Giltner, nee, Newell, came to Monroe county, Iowa, from Indiana as early settlers. His family consists of wife, Hattle E. Giltner, nee, Galliher, and five children, three daughters and two sons. He was elected representative in 1916. Re-clected in 1918. He is a Presbyterian, Mason, Yeoman, and republican.
