6 Section 1. REBUILD IOWA INFRASTRUCTURE FUND —
7 APPROPRIATIONS. There is appropriated from the rebuild Iowa
8 infrastructure fund created in section 8.57 to the following
9 state entities for the following fiscal years, the following
10 amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the
11 purposes designated:

23 a. (1) For deposit in the water quality initiative fund
24 created in [section 466B.45](#) for purposes of supporting the
25 water quality initiative administered by the division of soil
26 conservation and water quality as provided in [section 466B.42](#),
27 including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
28 purposes, notwithstanding [section 8.57, subsection 3](#), paragraph
29 "c":

32 (2) (a) The moneys appropriated in this lettered
33 paragraph shall be used to support demonstration projects in

3 shall be used to support demonstration projects in watersheds
4 generally, including regional watersheds, as designated by the
5 division, and high-priority watersheds identified by the water
6 resources coordinating council.

7 (3) In supporting projects in watersheds and subwatersheds
8 as provided in subparagraph (2), all of the following apply:

9 (a) The demonstration projects must utilize water quality
10 practices as described in the latest revision of the document
11 entitled "Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy" initially presented
12 in November 2012 by the department of agriculture and land
13 stewardship, the department of natural resources, and Iowa
14 state university of science and technology.

15 (b) The division shall implement demonstration projects
16 as provided in subparagraph division (a) by providing
17 for participation by persons who hold a legal interest
18 in agricultural land used in farming. To every extent
19 practicable, the division shall provide for collaborative
20 participation by such persons who hold a legal interest in
21 agricultural land located within the same subwatershed.

22 (c) The division shall implement demonstration projects on
23 a cost-share basis as determined by the division. Except for
24 edge-of-field practices, the state's share of the amount shall
25 not exceed 50 percent of the estimated cost of establishing the
26 practice as determined by the division or 50 percent of the
27 actual cost of establishing the practice, whichever is less.

28 (d) The demonstration projects shall be used to educate
29 other persons about the feasibility and value of establishing
30 similar water quality practices. The division shall promote
31 field day events for purposes of allowing interested persons to
32 establish water quality practices on such persons' agricultural
33 land.

34 (e) The division shall conduct water quality evaluations
35 within supported subwatersheds. Within a reasonable period

1 after accumulating information from such evaluations, the
2 division shall create an aggregated database of water quality
3 practices. Any information identifying a person holding a
4 legal interest in agricultural land or specific agricultural
5 land shall be a confidential record.

6 (4) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
7 shall be used to support education and outreach in a manner
8 that encourages persons who hold a legal interest in
9 agricultural land used for farming to implement water quality
10 practices, including the establishment of such practices in
11 watersheds generally, and not limited to subwatersheds or
12 high-priority watersheds.

13 (5) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
14 may be used to contract with persons to coordinate the
15 implementation of efforts provided in this lettered paragraph.

16 (6) The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph
17 may be used by the department to support urban soil and water
18 conservation efforts, which may include but are not limited
19 to management practices related to bioretention, landscaping,
20 the use of permeable or pervious pavement, and soil quality
21 restoration. The moneys shall be allocated on a cost-share
22 basis as provided in [chapter 161A](#).

23 (7) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the
24 contrary, the department may use moneys appropriated in this
25 lettered paragraph to carry out the provisions of this lettered
26 paragraph on a cost-share basis in combination with other
27 moneys available to the department from a state or federal
28 source.

29 (8) Not more than 10 percent of the moneys appropriated in
30 this lettered paragraph may be used for costs of administration
31 and implementation of the water quality initiative administered
32 by the division.

29 1. As used in **this section**, ~~"district"~~:

30 a. "District" means a regional sports authority district
31 certified under **this section**.

32 b. "Entity" means an Iowa nonprofit organization established
33 to promote economic development and tourism in an area within
34 the state.

35 2. ~~a. A convention and visitors bureau~~ An entity may

1 apply to the authority for certification of a regional sports
2 authority district ~~which may include more than one city~~
3 ~~and more than one convention and visitors bureau within the~~
4 ~~district and for financial assistance.~~ The authority shall not
5 certify more than ten such districts.

6 ~~b. If more than ten applications are received in any~~
7 ~~certification year, the~~ The authority shall certify the
8 districts on a competitive basis. In evaluating the
9 applications an application for certification and financial
10 assistance, the authority shall consider the economic impact to
11 the activities proposed in the application provide to the state
12 ~~of the activities proposed in the application, the geographic~~
13 ~~diversity of the districts applying, the number of unique and~~
14 ~~innovative activities proposed to be supported by the district,~~
15 and any other factors the authority deems relevant.

16 3. Each district shall actively promote youth sports, high
17 school athletic activities, the special olympics, and other
18 ~~nonprofessional~~ physical sporting events in the ~~local~~ area.

19 4. Each district may apply for and receive financial
20 assistance under the sports tourism program established by the
21 authority pursuant to [section 15F.401](#).

22 5. ~~Each district shall be governed by a seven member board~~
23 ~~consisting of seven members appointed by the convention and~~
24 ~~visitors bureau filing the application pursuant to subsection~~
25 ~~2. At least three members of the board shall consist of city~~
26 ~~council members of any cities located in the district. Each~~
27 ~~board shall be responsible for administering programs designed~~
28 ~~to promote the activities enumerated in~~ [subsection 3](#). A
29 district that received financial assistance from the authority
30 for an activity described in an application submitted pursuant
31 to subsection 2 shall submit a comprehensive report to the
32 authority on or before July 31 regarding activities that took
33 place between January 1 and June 30, and on or before January
34 31 for activities that took place between July 1 and December
35 31 of the previous year. The comprehensive report must detail

1 the return on investment, number of first-time visitors to the
2 state, and total number of hotel rooms occupied as a result of
3 the activity. The authority may request additional information
4 if the authority deems it necessary to evaluate an activity.

7 Sec. 14. DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES —

8 LIMITATION ON OBLIGATION OF MONEYS — INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY
9 MODERNIZATION STUDY COMMITTEE.

10 1. Limitation on obligation of moneys.

11 a. Except as provided in paragraph "b", and notwithstanding
12 any other provision of law to the contrary, for the fiscal year
13 beginning July 1, 2026, the department of health and human
14 services shall not enter into, amend, or extend a contract,
15 purchase order, interagency agreement, or other financial
16 obligation that will cost more than five million dollars,
17 individually or collectively, or commit the state to multiyear
18 financial obligations. This limitation applies to major
19 information technology system replacement, redevelopment,
20 or modernization, including but not limited to eligibility,
21 benefits administration, child welfare, child support, child
22 care, and Medicaid administration systems.

23 b. Paragraph "a" does not apply to information technology
24 changes that are necessary solely to comply with federal Pub.
25 L. No. 119-21, commonly referred to as the One Big Beautiful
26 Bill Act, or state or federal law enacted to implement a
27 provision of Pub. L. No. 119-21, if such law expressly requires
28 near-term implementation and the changes do not materially
29 advance broader system modernization or system replacement
30 efforts beyond what is minimally required to comply with the
31 applicable law.

32 2. Study committee.

33 a. The department of health and human services, in
34 consultation with the legislative services agency and the
35 department of management, shall establish an information

1 technology modernization study committee on or before August
2 1, 2026, and the study committee shall conduct a comprehensive
3 review of the department of health and human services'

6 b. The study committee must include but is not limited to
7 all of the following members:

8 (1) One or more persons familiar with the information
9 technology division and program division of the department of
10 health and human services, appointed by the director of health

2 (1) Identify redundancies, fragmentations, and

4 (2) Assess the department's current ability to integrate
5 data across programs and databases to detect errors, waste,
6 fraud, and abuse.

7 (3) Evaluate options for developing or procuring a unified
8 integrated architecture system capable of securely linking
9 program databases and supporting advanced analytics and
10 automation.

11 (4) Consider existing vendors supporting the department's
12 current systems and alternative solutions offered by firms and
13 experts specializing in modern, artificial intelligence-first,
14 or cloud-native system design.

15 (5) Identify governance, procurement, and oversight
16 structures necessary to ensure cost control, transparency, and
17 long-term sustainability.

18 f. The study committee shall prioritize identifying a
19 long-term solution that integrates department of health and
20 human services databases across programs and enables timely
21 detection of eligibility errors, improper payments, and
22 fraudulent activity while reducing duplicative administrative

4 to assist with the construction of highway overpasses and
5 underpasses across railway tracks.
