Dear Governor Reynolds, members of the lowa General Assembly and the general public:

t is my pleasure to share the Early Childhood Iowa 2019 Annual Report. Through many collaborative partnerships, Iowa is developing a strong early childhood system. This report highlights some successes achieved during this 2019 fiscal year and overall. The Early Childhood Iowa (ECI) State Board is inspired by the dedication reflected.

A specific item to mention is Iowa's receipt of the federal planning grant, Preschool Development Grant Birth to Five, (PDG-B-5) that began in the 2019 calendar year. With its supports, Iowa is continuing to expand its Integrated Data System. Information is available through the 2019 Needs Assessment developed and then adopted in September. Iowa has also adopted the 'We Are ECI' Strategic Plan that will help guide our future work. In this highlight report, we provide a data highlight from family support programs that receive ECI funding. These programs provide an invaluable service to assist vulnerable families primarily with children 0-3 through home visiting or group-based parent education to help parents be their children's first and best teacher. 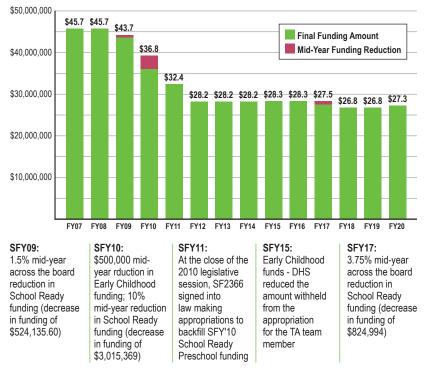

Through our vision and result areas, we strive to ensure Iowa's young children are healthy, ready to succeed in school, grow up in safe and supportive communities with secure and nurturing families and have access to secure and nurturing early learning environments.

ECI FUNDING HISTORY



EARLY CHILDHOOD IOWA'S LEADERSHIP INVOLVES MANY LEVELS

ECI STATE BOARD

- Provides oversight of the ECI Area Boards; met five times this fiscal year
- Updated guidance for area boards; granted designation to area boards
- Supports private public partnerships that promote child care including the work of the Iowa Women's Foundation Child Care Solutions Collaborative
- Supporting relationships with the business community at both state and local levels through leadership and networking opportunities
- Provides leadership and support towards the development of a comprehensive needs assessment and ultimately an updated comprehensive strategic plan
- Establishing a governance structure for lowa's early childhood integrated data system

ECI STAKEHOLDERS ALLIANCE

- Serves as a public-private advisory group to the ECI State Board, Iowa Legislature, and the Governor
- Is open to anyone who selfidentifies as a "stakeholder" in seeing the state reach its vision through its result areas
- Assisted with PDG Planning Grant; participated in planning meetings in spring and summer; working towards integrated data to better inform a successful strategic plan
- Integrates the early learning; health, mental health, and nutrition; family support; and special needs/early intervention systems
- Provides support to the ECI State Board in addressing the early care, health, and education systems that affect children ages 0-5 years and their families

ECI AREA BOARDS

- 38 area boards with geographic boundaries determined locally and cover the entire state
- Charged to reach the desired results to improve the quality of life for young children and their families at a local level
- Consists of citizens, elected officials, and representatives of education, health, human services, faith, business, and consumers
- Expand early childhood programming based on community needs and gaps; serve as a mechanism to instill higher quality within programming
- Assisted with community focus groups and the gathering of survey data from families and early childhood program providers across the entire system
- Raising awareness of the child care crisis as business leaders and early childhood education advocates are beginning to work closely together to find shared solutions

ECI DATA HIGHLIGHT FAMILY SUPPORT PROGRAMS



ECI area boards bring communities together – parents; child care, human services and health care providers; educators; business people; and the faith community – to identify strengths, needs and gaps in services. In this report, we have selected one service type to highlight the data collected. Family support programs include but are not limited to home visitation and parent education. Each ECI area board partners and financially supports at least one family support program in their area. In FY 2019, approximately 140 programs received support. Many of these programs also receive support from HOPES (IDPH appropriation); Shared Visions family support funding (DE allocation); prevention funding from DHS as well as other grants and private funding.

Family support programs adhere to standards of quality working with parents who invest their time to strengthen and nourish their families. Family support workers advocate, assist in enhancing parenting skills, and help caregivers find someone they can depend on. Three key areas of focus are: maternal and child health, school readiness, and strong families. This service type is where ECI makes its biggest impact within the early care, health, and education system. Below is trend data from 2017, 2018 and 2019.

EVALUATING RESULTS THROUGH DATA





ECI uses the Results-Based Accountability™ (RBA) framework for evaluating the results of the initiative. In Iowa Iaw, the ECI Initiative has five desired results for improving the quality of life in Iowa for young children and their families.

Community-Wide Indictors

ECI uses measures, called community-wide indicators, to determine progress made toward achieving the result areas. Community-wide indicators are population measurements and are usually collected by public agencies. Both the ECI State Board and ECI area boards select community-wide indicators to evaluate progress toward the five state result areas.

The information that follows provides trend data for community-wide indicators adopted by the ECI State Board.

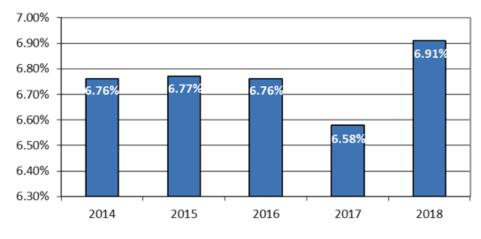

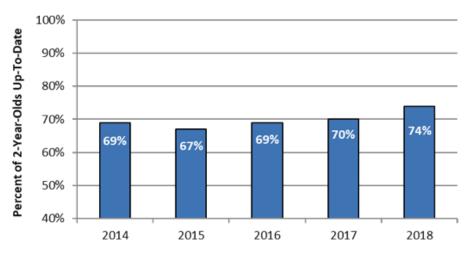

Rate of Iowa's children immunized by age two (2)

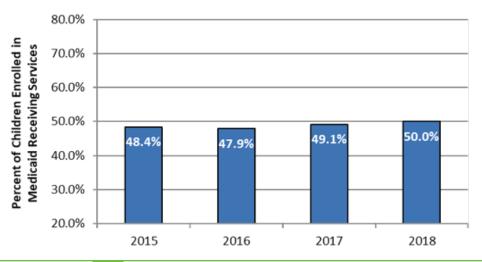

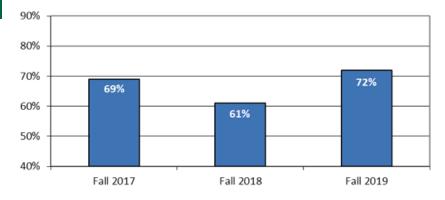




Beginning Reading Skills

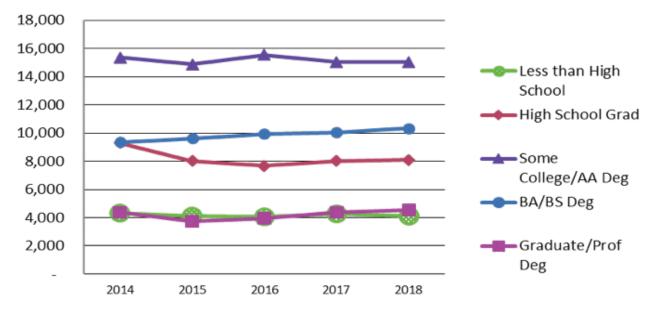
Percent of kindergarten students proficient by kindergarten literacy assessment

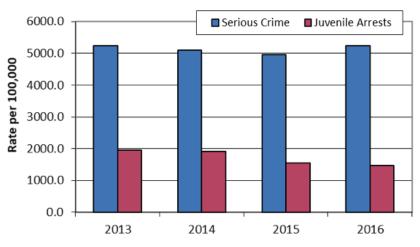

Serious Crime/Juvenile Arrests

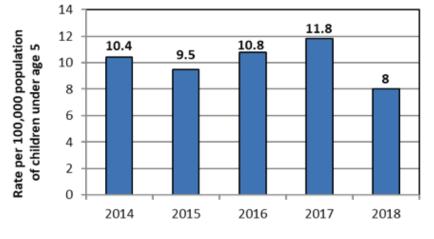
Rate of serious crime per 100,000 population and rate of juvenile arrests per 100,000 population

Child Deaths Due to Accidents

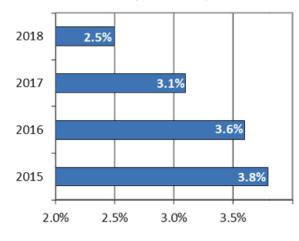

Unemployment

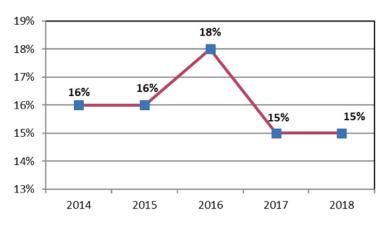
Percent of unemployed individuals

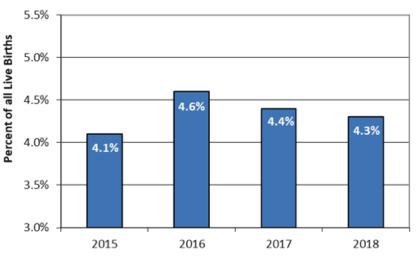

Births to women under age 20

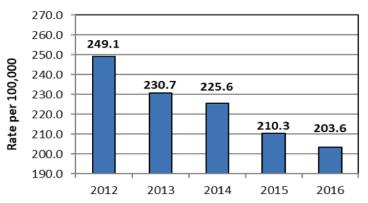

Domestic abuse rate

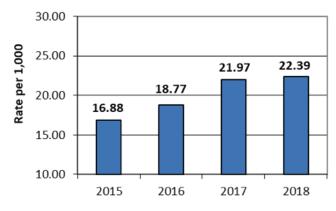

Incidence of Child Abuse

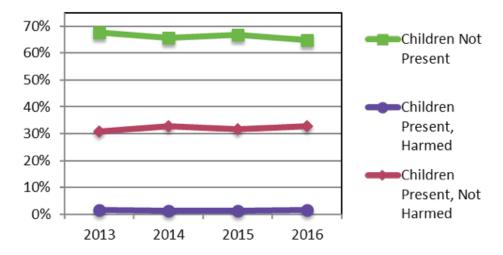
Children 0-5 years old

Domestic abuse rate where children were present



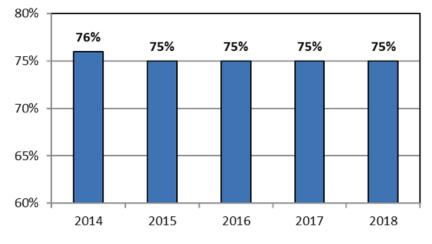

Children under six (6) years of age with all parents in the household in the workforce

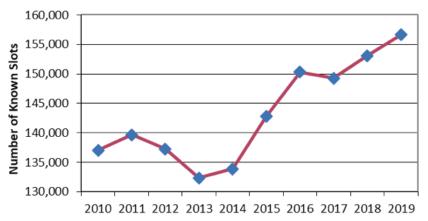

Availability of Child Care

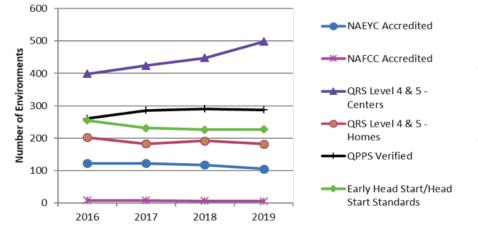
Number of 'slots' or 'spaces' potentially available for a child in a licensed or registered setting

Evaluating Results through Data

Performance Measures

To measure the results of programs and services, the ECI State Board established state-required performance measures for programs and services ECI area boards' fund. Performance measures focus on whether customers are better off as a result of the programs and services. These performance measures also look at the quality and efficiency of the programs and services. Results-Based Accountability[™] asks three simple questions to get at the most important performance measures.

- How much did we do?
- How well did we do it?
- Is anyone better off?

Programs and services funded by ECI area boards are identified as 'service types' and classified under two categories, "direct services" and "indirect services." The direct services category includes service types that directly impact the child or family. Indirect services category includes services types that indirectly impact the child or family. Below is a list of service types under each category. The information that follows provides 3-year trend data for state-required performance measures for each service type. DIRECT SERVICES

Car Seats

Funding in this category was used to purchase new car seats for families that did not have an appropriate car seat and fund a certified car seat technician to install or verify that the car seats were installed correctly. Funding expended in in the fiscal years identified below also included the purchase of baby sleep boxes, cribs and pack-nplays for infants and providing safe sleep educational services to families. Note: The measure of 'Number of car seats checked' and "Percentage of car seats safely installed..." also includes the assessment of safe sleep equipment available for an infant.

Coordinated Intake

WAGE\$[®] IOWA (WAGE\$[®]) is a salary supplement program. As with T.E.A.C.H. IOWA, WAGE\$[®] is a licensed program of Child Care Services Association. WAGE\$[®] offers salary supplements (also called stipends) to the early care and education workforce, based on the individual's level of formal education and commitment to their program. To be eligible to receive a WAGE\$[®] stipend, the individual must work in a eligible early care and education program in a funded county, earn below the income cap (this varies by county, the standard cap is \$15/hour), have one of the educational levels listed in the supplement scale from a regionally accredited school, work at least six months in the same child care program and be employed at the same child care program when a final confirmation has been completed.

Iowa Community Empowerment/Early Childhood Iowa Funding

EARLY CHILDHOOD GRANTS

The Iowa State Legislature appropriates state General Funds (prior to FY2014 these were federal Child Care Development Block Grant funds) for community grants to enhance the quality and capacity of child care through:

- Regular child care and provider recruitment,
- Child care for mildly ill children,
- 2nd and 3rd shift child care,
- Provider training, and
- Support for registration and licensure.
- Early Childhood Grants are awarded to all Early Childhood Iowa Areas via a formula. Beginning in FY '19, ECI begins a 4-year process to phase-in a new formula. The new formula is:
 - o 5% of the appropriation is distributed equally among all 99 counties
 - 35% of the appropriation is distributed based on the percent of the population in the ECIA that is age 0-5
 - 60% of the appropriation is distributed based on the percent of the population in the ECIA that is age 0-5 and at or below 185% of the poverty level
- ✓ As FY 18 and previous years, the formula was based on the number of Family Investment Plan (FIP) cases per county
- ✓ Early Childhood Iowa Area administrative expenditures are limited to 5% of the Early Childhood Grant award
- ✓ Beginning in FY2014, the Iowa Legislature changed the source of the Early Childhood funds from federal Child Care Development Block Grant funds to state general funds. This change reduced the fiscal requirements that are associated with federal funds and local area boards felt were burdensome.

SCHOOL READY GRANTS

- ✓ For FY18, \$2,229,368 shall be used for efforts to improve the quality of early care, health and education programs.
- ✓ For FY 18, \$18,753,801 is appropriated for supporting family support and preschool support service and general aid..
- ✓ Administrative expenditures are limited to 3% of the School Ready Grant award.
- ✓ Funds are state dollars.

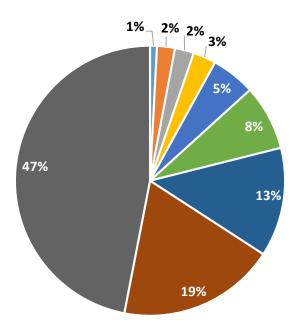

Early Childhood Iowa Funding

In SFY'19, ECI area board expenditures totaled over \$26.4 million in state funds. ECI area boards also reported over \$4.4 million in additional public and private dollars expended to support programs, services and staff. State-level ECI Office expended \$1,229,475. Of this amount, \$23,572 was expended for office expenditures, \$6,370 in travel expenses and \$279,438 for staff salary and benefits. The staff salary and benefits were for two full time and a part time administrative staff person in the ECI State Office. (Note: There was a brief gap based on the retirement of one staff person.) The staff salary and benefits also included \$55,000 from the Early Childhood appropriation to support a part time staff person to the ECI State Technical Assistance (TA) Team from the Department of Human Services (DHS). In addition to the one TA Team member from DHS, the Iowa Department of Public Health contributes a quarter time staff person and the Department of Education contributes a part time staff person, but the position has been vacant since March, 2019.

The remaining amount of funds expended was for state-level professional development. ECI receives funding at the state-level to support and move forward efforts to strengthen the early childhood's professional development system. The ECI State Office receives input from the ECI Professional Development Component Group to determine investments in the professional development system. Funds are primarily targeted for projects that would not otherwise happen on their own. In FY '19, the funding was \$920,095. (This included the allocation for professional development activities and additional funding from the ECI State Office administration funding.) Funded projects included the lowa Family Support Credential; Infant and Toddler Mental Health; Early Childhood Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports; T.E.A.C.H. IOWA Scholarships and Child Development Associate (CDA) Support; WAGE\$® IOWA Project; Child Care Nurse Consultant; and overall professional development coordination.
