington. For some time, as his mind lost its vigor from age, this subject of the Indian question has been a harmless mania of his, and he has been thinking, talking and writing upon that subject constantly. Father Beeson was urgent in presenting his views to the public, and, as stated, often ran counter to public opinion, but he will be remembered by all who knew him as one who tried to live the "Golden Rule," and who was always quick to respond to the appeals of the unfortunate or the afflicted.

BYRON COLE'S FUNERAL.--Yreka Journal Jan. 24.--The remains were brought to Yreka by rail on Saturday, arriving at midnight, and his funeral took place Sunday morning from Masonic Hall, under the auspices of St. John's Lodge, No. 37, of which he was an honored member.

Byron Cole was one of the earliest settlers in this county, having first kept hotel with his brother Rufus at Cole's station, on this side of the Oregon line in California, where he remained until 1856, afterwards removing to Colestin, which at that time was also considered a part of California, a new survey making the

Thursday, June 14, 1894

The dead man was about 57 years old, and had always lived alone on a mining claim, on which he was working. He had not been seen since Monday evening, and Saturday some of the neighbors, thinking perhaps he was sick, went to the cabin and found him lying on the floor. About \$4 in gold dust was found in the cabin. A letter from his father was also found, which stated that he would leave California for Oregon about May 6 with a team, and would arrive in about two months. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of death from natural causes.

Mrs. Mary Miller and her son and daughter returned Tuesday evening from San Francisco, in response to a telegram announcing the dangerous condition of her son Philip. The young man lived one hour after his mother's arrival. He was perfectly conscious and recognized them all, and died in his heartbroken mother's arms.

Philip Miller died from the injuries he received last week at 7:45 p.m. Thursday, June 12th, 1894. One year ago last April, while working as superintendent of the Miller mine, he was crossing a scaffolding, in the mine, which gave way and he fell about 30 feet, striking on the bare bedrock below, his right arm was broken and he sustained other serious injuries that were thought for a long time would prove fatal. He partially recovered, but never regained the full use of his arm, and has been suffering from mental aberrations ever since. He has become quite despondent of late, and his friends felt the deepest concern for him. Just how he met his last fatal accident will probably never be known, but the circumstances could not have been foreseen, hence could not have been avoided. Philip was born in Jacksonville and was generous and noble hearted and was well liked by everybody. The little children, especially, with that free masonry that finds their truest friends and draws them to them, loved him, and followed him whenever he came to town. No more sincere sorrow ever found lodgment in the human heart, than is everywhere expressed at the sad ending of a life born to the highest social conditions and environed by the dearest kindred ties. To the heart of the stricken mother who mourns with unconsolable sorrow the unexpected death of her first born son and to the other relatives, the sympathy of this community is extended. May the sorely tried spirit, freed from the infirmities of Earth life, forever rest in peace.

The funeral takes place tomorrow.

REUNITED IN DEATH.--Geo. S. Walton died at his home in Medford Sunday afternoon, September 1st, at 3:20 o'clock. The old gentleman had been gradually weakening with age for several months and the effects of a recent attack of la grippe left him in a bad condition. Heart troubles and other complications together with worry of his wife's sickness, kept him confined to his house for some days before his death, which came suddenly when arising from his bed Sunday afternoon.

Deceased was born at Bangor, Maine, October 3, 1818. When a young man he removed to Jefferson, Iowa, where he was married in 1849, to the wife who survived him but a few hours. During his residence at Jefferson he served two terms as representative in the Iowa legislature and occupied other prominent positions. In 1874 he removed to Eugene, Oregon, where he was engaged in the mercantile business until 1879, when he removed to Jackson county, locating on a farm near Tolo. Since 1884 he has lived in Medford and most of the time has held the office of Justice of the Peace. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity in good standing and a citizen universally honored.

Mrs. Samantha C. Walton died Monday night a little after 10 o'clock, surviving her husband but a day and a few hours. She had been seriously ill for several days with congestive chills and other complications arising from old age. Deceased was 70 years, 4 months and 22 days old.

The aged couple leave six daughters and several grandchildren surviving. Their children are all married, five live at Missoula and Cour de Alene, Montana, and the sixth in Missouri. One of the daughters, Mrs. Mabel Brous, with her daughter arrived from Missoula a few days ago to attend the bedside of her declining parents. - (Medford Monitor.

The funeral services over the remains of the aged couple were conducted Tuesday, Rev. Eli Fisher officiating at the home, burial services conducted by the Masons.
