Funeral For C. W. Williams

HELD HERE LAST SATURDAY

Services In M. E. Church Well Attended—The Rev. F. H. Weed, Pastor, Officiates.

The body of the late C. W. Williams, 79, former Independence resident, who died in Copley hospital, Aurora, Ill., his home, Tuesday evening, Feb. 18, 1936, of infection, arrived here Saturday morning at 8:33 over the Illinois Central. Funeral services had been held in the Healy chapel in Aurora Friday afternoon. Accompanying the body to Independence were his three sons, Ross, Parke, Hollis, and his daughter, Mrs. Ethelene Petersmeyer, all of Saskatchewan, Can.

Services were held in the First M. E. church at 11 a. m. Saturday. The local business houses were closed during the period from 11 to 11:30. A goodly number of old friends attended the services, at which the Rev. Floyd H. Weed, pastor, officiated. Pallbearers were M. A. Smith, C. A. McEwen, P. C. Heege, R. Z. Wallace, R. B. Hovey, M. O. Fouts. There were beautiful floral offerings, one a large wreath of roses and greenery from the "city of Independence." Mrs. F. A. Barker presided at the organ. A quartet composed of James Rosemond, Robert Montgomery, C. L. Raymond and John Pappas sang "Abide With Me."

The Rev. Mr. Weed read as a Scripture lesson the twenty-third Psalm and a part of the fourteenth chapter of John, after which he offered prayer, in which the Godliness of Mr. Williams was spoken of. The pastor gave a beautiful eulogy of Mr. Williams' eventful life, quoting from the last issue of the Bulletin-Journal. He mentioned his surviving widow, who was unable to come here on account of feeble health; the three sons and daughter above mentioned; a brother, F. E., formerly associated with him in the horse business, now farming near Rouleau, Sask.; eleven grandchildren.

Mr. Weed took his text from the twelfth chapter of Hebrews, first and second verses: "Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us." Looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him, endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God." T. E. Taylor Passes Away In Arizona

A FORMER PASTOR, SENATOR

And Representative—Well Known Man Answers Call in Holbrook, Arizona, Thursday—Burial Here Tuesday Afternoon.

Hon. T. E. Taylor, 71, former state senator and representative here, died at his home, Holbrook,



Arizona, Thursday afternoon, Feb. 20, 1936, at 4 o'clock. He had been ill for several days with heart trouble. His son, H. D. Taylor, Waterloo, had returned Tuesday of last week from Holbrook, where he had visited his father, owing to his illness, his condition showing improvement when his son returned home.

Thomas E. Taylor, son of the Rev. and Mrs. C. H. and Elizabeth Ann (Rawson) Taylor, was born in Lake county, Ill., June 20, 1864. He was the oldest of a family of five children. He came with his parents to Iowa as an infant, locating in Mitchell county, where they made their home until 1871. His father was admitted to the M. E. Iowa conference as a minister and served in the ministry until eighteen months before his death in Burbank, Cal. He was presiding elder of N. E. Iowa district and resided at Manchester for many years, being one of the finest of men and beloved as a pastor and friend. Thomas E. supplemented his public school studies with a course at the U. I. U., Fayette, graduating there with the class of 1887. He later attended the Moody Bible Institute and afterward became a minister in the Upper Iowa conference. His first charge was what was known as the eleventh ward, where he was pastor at Marble Rock, Greene, Cresco, Independence, and other places at Independence

Local Man To Be An Admiral

WILL HEAD ASIATIC FLEET

Rear Admiral Harry E. Yarnell To Become Admiral in October.

Charles E. Begun, former Independence resident, sends us a clipping from the Long Beach Sun, stating that Rear Admiral Harry E. Yarnell, U. S. navy, also formerly of this city, is slated to become commander in chief of the Asiatic fleet in October, with the rank of admiral, succeeding Admiral Orin Gould Martin. He has been commandant of the fourteenth naval district and the navy yard at Pearl Harbor, T. H. The clipping speaks of Admiral Yarnell being recognized as an engineering authority, having served as chief of the bureau of engineering of the navy beginning Sept. 28, 1928; in 1930 transferred a member of the technical staff of the American delegation to the conference on limitation of armaments at London; in 1917 commanded the U. S. S. Nashville, on patrol duty at Gibraltar, a year later on the staff of Admiral W. S. Sims, then in command of the American naval forces in European waters. In the Spanish-American war he served on the Oregon, making the historic cruise to the east coast. In the Philippine Boxer revolution he was on the Yorktown, was in the Vera Cruz occupation in 1914 and in 1915 finished his course in the naval war college. Yarnell was a member of the class of 1897.

BUSINESS CENSUS REPORTS

To Be Taken By Four Enumerators—Reports Confidential.

The 1935 business census conducted by the federal government began last week with the appointment of four enumerators for Buchanan county, who are: Frank Schmidkonz, Owen Downs, and Philip Shutt, Independence, and Miss Estella Strain, Jesup. The information given to the enumerators will be held in the strictest confidence. All enumerators and other persons connected with the census work are under a drastic census oath not to disclose or discuss any information submitted for census purposes. Under the census law it is a criminal offense to violate this confidence; no access to individual reports is permitted, not even to other governmental, state, or local agencies, and no information will be disclosed which would reveal any of the facts or figures in the returns. The census is the oldest bureau of the government, established nearly 150 years ago, and never has it been convicted of a violation of confidence. Lester E. Van Pelt, district supervisor, Decorah, is asking all business concerns to cooperate with the enumerators who call upon them for information. He said that we run here on earth a race different from the race track and the marathon, a race all through life, the most important, floral crowns may be given the jockey who wins in a track race, but they wither, and the important race is the Christian race for which we get an eternal crown, the privilege to enter into the gates of the New Jerusalem and companionship with God, a race in which we must have patience, tacking into the wind as the sail boat sailor does. Such a race did Mr. Williams run. Inclosing he quoted from "Crossing the Bar" and Riley's poem on death, "I cannot say, I will not say that he is dead, he is just away." Prayer by the pastor and the singing of "When I See The King" by the quartet closed the impressive service, in which deserved tribute was paid to Mr. Williams. Burial was in Oak Grove. The sons and daughters returned to Aurora on an afternoon train.

Mr. Williams was born in Chatham, N. Y. Dec. 4, 1856, son of George W. and Juliana Williams. At the age of 11 he came to Iowa with his parents, locating on a farm near Jesup. His body was laid away in Oak Grove by the side of his parents, his first wife and a son, Rush.

His aged mother, two sisters and a brother, all in California, and grandchildren survive.

Mr. Taylor's ability also brought him honors in the political field. He was state representative for this county for four years and state senator for the Buchanan-Delaware district for the same length of time. The Taylor family left here in 1924 for Holbrook, where he had since been engaged in business.

Buchanan county people regret to learn of the death of Mr. Taylor, for so long a prominent resident here, as pastor, legislator and farmer. He was a man of rare ability, forceful, a man of affairs, who took an active part in community movements. Many friends here mourn his passing.

The body arrived here Tuesday. Funeral services were held that afternoon at 2:30 in the M. E. church, and was largely attended by oldtime friends. The Rev. F. H. Weed officiated. Interment was in Oak Grove. Pallbearers were O. E. Finuf, C. W. Kline, Ira Hoemer, A. G. Rigby, R. F. Tidball, Dr. F. T. Plank. Interment was in Oak Grove.

Five to eight tabulating cards are punched to record the formation on each report, and no names or addresses appear on these cards. The cards are tabulated with other cards to produce the figures which are published and become the recognized basic statistics of business.

REV. THOMAS EDDY TAYLOR, D. D.

For many years Rev. Thomas Eddy Taylor devoted his life to the active work of the ministry but has now retired, although there are few Sundays in which he does not act as a supply in some pulpit and his interest in the work of the church has never abated in the slightest degree. He was born in Lake county, Illinois, June 20, 1864, a son of Charles H. and Elizabeth Ann (Rawson) Taylor. The father's birth occurred in Devonshire, England, January 24, 1837, and he passed away on the 12th of October, 1905. As a boy he began earning his own living and the necessity of providing for his own support greatly limited his opportunities for acquiring an education. He came to the new world when about eighteen years of age and settled in Lake county, Illinois. There he was married on the 12th of October, 1861, to Miss Elizabeth Ann Rawson, who was born in Michigan in 1841. Mr. Taylor afterward engaged in farming and also became a local preacher of the Methodist Episcopal church. He resided in Illinois until the fall of 1864, when he came with his family to Iowa, settling on a farm in the northern part of Mitchell county, where he continued to make his home until 1871. He was then admitted to the upper Iowa conference and from that time until within eighteen months of his death he continued active in the work of the ministry, being called to the pastorate of various churches in northeastern Iowa. Near the close of his ministry he served as a presiding elder for a term and a half, but because of failing health he went to California and died at Burbank, that state. Mrs. Taylor survives and is now a resident of Manchester, Iowa.

Rev. Thomas Eddy Taylor is the eldest of a family of five children. He supplemented his public-school course by study in the Upper Iowa University, from which he was graduated with the class of 1887. He also attended the Moody Bible Institute and when he had finished school he took up the task of preaching the gospel, joining the upper Iowa conference of the Methodist Episcopal church. His first charge was what was known as the eleventh circuit north of Waterloo. He later filled the pastorates of the churches at Marble Rock, Greene, Cresco, Independence, Osage and then again at Independence, and in 1911 he retired from the active work of the ministry, although he still preaches almost every Sunday, doing supply work. He also frequently preaches at the hospital at Independence. In 1901 his alma mater conferred upon him the Doctor of Divinity degree. In the previous year Dr. Taylor began the publication of a series of books, his authorship having since made him widely

known. His first volume was "Studies in the Life of Christ," which has since been followed by "Studies in the Apostolic Church" and "Studies in the Old Testament." These volumes were adopted as the official Bible study text-book in the Epworth League and also as the official text-book of the United Christian Endeavor Society. It has likewise become the official text-book of the Young People's Societies of Canada, and in 1901 he was given charge of the Bible study department of the Epworth League for three years. In addition to his active work along the lines of moral progress and development Dr. Taylor has become interested in agricultural pursuits and is the owner of two hundred and forty acres of land in Buchanan county comprised in two farms, to one of which he gives his personal attention and supervision. This is known as Idlewild and is situated in Washington township. He operates this farm of one hundred and sixteen acres in a general way but also specializes in the raising of shorthorn cattle and Duroc Jersey hogs. The farm adjoins the city limits and is supplied with all modern equipments and accessories.

On the 12th of June, 1889, Dr. Taylor was united in marriage to Miss Nellie Margaret Huie, who was born at Polo, Ogle county, Illinois, a daughter of Robert J. and Julia (Hammond) Huie. The mother was born in New York and about 1841 was taken to Illinois by her parents, her marriage being celebrated in Polo in 1862. Mr. Huie's birth occurred in Ogle county, Illinois, in 1840, and in early life he followed farming. Later he engaged in the lumber business and was also employed as an official weigher at the stock yards at Polo by the Illinois Central Railroad Company. In 1862, immediately after his marriage, he enlisted for service in the Union army as a private of Company A, Ninety-second Illinois Volunteer Infantry. He was afterward promoted to the rank of orderly sergeant, subsequently became second lieutenant and still later first lieutenant, serving altogether for three years, when he was mustered out. He was with Sherman on the celebrated march to the sea and for a short time was confined in the hospital with fever. At the close of his military experience he returned to Illinois and assisted his father in the further development and improvement of a large farm. In the meantime he purchased a farm in Floyd county, Iowa, and later came to this state with his wife and daughter, now Mrs. Taylor. For seventeen years he resided upon his Floyd county farm and then removed to Charles City, where he engaged in the lumber business until about 1895, after which he returned to his native county. A few years later he became official weigher for the Illinois Central Railroad and is still a resident of Polo but is now living retired. He also engaged at one time in the life insurance business, representing a mutual benefit association of New Jersey, but made that simply a side issue to his other interests. While living in Floyd county, Iowa, he served as assessor. His wife passed away in May, 1901. Mrs. Taylor was the eldest of their five children. She attended the Upper Iowa University, from which she was graduated with the class of 1888, and she is a member of the Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Circle and other organizations advancing educational and church work.

Dr. and Mrs. Taylor have three children. Hartness D., who was born July 16, 1891, and was graduated from the Upper Iowa University in 1913, on the completion of a course in the College of Liberal Arts, has been superintendent of the public schools at Stanwood, Iowa, and is now studying law at Iowa City.

Karl S., born July 20, 1898, is in the second year of high school. Lloyd M., born September 20, 1901, is attending grammar school.

In his political views Dr. Taylor is a stalwart republican and at the present time is a candidate for the office of representative to the state legislature. His life interests have been broad and varied and he is identified with that class of men who ever stand for progress and improvement. He is usually to be found in those circles where intelligent men are met for the discussion of important questions and association with him means expansion and elevation.

WILLIS F. VAN ORSDOL.

It has been said that death loves a shining mark and many times this seems to be exemplified when a leading and valued citizen is called from the scene of his activities. Willis F. Van Orsdol was one of the valued residents of Rowley and throughout his entire life displayed qualities and characteristics that endeared him to all who knew him, causing his death to be greatly regretted wherever he was known. He was born in this county in November, 1863, a son of James and Jessie Van Orsdol, who were pioneer settlers of this part of the state. The father was for many years actively and successfully engaged in general farming and eventually removed to Rowley, where he conducted a grain and live-stock business in connection with his two sons, Willis F. and Frank J., remaining active in that partnership until his death, which occurred July 24, 1912. His widow still resides in Rowley and extended mention of them is made on another page of this work.

Willis F. Van Orsdol spent his youthful days in his parents' home and good opportunities and advantages were afforded him. He attended the public schools and also continued his education in Vinton, Iowa. After reaching his majority he took up his abode in Rowley, where he became connected with the live-stock and grain business, carrying on operations along that line until his life's labors were ended in death on the 27th of August, 1910, after he had been ill for only a brief period. In business he was a resourceful, energetic man who readily recognized and utilized opportunities and as the years went on his reliable business methods, combined with unfaltering energy and determination won for him a gratifying measure of prosperity.

In January, 1890, Mr. Van Orsdol was married to Miss Emma Page, a daughter of George W. and Lenora (Chandler) Page, the former a native of New Hampshire and the latter of Maine. Her father was one of the first settlers of Linn county, Iowa, where he purchased wild land and developed and improved a farm, being busily engaged in agricultural pursuits until after the outbreak of the Civil war, when he considered his duty to his country his foremost interest and enlisted from Linn county as a member of Company H, Twentieth Iowa Infantry, with which he served for ten months. He then returned to Linn county and throughout his remaining days was actively engaged in farming, his death occurring June 5, 1888. His wife survives and took up her residence in Rowley in 1904. To Mr. and Mrs. Van Orsdol were born three children: Jay W., now engaged in the grain and stock business in Rowley,
