A GOOD MAN GONE!

The death of Hon. L. D. Sherman, of Ireton, last Friday will bring gloom to the hearts of a good many in this county. Mr. Sherman was in the 63th year of his life, his widow surviving him. The funeral occurred Sunday, under Masonic auspices and is said to have been the largest and most imposing ever witnessed in the county.

Mr. Sherman served one term in the state legislature with much credit to himself and the county, besides holding many other positions of honor and trust. Two years ago this fall he was a candidate for the legislature, before the Republican county convention, a position he was almost forced into by admiring friends. By the diabolical schemes of a few unscrupulous wire pullers, he was beaten for a nomination, which he had expected to receive, and it was a serious blow, both to his peace of mind and to his health.

How well the writer remembers the evening of October 10, 1887, when Mr. Sherman was in Alton on his way to meet his wife at Minneapolis. He called at this office and in honest indignation told how the gang had lied to him, and how they had villainously slaughtered him in a convention of supposed friends. His voice trembled and tears came to his eyes as he recited the shameful story of the treachery done him. Since that evening we have known Mr. Sherman to be a manly man, truthful and strong with love and patriotism for his country and as such we bow in grief at his sad death, hastened no doubt by the convention of Oct. 5, 1887.

Peace to the good old man's ashes. May he receive the happy reward of an honest, God-fearing man in the world to come.

Death of Hon. L. D. Sherman.

Northwestern Iowa lost one of its
leading citizens in the death of **Hon.
Lorenzo Dow Sherman** which occurred
at his home near Ireton last Friday
night. For months he had been afflicted
with cancer of the stomach and at times
suffered untold agony from this terrible
disease.

The funeral services were held at Ire-
ton, Sunday afternoon, May 12th, under
the auspices of the masonics fraternity of
which the deceased was a prominent and
worthy member. Nearly a hundred
masons marched to the cemetery with
the funeral cortege. Members of the
fraternity were present to join the Ire-
ton lodge in the funeral rites
from LeMars, Hull, Alton, Orange City,
Calliope and Hawarden; a special train
ran from Hawarden for the lodge of that
place. An immense gathering of people
from both Sioux and Plymouth counties
was present showing the high respect
that this honored pioneer had won from
his fellow men during his long residence
among them.

Lorenzo Dow Sherman was born at
Wethersfield, Wyoming county, New
York, April 15th, 1826. At the age of
nine he accompanied his parents to Penn-
sylvania where he continued to reside
until forty years of age when he moved
to Greene county, Wisconsin. In 1870
he moved to Iowa; and from that time
until his death was an honored citizen of
Sioux county.

For sixteen years he held the office of
justice of the peace and in 1883 was
elected a member of the legislature
which office he held for one term per-
forming its duties with signal credit
to himself and his constituents. He
He was married in 1851 to Martha Egg-
leston; and two children survive their
father with the widow. Mr. Sherman
was a man of strong convictions and un-
sullied integrity, loved and respected by
those who knew him. A strong and ap-
propriate funeral discourse was pro-
nounced by Rev. Y. R. Green of the Ire-
ton M. E. church of which denomination
Mr. Sherman had been a member since
his nineteenth year.

Mr. Sherman was an ex-representative of Sioux Co. and a well known citizen. Fissel & Beely went up on Sunday to take charge of the funeral which was to occur at Ireton. There was the largest concourse of people present on Sunday at the funeral ever seen in this section of the country.

There came very near being a fire at the court house on Tuesday. Some one in passing by the south door discovered a smoke coming from the foundation. The county officials immediately formed an impromptu fire brigade and conquered the blaze. At night the result would have been disastrous to the county. As it was the damage was slight.

The county officials discovered that some of the records had been tampered with. Indeed the record of a case in which T. L. Robertson had a judgment against Burnite & McMahan was entirely eradicated. This goes to show that some desperate characters are still in town or at least have been in town. Parties mean enough to do this and so familiar, would easily drop a lighted match or a cigar stub down among the rubbish to fire the county building and thus obliterate a great many things. A fire in broad day just at this time and that particular spot would possibly create a panic and send many of the records out of the vaults.
