Toward Reds

Presumably Ben Bella, 48, was arrested. A statement signed by Boumedienne and read over the radio said Algeria would continue to honor all previous agreements and commitments with other countries.

Ben Bella had strongly oriented Algeria toward the communist bloc and last year received the title of hero of the Soviet Union. He also recognized Red China.

The council denounced the "reckless consequences of personal power." It said the internal situation is "anguishing" as a result of the exercise of that power.

Algeria has been in deep economic trouble since the French granted independence in 1962 after a long, bloody insurrection. Unemployment is high and many people live on U.S.-supplied surplus food.

Summit Meeting

Former French farms were nationalized, but this failed to increase food production. Recently there were increasing complaints of one-man rule, but Ben Bella seemed firmly in command.

The coup occurred just as Algiers was arranging for an African-Asian summit meeting June 29. Foreign ministers of participating states were scheduled to meet June 24.

The coup threw arrangements — which had been carefully planned by Ben Bella as something of a personal triumph — into confusion.

Whether the council can shore up things and get the meeting going is problematical.

taxes. Even in their dying moments, the taxes remained a nuisance.

For example, the price-tagging process was complicated by the different effective dates for ending the assorted levies. On some the reduction is retroactive to March, on others it is effective the day after the President signs the bill.

On some the effective date is July 1, while on still others the effective date is Dec. 31 or Jan. 1.

The inventory re-pricing problem was the most difficult for large retail organizations such as department stores and mail order houses which deal in thousands of separate categories of items.

Reworking Catalog

Sears, Roebuck & Co. said the reductions mean immediate price inventories on scores of lines of products. The firm already had advertised conditional cuts on appliances, said a spokesman in Chicago.

Sears is reworking its fall catalog for a second edition bringing in new price schedules. Also, a tabloid flyer is in preparation to change May and June sale book prices.

Montgomery Ward had its fall catalog set before President Johnson made his tax cut recommendations in March.

The company advertises it will pass along all tax cut credits on major appliance items.

Chinese Bound for Algiers Turn Back

CAIRO (AP) — A plane carrying part of Communist China's delegation of the African-Asian conference in Algiers turned back to Cairo Saturday because of the coup in Algeria.

The transport carried 40 Chinese passengers, the Cairo airport reported, including three deputy foreign ministers.

The airport said the plane took off from here but 75 minutes later it was ordered by the Algiers airport to return to Cairo.

Chinese Premier Chou En-lai was in Pakistan enroute to the Algiers conference scheduled to begin June 29. Presumably his travel plans had to be changed. There was no word from Karachi.

Dr. Gardner, 89, Of Lisbon Dies; Services Tuesday

LISBON — Dr. John Gardner, 89, a Lisbon physician for 65 years and a state representative for 10 years, died Friday night in a Cedar Rapids hospital.

Dr. Gardner, who was proud of the fact that he delivered his own great-grandson, was born Sept. 23, 1875, on a farm in Johnson county.



He was graduated from the Iowa City Academy in 1893 and from the University of Iowa medical school in 1899. He located in Lisbon as a general practitioner in 1900.

Dr. Gardner was married to Pearl O. Smith of Lisbon in 1905. He joined the national guard in 1893 and served as a first sergeant during the Spanish-American war in 1898. He was a captain in the national guard from 1899 until 1901.

World War I

After attending officers training school, Dr. Gardner was commissioned a captain of infantry in 1917 and later was transferred to the medical department. He was commander of the field hospital at Camp Dodge and then served in France. After his return to the United States in 1919 with the rank of major, he remained in the reserves reaching the rank of Colonel.

Dr. Gardner was elected a state representative and served in the legislature for 10 years. He was on the governor's staff for six years, performing his last official service at the inaugural service for Gov. William Beardley.

During his years of public service, Dr. Gardner served on the committee for study and inspection of mental hospitals under the board of control. As chairman of the military affairs committee, he was a member of the delegation which attended the commissioning of the battleship Iowa.

Official Soviet Snub, but Gagarin and White Shake

PARIS (AP) — The Russians called off a meeting scheduled for Saturday between Astronauts Edward White and James McDivitt and Cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin, saying Gagarin was "too busy."

But at an official luncheon at the Paris air show Gagarin stopped at White's table. The two space flyers shook hands very briefly, smiled and then Gagarin walked away.

Despite Soviet officials' apparent snub of the visiting Gemini 4 pair, Vice-president Humphrey led McDivitt, White and their wives on a quick tour of the Soviet Pavilion at the show.

The party, surrounded by French police guards and U.S. secret service agents, briefly inspected the space ship Vostok II, which is on display.

The pavilion was so jammed with Saturday visitors to the show that the astron-

auts scarcely had a chance to get a good look.

Crowds of Frenchmen cheered and applauded as the astronauts passed with Humphrey to the displays.

Earlier, the astronauts demonstrated the space suits they wore during their flight. White demonstrated the "space gun" maneuvering unit he used outside the capsule.

Humphrey and the astronauts had lunch with French air show authorities.

Blaze in Missile Car Perils Area

EL PASO (AP)—A burning rail car loaded with explosive Bullpup missile warheads menaced downtown El Paso briefly and sent families fleeing their homes Friday night.

Two fire companies brought the flames under control within 10 minutes. Firemen said a spark struck as the Southern Pacific freight braked near the depot apparently ignited the blaze.

The boxcar was switched to a spur in a smelter's slag pit area. Residents evacuated houses in the vicinity while an army demolition team removed the warheads, which were enroute from the West Coast to the Yorktown, Va., naval weapons station.

Girl Swims To Freedom

BERLIN (AP)—Undetected by East German guards a 22-year-old girl Friday night slipped through rows of barbed wire and swam a canal to freedom in West Berlin.

Rodeo 'Blank Charge'

GLADEWATER, Texas (AP)—A rodeo clown, firing what was supposed to be a blank charge, peppered spectators with bird-shot Friday night, wounding 24 people and creating pandemonium.

Investigators said it obviously was an accident, but they had not determined how a live shell got into the shotgun.

Of the wounded, 11 adults remained in-hospitals overnight, but attendants said none suffered serious injury. The others were dismissed after emergency treatment.

filed a charge of assault with a prohibited weapon against the clown, Ken Boen, 41, of Fort Smith, Ark. The clown was not in custody.

Boen, a veteran of the professional rodeo circuit, rode a Shetland pony into the arena, firing a cap pistol as eight small boys hired for his act gave chase. He stopped and they asked to ride the pony.

At that point the pony reared and the clown fired his shotgun, making no attempt to aim. It was pre-arranged for his young assistants to drop, and they did. None was wounded.

Private Hargrove's Son Doing All Right in Army

FORT SLOCUM, N. Y. (AP)—After almost a quarter-century, the U.S. army finally has a "Private Hargrove" who knows when to salute and how to close-order drill.

Christopher Hargrove, 20, also has proved that he has some of the talent in the communications field which earned his father fame in the 40s.

As a result, the son of Marion Hargrove — author of the best-selling book of World War II days, "See Here, Private Hargrove," — has won his private first-class stripe after less than a year of service.

The son is described by his commanding officers at the army defense information school here as a "promising newcomer to television."

During World War II, the elder Hargrove set the nation laughing with his syndicated column's describing his ineptitude as a military man with the army's lowest rank.

His book detailing his army exploits was made into a motion picture and he now writes for the motion picture and television industries in California.

Northern Cities

ATLANTA (AP) — Dr. Martin Luther King will expand his civil rights movement beyond the South this summer to New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Detroit and Los Angeles.

The first major attack on Northern segregation by King's Southern Christian Leadership Conference may also reach Cleveland and Baltimore, the Rev. Ralph Abernathy, SCLC vice-president at large, said Friday night.

Fifteen years ago, Dr. Gardner was quoted as saying that "I am now in my fiftieth year in general practice at Lisbon, where, I no doubt, will remain until my final service to humanity is completed."
