Alignment

In early January, Governor Reynolds announced her intention to streamline cabinet-level departments through legislation during her State of the State address.



The proposed legislation aimed to restructure the current 37 cabinet departments into 16, including a reorganization of the Department of Corrections (DOC) to oversee the eight community-based corrections (CBC) districts.

It signals a significant change in the management and administration of correctional services at the state level. By consolidating cabinet departments and placing CBCs under the direct oversight of the DOC, the state is seeking to improve coordination and standardization across the correctional system. Additionally, transitioning CBC employees to official state employees represents a fundamental shift in the organizational structure and management of community-based correctional services, which has been in place for nearly 40 years.

The proposed legislation passed in March, and the work of the DOC and CBCs began. The Governor and the Director of DOC were committed to avoiding layoffs, maintaining current pay for DOC staff, and ensuring consistent and equitable service delivery to their clients. To facilitate this transition, DOC partnered with organizational change management company Guidehouse and developed several strategies for communication and organizational changes.



Alignment - cont.

Strategies implemented by the DOC for communication and organizational changes include:

- → Collaborating with the Department of Administrative Services (DAS) to classify all CBC positions and align them with current state positions or create new ones.
- \rightarrow Engaging with CBC staff in every district, addressing questions, concerns, and gathering feedback.
- Implementing a Google form to collect staff questions and comments, which were reviewed and addressed regularly through FAQ communication.
- → Sending regular email updates with short videos on the alignment.
- Creating a SharePoint site as a one-stop location for alignment information.
- Conducting staff surveys to gauge alignment understanding.
- Meeting weekly with District Directors, HR, and Fiscal staff.
- Communicating weekly with District Directors to provide a summary of key decisions.
- Establishing the Corrections Connections Newsletter to highlight staff accomplishments, colleagues' acknowledgments, and provide information about statewide developments in DOC.
- → Hosting a virtual Town Hall with the Director and her team.
- → Forming a Change Champions Network to represent the institutions and districts.
- → Partnering with Guidehouse and ACJI in Culture Transformation work.

The alignment work is ongoing, with major future milestones such as transitioning the districts to the state's financial and human resources platforms, implementing consistent district policies and practices, and undertaking further culture change work.

The dedicated staff have successfully navigated the transition and are committed to moving the DOC towards an aligned organization that provides quality services to those they serve and the citizens of our great State of Iowa.



Incarcerated Individual Education

Secondary/Vocational Report

Secondary instructors engaged in valuable work on pedagogy, delivery methods and best practices in providing high school competency-based education. In FY2023 (258 completions) and FY22 (311 completions), all five colleges offering high school competency-based diplomas were completed. Despite barrier impacts, instructors have constantly been able to provide our basic skills students with much needed regular face-to-face instruction.

Post-Secondary

Beginning July 1, 2023, Pell Grants were reinstated for incarcerated individuals regardless of sentence length or conviction. This provides incarcerated individuals interested in pursuing higher education access to funding up to a bachelor's degree. Due to the realignment of state agencies, the DOC delayed the application process for colleges to become Prison Education Programs (PEPs) until 2024. The plan is to continue with colleges that are currently offering programming through Pell grants under the expanded Second Chance Pell experiment or through private funding. The goal is to have post-secondary education options at each facility in the future.

Current partner colleges include:

North Central Correctional Facility, Fort Dodge Correctional Facility and Iowa Medical and Classification Center were approved for Correctional Education Accreditation in FY2023! This is a regular three year review process.

Correctional Education Accreditation

Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act Funding

Federal funding from the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act provides targeted funding for workforce education for incarcerated students. The FY22 - 23 grant was awarded to Des Moines Area Community College providing educational services for ICIW and NCF. The first CTE programs for Heavy Equipment Simulators were purchased for each location. Students are very anxious to get started at both facilities.

- Centralized New Employee Training Academy began January 2023.
- The CQI specialists created a new online DRAOR CBC CQI training and built institution DRAOR CQI benches.

FY23 Learning Summary



DRAOR CBC CQI Training

The IDOC CQI Specialists are finishing the completion of a DRAOR CQI CBC Training.

This includes an online component as well as in person training followed by coaching and feedback to bring staff to proficiency. This training will roll out December 2023. In addition, institution DRAOR CQI benches were built certifying 14 new DRAOR Institution CQI staff.

This year, 270 staff completed DRAOR training in both prisons and institutions.

CQI is a guiding principle and foundational part of the Institution-CBC alignment. We continue to enhance our CQI efforts during the course of this transition.

Centralized NET Academy

Centralized NET began January of 2023. We oversee two centralized academies, one at IMCC and one at Central Office each month. This training includes a hybrid approach along with practical skills applications. To date, 334

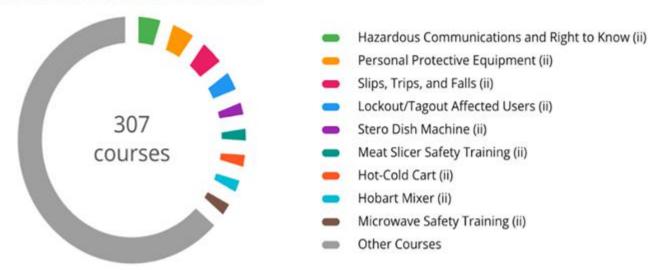
new staff have graduated from the centralized academy.

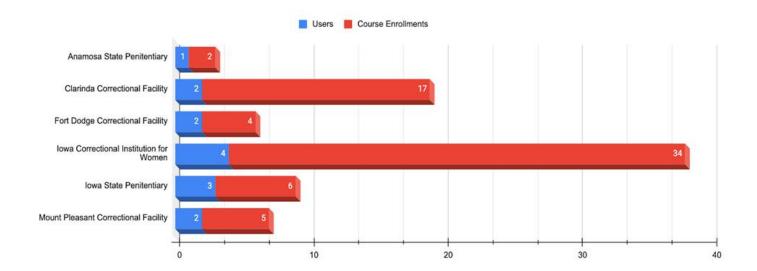

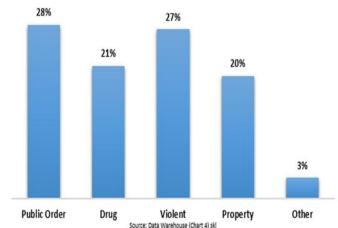

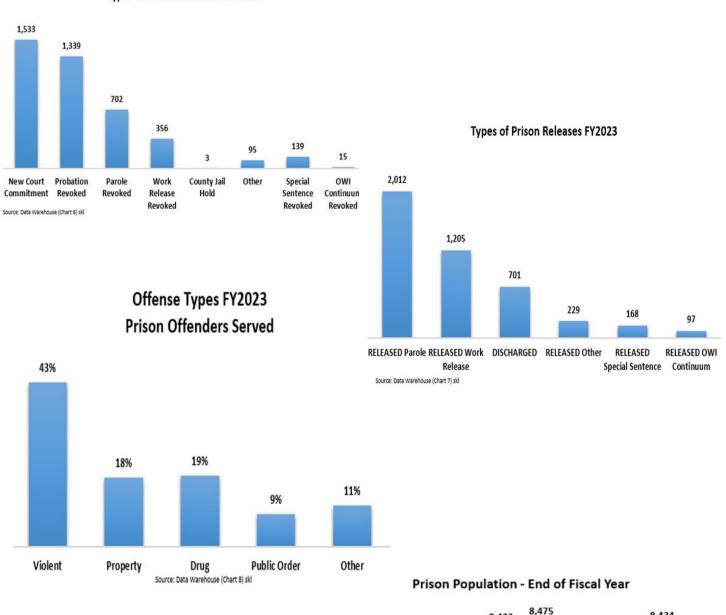


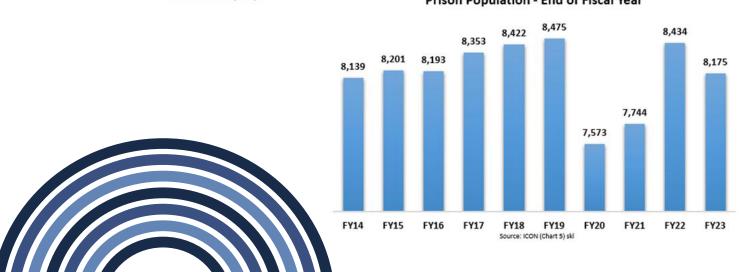
Offense Types FY2023 Community Based Offenders Served

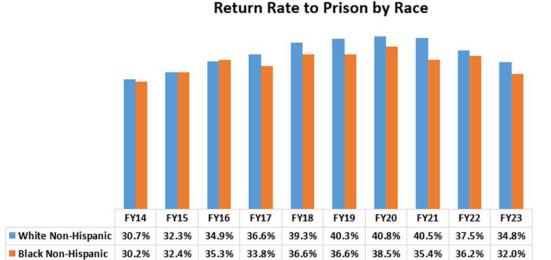

Tracking recidivism by race has always been an important element of observation at the IDOC. The data demonstrate that over the last ten fiscal years, while recidivism has risen and fallen, generally the recidivism rate by race is generally equitable, with some periods noted where the White recidivism rate is slightly higher than the cohort of Black individuals. The IDOC will continue to monitor recidivism by race overtime to help ensure fair and equitable treatment and outcomes are observed amongst the lowa population.

Implementing the Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA)

Why this is important. It's about offender safety. PREA is a federal statute focused on sexual assault and victimization in juvenile facilities, prisons, jails, lockups, and other detention facilities. The goal of PREA is to prevent, detect, and respond to sexual abuser in detention and correctional facilities.

What we're doing about this: All DOC institutions have completed and passed PREA audits that ensure compliance with PREA Standards. Audits are conducted every three years to ensure compliance.

Prison Suicides

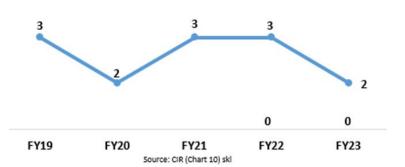
Why this is important. It's about providing basic life care for individuals in custody, and intervening effectively to prevent them from harming themselves.

What we're doing about this: Staff training is key to prevention. Recognizing the warning signs of someone contemplating suicide, and intervening in an emergency situation are essential. Staff training goes beyond these basics to include recognition of and effective communication with individuals who have mental health issues. Regular screening for mental illness and provision of appropriate levels of care ranging from acute units to integration within the general inmate population is also important in reducing suicide incidents.

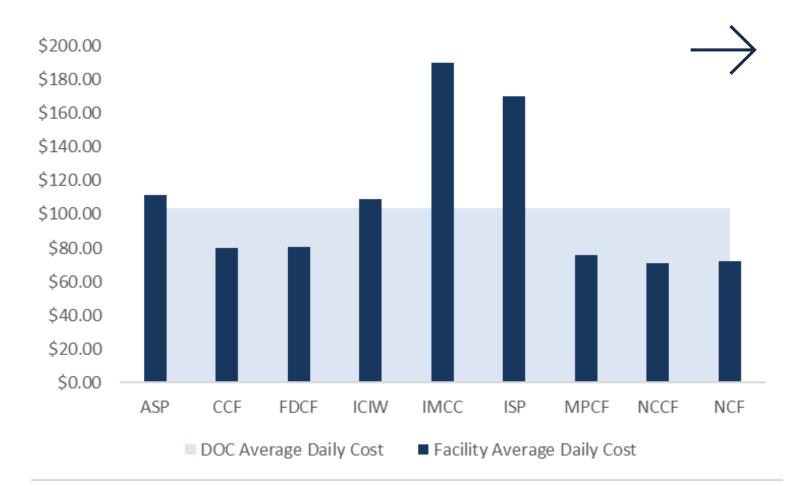
