SHOTS QUELLED STRIKE RIOT.

Militia Dispersed Sympathizers at Linton, Ind.

LINTON, IND., April 29.—About fifty shots were fired by state militia troops this afternoon in breaking up a demonstration by sympathizers of the girl operators of the New Home Telephone Company, who have been on strike for several days. No one was reported injured.

The demonstration followed a gathering about the telephone building, during which a boy threw a rock. The state troops were ordered to fire, and with their rifles pointed into the air they fired a volley. The crowd was dispersed.

The telephone company tonight bolted the doors and windows of its building; the girls brought here to break up the strike were taken away in the care of some recently discharged soldiers living in this vicinity.

FORM A SOUTH TROOST CLUB.

Property Owners to Seek Improvements for District.

Owners of property lying in a district adjoining Troost Avenue between Fifty-first Street and the Southern city limits met at Rockhurst College, Fifty-third Street and Troost Avenue last night, and formed the South Troost District Improvement Association. The primary object of the organization is to get an extension of the Troost car line from its present terminus at Fifty-fifth Street to the city limits, to have gas mains extended into the district and to seek other improvements necessary to a growing residence district.

Charles A. McNeese was elected president of the association and M. J. Williams, secretary. The next meeting will be held at Rockhurst College the night of May 13.

His industry as a farmer was not such as to bring great returns, and he left his farm and sought official honors as Justice of the Peace and County Judge.

At the election of 1863 Henry C. Vinton was elected Representative. He came from Massachusetts and had friends in Bradford, and came West to grow up with the country. He went into the raising of sheep and erected barns and sheds and stocked his farm with sheep. He was one of those good boys, white haired, light complexion, and lacked what is so necessary to success in a new country, "vim." He was elected for various reasons, and among them was the fact that his friends stood high, and their influence was a power, and this was supplemented with the cry that he would be a representative of the farming interests of the county, especially of the new industry of sheep raising. Then again most of the men who would likely be aspirants were in the army, and all who were in the habit of shaping the politics of the county had left.

He was a good man, but had little force to impress himself upon a legislative body, and he was never heard from, only as a voter, and not making a success of his business he sold out and left.

CHEROKEE CENTER. In east part of section 28, Cherokee Township, in the western part of what is now the city of Cherokee. Platted in 1856. It became a town on paper only.

COULSON. In the center of Diamond Township. Post office, 1893-97.

DE LEON. In section 10, Silver Township. Post office, 1885.

EAST HAMPTON. In southern part of Silver Township. Post office, 1871.

HAZARD. The former name of the present town of Meriden. Post office, 1869-75.

MAPLE. In the northern part of Afton Township, as shown on maps of 1878.

NEW CHEROKEE. The original name of the present city of Cherokee. Platted in 1870.

PILOT ROCK. In section 16, Pilot Township, but soon removed to section 33. Platted in 1859. Post office, 1867-85.

WENDELL. In central part of Willow Township, as shown on maps of 1887.

CHICKASAW COUNTY

BEAVER CITY. A post office, 1859-61, first located on section 4, Dayton Township, three miles west of the northwest corner of the present city of New Hampton.

BRADFORD. In the south part of section 9 and the north part of section 16, Bradford Township, two miles northeast of the present town of Nashua. It was the first county seat of Chickasaw County, holding it from 1854 to 1857. The home of the Little Brown Church. Post office, 1853-94.

BOYD. A prosperous village with railroad station and post office, in southern part of New Hampton Township, started in the early 1880's and abandoned about 1920.

CHICKASAW. In section 21, Chickasaw Township. Platted in 1854 and an important town for several years. Post office, 1855-1903.

CHICKASAW CENTER. The original name of the present city of New Hampton.

CHICKASAW STATION. The original name of the present town of Ionia.

DALE. In the northern part of Utica Township. Post office, 1863.


DAYTON CENTER. In Dayton Township. Post office, 1863.

DEERFIELD. In section 4, Deerfield Township. Post office, 1857-1903.

DRESDEN. In section 1, Richland Township. Post office, 1900-03.

FOREST CITY. A village in the eastern part of Richland Township. It was for a time in 1858 the county seat of the county. Its existence was brief.

GREENWOOD. In the northwestern part of Bradford Township, as shown on maps of 1868 and 1869.
