Cylinder Operations Being Pushed In Grundy Center

Two-Cylinder Club is dedicated to the history and preservation of not only John Deere tractors of the era, but also of implements, equipment and printed documents.

The Club publishes a high-quality bimonthly magazine, with most issues featuring a specific John Deere tractor model built between 1918 and 1960. "The magazine is the single most significant benefit to the members," says Trumbauer, "but we wanted to be able to do more."

In 1987, they attempted more, holding their first antique John Deere Tractor Expo at Waterloo in honor of Deere & Company's 150th Anniversary. It was well-received, and an encore event was held in 1990. Even though the fourth day was a rain-out from mid-morning on, attendance is estimated to have exceeded 60,000.

"Expo III has been reduced to three days, primarily to better accommodate exhibitors," says Trumbauer. "After all, it's their show, and some of them come from as far away as both coasts. One less day of Expo translates into one additional day of travel time."

Expo IV is planned to be held in Grundy Center in 1994, and, according to Trumbauer, "An entirely different kind of schedule is being considered. It would run for six days, but allow exhibitors the opportunity to participate for as little as two days. For example, all exhibits would be required to be in place on Wednesday and Thursday, but those who chose to could display

Club members. The displays will
be changed periodically, giving
repeat visitors the opportunity to
see something different. There
will also be a video tape viewing
room where nearly 100 hours of
historic John Deere Movies,
which have been transferred by
Deere to video tape, will be
available for review. And, over
the long term, permanent dis-
plays intended to assist in
restoration concepts and tech-
niques will be set up in the shop
area of the building.

Across the street, The Two-
Cylinder Library and Ar-
chives will also officially open
in May 1993. Cherry said the
former State Liquor Store is
well suited to the storage of
historic documents, as the en-
vironment is relatively easy to
control. The building is cur-
rently being used as the prod-
uct sales and service location
while the Center is being re-
modeled. Later on, sales will
be transferred to the Center
for the convenience of visitors.

Cherry continued, "To pre-
pare for the grand opening in
1993, and the continued use of
the Center, there have been a
number of interior repairs, along
with some remodeling and re-
decorating. A major amount of
the work still needs to be com-
pleted on the outside, including
painting and landscaping. I
doubt that it will be completed
by the time it's opened, but cer-
tainly expect everything to be in
place by Expo IV in 1994. The
Center will, however, be func-
tional during the grand opening,
at which time we expect to host
at least 5000 people over a three
or four day period. The major
activity will be a swap meet of
John Deere related products. For
a good look at what that means,
visit the swap meet at Expo III
next month in Waterloo. Essen-
tially, it's a way for people in-
volved in collecting and restora-
tion to gather at a common loca-
tion where needed items are
bought and sold."

Trumbauer added, "Expo IV
will be held on the twenty-two
acres of ground stretching north
and east of the Center — fully
adequate for the 1000 exhibits
expected. Attendance cannot be
estimated by comparing the
event with those held in Water-
loo because of the consider-
able number of visitors from the
local community. However, I
wouldn't be a bit surprised to
see it hit 50,000. That may
sound like a lot of people, but
you have to keep in mind that
they aren't all attending at one
time. If fewer acres isolated near
the Waterloo Airport can accom-
modate the entire week. A swap meet
and other activities would run
for the full six days, also allow-
ing flexibility of schedule for
participants.

"Firm dates for Expo IV
have not been established; but
it will most likely be in July.
That seems to be the best
month for the majority of the
Club members," said Trum-
bauer. "Membership in the

of Iowa. Bill Mooty is the only
resident of Grundy County ever
to serve as Speaker or Lieu-
tenant Governor.

Bill was active in American

Scottish Rite Des Moines
Consistory, El Kahir Shrine
Temple, Cedar Rapids, Royal
Order of Jesters, Odd Fellows,

Grundy Center, and the State

Following his retirement from law, Edward Ruppelt began remodeling and building homes in Grundy Center. He completed ten new homes in the late 1930's. In 1946 E. A. Ruppelt and his family moved to Ames, Iowa, where he died in June of 1948.

In 1917 Edward A. Ruppelt married Bessie Maxwell of Crawfordsville, Iowa. The couple had two sons: Edward J. and James M.

Ernest W. Ruppelt

E. W. Ruppelt first practiced law in Grundy Center in 1926.

He was born at Steamboat Rock, Iowa, on May 23, 1896, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gustave Ruppelt who had emigrated from Germany a few years earlier. There were eleven children in the family.

After graduating from high school in Eldora, Ernest Ruppelt worked at a variety of jobs. He taught school, cooked for a construction crew, and worked on a farm. In World War I, he was the first man drafted from Hardin County, and rose to the rank of second lieutenant in the infantry.

Following the war, E. W. Ruppelt enrolled in State Teachers College at Cedar Falls. Shortly thereafter he decided to study law and transferred to the University of Chicago where he received the Ph. B. and J. D. degrees.

On being admitted to the bar, Mr. Ruppelt associated with the firm of Rogers and Ruppelt in Grundy Center from 1926 to 1929. He then worked in Waterloo for three years before returning permanently to the Rogers and Ruppelt firm in 1932.

Ernest Ruppelt remained active in the Army Reserve in the period between World Wars I and II. When the United States entered World War II, he was recalled to active duty and served as a major until he was discharged in 1944. He then resumed the practice of law in Grundy Center. On the death of his partner, C. T. Rogers, he associated with Harvey Kimball, forming the firm of Ruppelt and Kimball in 1947. This association continued until the death of Ernest Ruppelt in 1966.

E. W. Ruppelt served five terms as county attorney. He was a long-time member and president of the Grundy Rotary Club and the Community Club. He was an elder of the First Presbyterian Church and a member of the Knights of Pythias. He served on the board of education for many years. He was active in several veterans' organizations including American Legion, Forty and Eight, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and Waterloo Drum and Bugle Corps.

Ernest W. Ruppelt married Alice Maxwell of Crawfordsville, Iowa, in 1924.

The couple have two daughters: Jean (Mrs. Cooper Evans) and Judith (Mrs. Austin Fernow), both of Grundy Center.

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
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

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


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
