OVERVIEW OF THE IOWA VETERANS TRUST FUND

This report fulfills the requirements of Iowa Code 35A.13, section 9:

The commission shall submit an annual report to the general assembly by January 15 of each year concerning the veterans trust fund created by this section. The annual report shall include financial information concerning the moneys in the trust fund and shall also include information on the number, amount, and type of expenditures, if any, from the fund during the prior calendar year for the purposes described in subsection 7.

Veterans must meet specific income and asset guidelines to qualify for Trust Fund assistance. Initially, the veteran and their family must have a household income below 300% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines (FPG). Some areas of assistance have a lower qualifying asset level. This is to prevent over utilization of the fund and to ensure that the veteran has either contributed some of their assets to their situation, or are truly in need.

Some veterans are only eligible for one category of assistance, such as unemployment assistance, while other applicants apply for and are eligible for multiple areas of assistance based on their needs. For example, a veteran requesting housing repair could also qualify for dental assistance. Applications for assistance may be deferred because the veteran has not provided sufficient evidence to warrant approval or denial, but have indicated they will provide the needed eligibility evidence.

The Iowa General Assembly has determined areas of eligible expenditures for Iowa veterans:

- Travel expenses for service-related medical care
- Unemployment or underemployment assistance due to service-related causes
- Job training or tuition assistance
- Assistance with vision, hearing, dental care, durable medical equipment, and prescription drugs
- Counseling and substance abuse services
- Emergency vehicle and housing repair
- A One –Time vehicle replacement, not exceeding \$5,000 or the value of the vehicle.
- Transitional housing in an emergency
- Emergency room and ambulance transportation assistance
- Funding to determine whether a deceased veteran is the father or mother of a child
- Funding for family support groups
- Grants for providing honor guard services at veteran’s funerals
- Homelessness one-time rental housing assistance

Trust Fund applications have substantially increased, due in part to the current economic conditions and publicity from the Iowa Lottery. During 2011, the Trust Fund interest balance was depleted and a waiting list was implemented. Legislative action in the 2012 session corrected this situation.

During the 2008 Legislative Session, HF 2359 was signed into law. This bill authorized the creation and sale of four new Iowa Lottery tickets to benefit the Iowa Veterans Trust Fund. In early July of 2008 the first scratch-off ticket was introduced and later that month the first pull tab ticket was introduced. First quarter sales met expectations, and in October 2008, \$992,771.80 was deposited into the principle balance of the Trust Fund account. It is anticipated that these tickets will provide between \$2 - \$3 million dollars annually in additional principle revenue.

The following information is provided by the Iowa Lottery:

Lottery Proceeds to Veterans Trust Fund Top \$37 Million

For the past 15 years, it has been the Iowa Lottery's honor to raise proceeds that benefit our state's veterans and their families through the Iowa Veterans Trust Fund.

Lottery proceeds were first dedicated to the IVTF in FY 2009 and a portion of the lottery's total annual proceeds to state causes continues to benefit the cause. With the lottery's most recent transfer to the fund in October 2022, lottery proceeds to the IVTF now total more than \$37.3 million.

In addition, the lottery highlights the IVTF throughout any given year, including at community festivals, sporting events, and veterans gatherings.

EXPENDITURES

Trust Fund expenditures can be separated into three separate categories: (1) Survivor Outreach Program, (2) Honor Guard reimbursement, and (3) Iowa Veterans Trust Fund.

From 2007-2011, Iowa Veterans Trust Fund operated exclusively on interest earned from the Iowa Lottery Principle Fund. Over time, this level of funding was deemed insufficient to meet program demand. In 2012, IDVA Director (Brig. Gen. Jodi Tymeson) identified the need, and requested legislation for an annual deposit of \$500,000 from the Lottery Principle Fund to supplement interest available to meet demand.

In January 2020, the Veterans Affairs Commission recognized costs of services had escalated since 2012 due to regular inflation, and other indirect events with direct cost consequences, such as the 2019 Derecho, 2020 COVID epidemic and resulting global supply chain challenges. With these increasing burdens on veterans in mind, the Commission made practical changes to the Trust Fund language. These changes adapted the program to increase eligibility to funds for veterans and military families. The increased need subsequently created an unprecedented influx of application requests for assistance.

Recognizing this growing need in late 2021, the Iowa Veterans Commission requested legislation for an annual increase of \$300,000 from the Lottery Principle Fund, to a total suggested annual deposit of \$800,000 for FY23 and beyond. This was included in the Commission's Legislative Priorities for 2022. While the measure passed Veterans Affairs Committees unanimously in both chambers, the bill (HF 2293) did not make the floor for a final vote. As a result, the Trust Fund deposit for FY23 remained at \$500,000 and was expended by October 2022.

In November 2022, the Iowa Commission of Veterans Affairs voted it prudent to postpone acceptance of any future requests until additional funds are available.
