

**HON. C. C. VANDERPOEL DEAD.**

Just three months ago we had the pleasure of writing an account of the golden wedding anniversary of Hon. and Mrs. C. C. Vanderpoel of Mitchell, this county, but are at this time bowed in sadness as we chronicle Mr. Vanderpoel's sudden death at Mitchell last Tuesday evening, January 9, 1906.

Mr. Vanderpoel had walked up town during the afternoon and appeared to be in his usual health. About half after five o'clock he again started from home with a basket of kindling for the purpose of starting a fire in the G. A. R. hall where an installation program was to be held that evening, where he was found lying upon the platform in front of the building by others who arrived about seven o'clock. Heart failure is assigned as the cause of Mr. Vanderpoel's sudden death and the sorrowing family have the sympathy of their old friends in and surrounding Mitchell. The children living abroad were notified and arrangements for the funeral will be made upon their arrival at Mitchell today.

#### Hon. C. C. Vanderpoel.

Clarence C. Vanderpoel was born in Columbia county, New York, November 22nd, 1830. Most of his boyhood and youth, however, was spent in Wisconsin, whither the family removed while he was still a child. He was educated at Carroll college, Waukesha, and at the University of Wisconsin. He was married October 1st, 1855 to Emily A. Squires. He served his country in the War of the Rebellion as a member of Company E. of the 12th Wisconsin. Shortly after the close of the war Mr. Vanderpoel with his family, moved to West Mitchell, Iowa, which was his home until the time of his death. He served one term most acceptably in the Iowa legislature and was for many years prominent in the affairs of his own community. He died on Tuesday, January 7th, 1906. His widow and seven children are left to mourn. The children were all able to be present at the funeral with the exception of C. G. Vanderpoel of Park Rapids, Minnesota, and Mrs. Emma V. Fuller of Oshkosh, Wisconsin. F. A. Vanderpoel came from Park Rapids, A. L. Vanderpoel, from La Porte, Minnesota, and Mrs. Emma Fuller from Oshkosh, Wisconsin. The two youngest daughters, Mrs. Hattie Hastings and Mrs. Flora Cady reside at Mitchell.

The funeral was held at his late residence on Sunday afternoon, a large company of friends from Mitchell and Osage being present. The services, under the auspices of the G. A. R. and W. R. C. were conducted by Rev. VanSwearingen of the Congregational church, assisted by Rev. Wager of the M. E. church and Rev. J. A. Lapham of Osage. Beautiful floral tributes testified to the regard of friends both at home and abroad.





In the early 1950's Rev. G.J. Schmitz and the Meyer Boy Scout Troop 67 constructed a log cabin and swinging bridge in the wooded area along the Wapsipinicon River northwest of McIntire, Iowa. This project took several years of work for the Scouts, their leaders, and other members of the Meyer parish.

This area is now known as Pinicon Alders Wildlife Area, and owned by the Mitchell County Conservation Board. In 1987 the Mitchell County Conservation Board restored the cabin and swinging bridge, making it a camping and recreational area.





Becker and Glassel General Store on east side; the west part was the Mitchell Savings Bank. The building was built by A.O. Prime in 1910. The store burned in 1917 and the bank closed in 1942. The post office was located in the store building and later in the bank building in 1944.

The city of Mitchell extends from the east bank of the Cedar River to the big S curve east of town. The actual legal boundary is about one long block west of that point.

Mitchell is a tale of three cities. It began east of the railroad tracks, moving ever to the west. About the same time development was

taking place along the river and this area came to be known as west town. The year was 1854.

In 1869 West Mitchell incorporated. In the days the area between the east and west communities had been covered with brush. J.H. Cady had set up his blacksmith shop in this area in 1854, the first attempt at creating a community in this barren area with an eye to bridging the distance between east and west. This was as difficult a concept in Mitchell in 1854 as it is on a global scale in 1989. C.C. Prime built a hotel in 1854 and Amos Cummings built a store.

Down by the river business was booming. There was a flour mill built by John D. Chambers and John F. English. It could also grind corn. In 1858 Frank Coap built the West Mitchell Brewery. It was later owned by John Fey. Starting in 1865 the Paragon Woolen Mills turned out wool yard goods, yarn and red blankets. The wool came from this area and from surrounding states. Mitchell Iron Works, built by Anton Schulte in 1872, completed what we could now call an industrial park. The iron works was both a foundry and a machine shop. There were the usual stores and services needed in any community. Dr. W.W. Blackman built a three-story building half-way up the hill which housed a drug store, doctor and dentist and other services and shops. The building was finally demolished in 1910.

Up the hill near the railroad, development had flourished, too. By 1883 there were six large stores, two grain elevators, small shops, a bank, a boarding house and a livery barn. By 1910 a large brick building housed the Becker-Glassel General Store, a successor to Greig General Store and the Klinger-Glassel General Store. The drug store was across the street and around the corner were the John Ross Hardware and the A.W. Parkhurst Restaurant. Close by were the grain elevators and the village well.

In 1857 Mitchell County was organized. The courthouse stood where the school building now stands. The line between Mitchell and West Mitchell was the street (now closed) between the Ray Kisner property and the Hilan Trout property. A third business district was growing up on the east end of town in the area near the S curve. The middle Mitchell people wanted to incorporate, but those east of the railroad were not interested and they chose not to be included when Mitchell was finally incorporated in 1879. Mitchell was the county seat from 1857 to 1870. A referendum on where the county seat should be located changed the Mitchell story.

If the influence of exit polls is a problem today, it's mild compared to the out and out vote buying that went on in those days regarding the choice of the courthouse location. St. Ansgar supported Osage in the contest because they thought it would be easier to get the county seat away from Osage. It was an issue created by egos and political and economic opportunism. Mitchell lost out because the local politicians couldn't see the long-term potential of cooperation between the three Mitchell groups. West Mitchell continued as a separate political entity until 1954.

Mitchell has had several schools. The first was a log house. Then in 1857 J.L. Tibbits built a frame schoolhouse which served until 1869 when a six room school was built about

three blocks west of the depot. It was of unusual design and became known as the "Bird Cage School." Two primary schools were built at the same time on either end of town. In 1882 the "Bird Cage" burned and the former courthouse was converted for school use.

The press had its day with four newspapers. First was the Mitchell County Republican which began publication in 1858. Mitchell County Gazette and the Mitchell Democrat followed. The Mitchell County Press appeared in West Mitchell. It was published by Tom Atherton and was the forerunner of the present Press-News.

Religion was not overlooked. The Free Will Baptists held the first religious service in 1854. In West Mitchell the Baptists built a church of Gothic design. It stood at the top of the hill and was surrounded by maples and pines. A Methodist church and a Congregational church were founded in Mitchell in 1857. Those buildings still stand. In 1873 a Catholic church was built. It was later moved to Osage. The Lutheran church was organized in 1937 and uses what was once the Methodist church.


Mitchell produced many leaders. In the early days the names were Chambers, English, Coap, Fey, Schulte, Blackman, Klinger, Glassel, Becker. Also appearing in the story of business development are Archie Prime, Cheney, Tyson, Sweatt (a name later associated with Honeywell), Stacy, Piper Joy, and still later Bennett, Parkhurst, Stokes, Trout, Bamford, and in the present day Grimm, Adams, Voight. Did we miss Vulk, Sawyer, Duncan, Vanderpoel? The list goes on and on.

But there's life in the old town yet. The Lutheran church and the Booster Club keep up the community projects. The town has the best fireworks ever each year and the homemade ice cream at the annual summer social is special. It was built by rugged individualists, almost destroyed by rugged individualists and it will keep on going with this same rugged spirit.








