

Mason and Dixon's line is two hundred forty-four miles in length, being 39 degrees 43 minutes and 26.3 seconds north latitude, forming the boundary between Pennsylvania and Maryland.

For a good many years the owners of the possessions had been disputing the boundary line.

When they came to an agreement and set out a party to survey this line, and settle the dispute.

In 1763 the English proprietors sent Charles Mason and Jeremiah Dixon to complete the survey, and mark the boundary. They placed a large stone every five miles, with Penn's arms on one side and that of Lord Baltimore on the other, and between these, at every mile, a smaller one, with "M" on one side and "B" on the opposite. In the latter part of 1767 they finished this work.

The thirteen original states, those north of Mason and Dixon's line were free states, and those south remained slave, and when the western territory was formed in 1787 it was decided that the states that would be made out of this region, should be free. Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana, were afterwards admitted to the union as free states.

In speaking of slavery, that part of the territory that was free, was spoken of as "north of Mason and Dixon's Line," and the slave part as "south of Mason and Dixon's line."

At the time of the admission of Maine to Missouri, congress passed the Compromise, which bill fixed the line 36 degrees 30 minutes as the dividing line between the slave and free territories that might be formed and set off after that date. This law was repealed by the passage of the Kansas and Nebraska bill.

Penn on the other those of Lord Baltimore. Each intermediate mile is marked by smaller stones, with a P on one side and an M on the other. The line was looked over in 1849 and found to be correct. This line should be distinguished from that of 36 degrees 30 minutes N. Lat., which is the most northern boundary of states that were allowed to have slaves.

OBITUARY.

Something of the Life of Jacob Siberell, Once a Member of the Legislature and a Good Man.

Jacob Siberell died at his home on Burrus street, at 2 o'clock Sunday morning with kidney trouble, after a short illness. He was buried at Blakesburg Wednesday, Dec. 5th, the services being conducted by Rev. A. F. Sanderson, of the Christian church of this city, assisted by Rev. W. R. Jones, of Adams township. Hon. Jacob Siberell, (for the deceased was at one time a member of the general assembly,) was born Sep. 21st, 1823 in Pope township, Ross county, Ohio. He walked to school every day when a young man to take advantage of the privileges of the district school and as a result got a good common education. He moved in 1855 to Iowa and settled in Des Moines township, Wapello county, and has never since removed from this locality. He was married November, '56, to Elizabeth Rose, who died in 1874. He remained at his, at that time, home in Adams township until '91

when he removed to South Ottumwa, Iowa, where he lived at the time of his death. He was a good man and an honored citizen and to those who knew him and to those who are left to mourn his loss, there is a great consolation in the knowledge that not only was his life without those things which grieve, but was also right in the accomplishment of acts which made the world better.

Politically, Mr. Siberell was a Whig until the breaking up of that party, and then he took an active part in the organization of the republican party in this county, co-operating with such men as O. C. and R. H. Warden, James W. Norris, J. W. Dixon and Paris Caldwell. He was elected in 1873 to the 15th general assembly house of representatives and has held many minor offices, especially in educational matters, in which he took great interest.

He leaves two sons, Horace, born Nov. 8, 1857, now pastor of the Christian church at Paducah, Kentucky, and Sumner, born May 9, 1859, who is county attorney.
