Re: Infrastructure Status Reports

The reports referenced in this document were submitted by various state agencies to the Legislative Services Agency in accordance with the following provisions: Iowa Code sections 8.57(5)(i), 8.57A(5), 8.57B(5), 8.57C(4), 12E.12, 12.79, 12.88 and 12.88A and chapter 1179, section 19, 2006 Iowa Acts.

These provisions require the agencies to submit reports annually regarding appropriations received from any of the infrastructure funds, including the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund, Environment First Fund, ¹ Vertical Infrastructure Fund, Technology Reinvestment Fund, FY 2009 Prison Bonding Fund, the restricted capital tobacco funds, Revenue Bonds Capitals Fund, and the Revenue Bonds Capitals II Fund.

Per the statutory provisions, agencies must provide the status of all projects, completed or in progress, including:

- Description of the project.
- Progress of work completed.
- Total estimated cost of the project.
- List of all revenue sources being used to fund the project.
- Amount of funds expended.
- Amount of funds obligated.
- Date the project was completed or an estimated completion date of the project, where applicable.

Legislative intent required receipt of annual infrastructure reports so the General Assembly could have detailed updates on capital projects and the use of infrastructure funds. This is particularly important as infrastructure funds are often appropriated over multiple years and appropriations from infrastructure funds typically do not revert for approximately four years. House File 822 (FY 2010 Infrastructure Appropriations Act) added the requirement that *any recipient* of infrastructure funding must report to the agency that provided the pass-through for the funding, so the agency can report to the General Assembly about the use of the funds. The intent is to ensure reporting on all uses of infrastructure funding, whether or not for capital projects.²

In accordance with the Code of Iowa, Sections 8.57 and 8A.321, this annual report summarizes the status of all ongoing building-related projects for which appropriations from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund, the Vertical Infrastructure Fund, Ijobs or the Tobacco Settlement Trust Fund have been made to the Department of Administrative Services. The report includes projects for which funding reverted in 2014 as well as ongoing projects. The column reflecting available balances for each appropriation is the sum of the total funds less the total contracted funds. The available balance totals do not include reverted amounts.

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Infrastructure Appropriations for Facilities Statewide

Major Maintenance

Description of the Work:

Major maintenance projects statewide for twelve agencies and divisions participating in the Vertical Infrastructure Program, including the Department of Administrative Services; the Department of Commerce, Alcoholic Beverages Division; the Department of Corrections; the Department of Cultural Affairs; the Department of Education, including Iowa Public Television and Iowa Vocational Rehabilitation Services; the Department of Human Services; Iowa Law Enforcement Academy; the Department of Public Safety; Terrace Hill; Iowa Veterans Home and Iowa Workforce Development.

Progress of the Work:

Work is on-going and many projects have been completed. A complete list of projects is available online at http://das.iowa.gov/financials/.

Total Estimated Cost: \$62,268,812

Total estimated cost represents major maintenance appropriations since 2009. Additional funding sources include agency operations funds for specific projects. Please note 0C99 was appropriated in two consecutive fiscal years: \$6,860,252 was appropriated in FY2009 and another \$3,000,000 was added in FY2010. R523 was also appropriated in two consecutive fiscal years: \$10,250,000 was appropriated in FY2013 and \$4,000,000 was appropriated in FY14 (\$2,000,000 of the FY14 amount was deappropriated). The appropriations have been combined into one total line each for 0C99 and R523 below.

Infrastructure Appropriations for Capitol Complex Facilities

West Capitol Terrace/Removal of Parking Lots 7 & 8

Description of the Work:

Funding has been provided for planning and design, including removal of temporary parking lots 7 and 8 west of the Capitol and replacement with an ADA compliant walkway between East 7th and Finkbine, including landscaping to create a major public greenspace at the west entrance to the Capitol Complex.

Progress of the Work:

The parking lots were removed in the summer of 2006. Phase 1 work was completed in 2007. Phase 2 work and the removal of the Row House, including extension of the west plaza pavers, was completed in 2014.

Capitol Interior and Exterior Restoration

Description of the Work:

On-going interior and exterior restoration of the State of Iowa's Capitol, a building on the National Register of Historic Places. More specifically, the intent of this project is to bring the Capitol in compliance with the State of Iowa Building Code while restoring the Capitol's historic look.

Progress of the Work:

In the center of the 1st floor rotunda, installed a replica of the original glass floor. Replaced the existing drop cords on the floor of the Law Library with hard wired electrical outlets routed under the floor. Installed a large filter as the Capitol Complex chilled water system enters the Capitol. Installed 20 fan coil units on the ground, first, and second floors to increase ventilation. Removed redundant mechanical piping from the southwest corner of the Attic to eliminate numerous water leaks. Upgraded the House of Representatives voting console outlets. Installed a lightning protection system.

Total Cost: \$5,341,809

The official reversion date for OR58 is 6/30/2016; however, the majority of funds were expended prior to 6/30/2014 so the remaining \$81 balance was reverted early.

Relocation and Leasing Assistance

Description of the Work:

Funding is for move-related expenses, temporary lease costs, tenant improvements at leased locations and other locations, and other relocation expenses related to renovation of and movement into buildings on the Capitol Complex. This funding enables selected agencies that are currently paying for leases off-complex to return to the Capitol Complex. It also allows for the temporary relocation of agencies on the Capitol Complex to off-complex locations, as may be required from time to time depending upon changing program needs.

Progress of the Work:

Improvements were made in the Grimes Building basement for the Department of Education. Relocated the Office of Drug Control Policy from Wallace to the Oran Pape Building due to legislation. Relocated all Iowa Building tenants. Iowa College Student Aid Commission (ICSAC) was relocated to leased space and received rent and communications cost assistance. The Department for the Blind record storage was relocated back to its central office. DOC Pharmacy was relocated to a newly renovated building at Mitchellville. ICN Circuits for Racing & Gaming were moved out of the Iowa Building to 1300 Des Moines St. In FY14, DMACC was reimbursed for its renovation costs in the Iowa building, prorated for its tenure. Funds were used for start up of the Public Information Board and for the relocation of the Iowa Insurance Division from River Hills to the Ruan building. Funds were used to relocate DNR from its leased location at 401 SW 7th to the Wallace building. GSE was consolidated to FMC. A workplace environmental anaysis was conducted pursuant to legislation. Equipment from the Iowa building was removed and the entire building was vacated. Relocated the cell towers from the roof of the Iowa Building.

Total Cost: \$7,057,814

\$5,625,066 was appropriated between 2003 - 2005, with reversion dates between 2006 - 2009, and an additional \$1,824,500 was appropriated in 2008, with a reversion date of 6/30/2014. The appropriations have been combined into one line below.

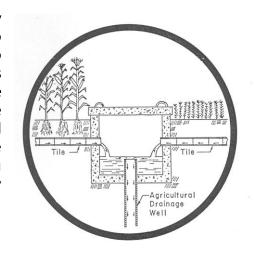

DIVISION OF SOIL CONSERVATION

AGRICULTURAL DRAINAGE WELL CLOSURE ASSISTANCE FUND

Agricultural drainage wells (ADWs) were developed in the early to mid 1900's and discharge cropland tile drainage water to underground aquifers. The fund was established in 1997 to protect drinking water aquifers by cost-sharing with landowners to close agricultural drainage wells and develop alternative drainage outlets to surface streams or install alternative management practices. Projects are typically constructed through drainage districts, although some projects are undertaken by individual landowners. Some of the remaining wells to be closed are located in karst areas with shallow limestone.





- 300 registered agricultural drainage wells (ADWs) in lowa
- 99 ADWs closed by landowners, Watershed Improvement Review Board funding, or determined by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to not be ADWs or to be non-functioning
- 134 ADWs closed to date using \$10.09 million of assistance funds
- 19 ADW closures in project closeout phase
- 12 ADW closures in bid phase with 2015 construction
- 36 ADWs remain in continued use with DNR permits.
- 8 ADW closures anticipated for FY16

IOWA CONSERVATION RESERVE ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM (CREP)

The lowa Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) was initiated in 2001 and is a joint effort of the lowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship and the USDA Farm Service Agency to protect lowa drinking water and reduce hypoxia in the Gulf of Mexico. It is a highly targeted water quality program focusing on the reduction of nitrate loads to surface waters through the restoration of strategically located and designed wetlands that intercept tile-drainage water from upper-lying cropland.

- Research and monitoring by Iowa State University has shown that CREP wetlands remove 40-90% of the nitrate in tile-drainage water
- Wetlands restored to date (72) and those currently being designed (24) are estimated to remove over 1,300,000 lbs of nitrogen <u>annually</u>. Nearly 100,000 tons of nitrogen will be removed over design life. These wetlands will provide water quality protection for 121,650 acres of land
- Hundreds of potential wetland locations exist for landowner consideration
- Average lifetime nitrogen removal costs: \$0.23/lb
- Currently there is over a 7-year waiting list of applicants that have requested state funding
- State funds are matched with Federal funds

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DISTRICT INITIATIVES/BUFFER INITIATIVE

The District Initiatives/Buffer Initiative (Conservation Reserve Program-CRP) was established in 2000 as a part of the lowa Water Quality Initiative. Program initiatives are delivered through local Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs) in cooperation with the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to leverage dollars for federal conservation programs, increasing lowa's overall participation in both state and federal programs. Locally-led initiatives prioritize and target sensitive areas, by providing funds and resources to protect our soil and water resources.







- SWCDs receive funds to provide technical assistance to enroll CRP and install Federal Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) practices.
- Iowa leads the nation in the USDA Continuous CRP with 667,376 acres enrolled.
- Under the EQIP program, landowners have invested over \$15,000,000 along with over \$23,000,000 from federal funds.
- SWCDs partner with Pheasants Forever, NRCS and IDNR to support habitat improvement projects on private land.
- Incentives support grazing systems on expiring CRP contracts that support permanent cover; and filters and buffers that protect lowa's lakes, rivers and streams.
- SWCDs and staff work one-on-one with landowners and operators to implement conservation practices.

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INTEGRATED FARM & LIVESTOCK MANAGEMENT DEMONSTRATION PROGRAM

The Integrated Farm and Livestock Management demonstration program was initiated in 2000 as part of the lowa Water Quality Initiative to demonstrate the adaptability and effectiveness of conservation systems with farming operations. New and emerging technologies are demonstrated on private farmland to refine management input to reduce erosion and soil loss, enhance soil quality, increase infiltration, reduce runoff and lessen nutrient and sediment loading to lowa's water bodies. Resources and infrastructure are leveraged to provide extensive information delivery and exchange for other important issues such as row crop residue harvest for biofuels, cover crops and perennial living mulch, and nutrient transport from cropped landscapes.

Iowa Learning Farms, coordinated by Iowa State University, is building a "Culture of Conservation" through a partnership of farmers, agencies, conservation groups, agribusiness, the research community, and the public that continuing change supports improved water and soil quality in improved tillage, cover crop, and residue management demonstrations. field Approximately 100 cooperators and conservationists in lowa's five major soil associations allowed farmers to evaluate agronomic information and share local wisdom.



- A strong statewide awareness campaign utilizing a farmer-to-farmer, lowan-to-lowan grassroots approach included more than 130 public events across lowa in 2014.
- Education and outreach to thousands of individuals strengthened society's commitment to the conservation of natural resources to sustain our quality of life.
- Iowa Soybean Association's agriculture and environment performance program has been allocated \$400,000 by legislative earmark.
- Funds leveraged with federal grants and other sources bring millions of additional dollars to lowa.

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IOWA CONSERVATION COST SHARE PROGRAM

lowa's Conservation Cost Share program was established in 1973 to protect the soil and water resources of the state from erosion and sediment damage. The program encourages the adoption of farm management and agricultural practices that are consistent with the capability of the land to sustain agriculture while preserving the state's natural resources. Technical assistance is provided by IDALS-DSC and the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), and practices are designed to NRCS technical standards. Applicants are required to enter into maintenance agreements to ensure long-term success and performance. Funds are administered locally by lowa's 100 Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs).



- Soil and water conservation practices:
 - enhance soil quality and improve water infiltration
 - reduce erosion, soil loss and runoff
 - reduce water impairments from sediment and nutrients
 - reduce storm water impact on private property and infrastructure
- From July 1 to December 31, 2014, IDALS processed landowner payments for 1,263 soil and water conservation practices.
- 36,349 acres were benefited with a soil loss reduction of 219,000 tons/year
 - Includes 1,144,966' of terraces, 215 acres of waterways, 22,880 acres of cover crops,
 71 grade stabilization structures, 77 water and sediment control basins
- Landowners invest a minimum of 50% of their own money on these practices
- The investment of cost-share funds and those of private landowners are reinvested in lowa's local economies benefiting the communities

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SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION ADMINISTRATION

There is a need to improve soil quality, maintain productivity, enhance water quality, manage nutrients properly, and provide flood protection. To do so and ensure program dollars are spent effectively; we need to provide the best administrative and technical assistance possible for the lowa Financial Incentives Program, Resource Enhancement and Protection Program, Watershed Protection Fund, Water Protection Fund Projects and State Revolving Fund Program. Staff also assist with implementing projects and practices funded by the federal government including the Environmental Quality Incentive Program, Conservation Reserve Program, Wetland Reserve Program, Wildlife Habitat Incentive Program, and others programs in all 99 counties and 100 SWCDs.



Currently there are 28 (16 secretaries and 12 technicians) vacant positions that need to be filled so that all 100 offices will be fully functional and able to communicate and provide assistance to implement conservation practices

WATERSHED PROTECTION FUND

The Watershed Protection Fund was initiated in 2000 as part of the broader lowa Water Quality Initiative. Watershed development funds are available to Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs) for that first important step of identifying problems in the watershed and creating a sound plan for improvement. Implementation of watershed protection projects brings together the community, both rural and urban, to target resources to reduce soil erosion, protect water quality, provide flood reduction, and protect natural resources. IDALS-DSC, the lowa Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) work together in the support of these projects in order to achieve the maximum watershed improvements and water quality benefits with the state and federal program funds available to each agency.







- 23 watershed projects are underway in 35 SWCDs
- State funds are cost-shared at rates up to 75% with applicants assuming at least 25% of the cost
- 72 watershed project claims were reimbursed totaling \$556,381 and leveraging \$682,602 from other sources including applicant contributions
- 1,666 acres were protected with a soil loss reduction of 4,149 tons/year
- Sediment delivery to the state's water bodies was reduced by 6,804 tons/year
- Projects have leveraged state funds with approximately \$3,500,000 of DNR Section 319 federal program funds

IOWA WATERSHED IMPROVEMENT REVIEW BOARD (WIRB) ADMINISTRATION

The Iowa Watershed Improvement Review Board (WIRB) was initiated in 2005. This Board is responsible for awarding grants to water quality improvement and flood prevention projects. The WIRB is comprised of representatives from agriculture, drinking water and wastewater utilities, environmental organizations, agribusiness, the conservation community along with two state senators and two state representatives.







Administrative support to the Board is provided by the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship—Division of Soil Conservation.

- The Board oversees 47 active projects lasting up to three years.
- These 47 projects have been awarded \$8,953,698 from the WIRB and have spent \$3,537,493.
- The funded projects are accountable to the WIRB through progress reports submitted biannually
 that summarize activities completed and provide details of expenditures. Annual project reports
 are also included with the WIRB annual report to the Legislature and the Governor.

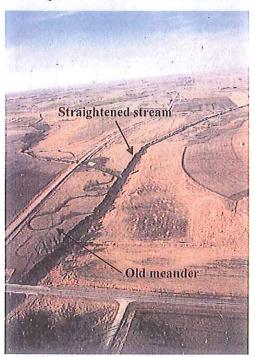
The Problem

The Hungry Canyons Alliance (HCA) was formed locally to research and implement solutions to the problem of stream channel erosion and degradation in a 23 county area of the deep loess soils region of western Iowa. Channelization of streams and land use changes during the first half of the 1900's caused stream channels to erode, causing an estimated \$1.1 billion in damages to public and private infrastructure (bridges, culverts, utility lines, etc.), loss of farmland, and increased sediment loads. A survey of western Iowa bridges in 2000 revealed that 404 were endangered due to

stream channel degradation. Golden Hills RC&D in Oakland, Iowa helped to form and currently provides office space and administrative assistance to the Hungry Canyons Alliance.

The Solution

A proven, affordable solution to this problem is to build grade control structures in streams. Grade control structures (GCS) at regular intervals help streams stabilize by changing their longitudinal profile from an erosive steep incline to a stable stair-step pattern. Streambed stabilization is the key to preventing further erosion and protecting infrastructure. GCS design is largely dependent on drainage area. Small drainage areas can often be controlled with reinforced concrete box (RCB) or corrugated metal pipe (CMP) culverts with drop inlets and/or flume outlets. Large drainage areas are often controlled with weirs constructed with steel sheet pile, driven into the streambed, with a riprap and concrete grout slope immediately downstream, a riprap stilling basin downstream of the weir slope, and riprap covered banks. Both RCB/CMP and weir designs allow the stream elevation to drop in a controlled setting, restore lost stream grade, prevent further degradation, and reduce streambed slope upstream creating a calm backwater condition where silt can settle out, decreasing sediment loads and turbidity and increasing water quality. Sediment re-deposited upstream also helps support exposed

bridge pilings.

The Savings

The HCA provides state and federal money available to the 23 counties through a cost share program for grade control structures (GCS). County governments provide a minimum of 20% match for each GCS. Since 1992, the program has provided \$23.2 million in state and federal appropriations and the technical assistance needed to complete 358 GCS in 19 counties in western Iowa. Another 18 GCS are in progress. These GCS will protect an estimated \$90.5 million in property value. It is estimated that 686.5 acres of land, equivalent to 23.9 million tons of sediment, will be protected from erosion by construction of the 376 GCS. HCA grade

Match for EWP Program:

Eighteen (18) western Iowa counties were declared eligible for federal disaster assistance due to severe rains in May 2007 and June 2008 which caused flooding and stream channel damage, endangering or destroying county infrastructure. The NRCS-EWP program provided cost share for new GCS and repairs to existing GCS. In order to complete as many EWP projects as possible while the money was available to western Iowa, the HCA agreed to provide 10% of the match, reducing the counties match to 15%, for any EWP projects which provided grade control or were directly associated with existing GCS projects. The state appropriated \$100,000 to the HCA for FY10 specifically for this purpose.

FY-2014 LOESS HILLS ALLIANCE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

Iowa code 161D established the Loess Hills Alliance on March 15, 1999 as a part of the Loess Hills Development and Conservation Authority. The Hungry Canyons Alliance was also authorized under this authority. Funds are directed to both non-profit organizations through the Iowa legislature. State funds are used to match and fund projects under the discretion of each organization. Statutory responsibilities include:

- To apply for, accept, and expend public and private funds for planning and implementing projects, programs, and other components of the mission of the Loess Hills Alliance subject to approval of the authority.
- To study different options for the protection and preservation of significant historic, scenic, geologic, and recreational areas of the Loess Hills including but not limited to a federal or state park, preserve, or monument designation, fee title acquisition, or restrictive easement.
- To develop and implement pilot projects for the protection of Loess Hills areas with the
 use of restrictive easements from willing sellers and fee title ownership from willing
 sellers subject to approval of the authority.

The Loess Hills Alliance strives to protect special natural and cultural resources while ensuring the economic viability and private property rights of the region through the creation of a common vision for Iowa's Loess Hills.

The Loess Hills Alliance Executive Board Ensures that the funds appropriated from state funding are used wisely. The most successful use of those funds has included partnering with other organizations such as Pheasants Forever, local NRCS offices, and Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation as well as farmers and private land owners to leverage the dollars for the best possible mutually beneficial outcome within the Loess Hills. The funds were used as follows:

• \$96,000 was allocated equally to the three standing committees – Economic Development, Protection, and Stewardship which was \$32,000 for each committee.

• \$15,000 was made available for administrative purposes such as board meetings and secretarial expenses.

In August 2012, the Loess Hills Alliance received from the Shirley Vannorsdel Estate a bequeath of \$280,739.05 that has been used for projects in Plymouth County. Plymouth County Conservation Board received \$80,000 towards equipment to protect Loess Hills acres and landowners received funding to protect approximately 183 acres. Donations such as these show genuine support of the Loess Hills Alliance from local residents.

In 2013 the Executive Committee, with a vote of the full Board of Directors, began exploring the feasibility of a National Reserve designation for the Loess Hills Region with the National Parks Service. The Executive Committee hired Michelle Walker part time to help facilitate this project with a subcommittee of volunteers.

- Beginning in January 2014 the Executive Board began hosting a series of public meetings in each county within the region to disseminate information and receive input and recommendations of the general public.
- Ultimately the Full Board voted to pursue other opportunities within the Loess Hills rather than a National Reserve Designation.
- Much information was gathered through this process and will be invaluable to the Alliance for future focus and direction of our organization.
- This information has led the Executive Board to return to a grass roots effort of support for the public and landowners within the Loess Hills.
- The Executive Board has continued and will continue to seek valuable input and direction from both the public and Full Board Members. The Loess Hills Alliance seeks to offer unique, collaborative leadership and address gaps in services to comprehensively protect the Loess Hills, which no other organization currently provides.

The Loess Hills Alliance Executive Board works continuously to ensure the work of all the Loess Hills Alliance committees falls within the parameters of our mission statement which is: To protect the natural and cultural resources of the Loess Hills while ensuring economic viability and private property rights through the creation of a common vision for Iowa's Loess Hills. All efforts of the Loess Hills Alliance work hand in hand with the Comprehensive Plan and Legislative Responsibilities.

MISSION

The Economic Development Committee worked this year to meet the goals set forth in our mission. It is our endeavor to enhance the economy of the Loess Hills region by:

- *Providing assistance and being a resource for small businesses and community attractions as decided by committee members.
- *Increasing visitor traffic at recreation facilities, events and area attractions.
- *Offering education and technical assistance to business and government agencies.

The committee consists of representatives from economic development, conservation, recreation, convention and visitors bureaus, elected officials on local and federal levels, and small businesses and tourist attractions. The committee meets quarterly at a central location.

Once again an ad was placed in the Western Iowa Tourism Region Cooperative Advertising Insert. This is distributed to 515,000 homes as a newspaper insert in MN, SD, NE, KS, MO and Iowa. There was also online advertising that accompanied the ad insert and allowed for people to go to a link and see the ad as well.





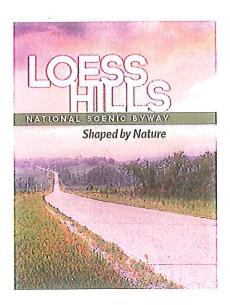

FULFILLMENT

The Western Iowa Tourism Region receives and fulfills requests for information about the Loess Hills and the Alliance. For the Fiscal Year running July 2013-June 2014 fulfillment pieces mailed on behalf of the Alliance was over 1,500.

Tear off maps continue to be placed at welcome centers, hotels, etc. so that recreational maps of the area can be picked up and utilized by travelers. The tear offs are broken into Northern and Southern sections and have recreational information on the back separated by county.

The brochures that feature birding, motorcycling and RVing continue to go over very well. They continue to be placed in welcome centers and area attractions and businesses. The brochures are available on the Loess Hills Alliance website.





LHA Stewardship Committee: 2014 End of Year Report

Stewardship Field Days

The Stewardship Committee held 3 well publicized field days this spring and summer to increase opportunities for the public to learn more about our mission and activities and to socialize with LHA members. Field days were held on different days of the week and at different times to reach the broadest audience possible. In total, 24 people attended.

The first field day, in May, was held at the Leon Bracker farm near Pisgah. Mr. Bracker had received funds from the America's Great Outdoors Loess Hills Initiative for invasive cedar tree removal.

The second field day was held in late June at the Gary Liebsch property near Glenwood. Mr. Liebsch has a conservation easement on over 1,000 acres and is actively restoring oak savanna, prairie, and woodlands on his property.

The third and final field day was held at the Bob and Janet Madsen property near Hornick. Bob and Janet have used several cost share programs and private dollars to remove cedar trees and have a thriving prairie currently managed with grazing and fire. The group spent a few hours inventorying and learning about native prairie plants.

Private Lands Positions

The Loess Hills Alliance continues to provide support for 3 private lands positions, in partnership with the Iowa DNR, Soil and Water Conservation Districts, National and local Pheasants Forever and the Natural Resources Conservation Service. These positions are providing outreach and technical assistance to private landowners on conservation planning and implementation.

The Loess Hills Alliance and other non-profit organizations are working in the region to balance development and permanent protection. Together, these organizations partner to restore native vegetation, protect cultural resources, educate landowners and the public and minimize human impact to significant areas. We all strive to promote the unique history and characteristics of the landscape.

The Protection Committee approved the amount of \$38,000 to be offered for grants this fiscal year. Listed here are projects funded by the *Protection Committee* of the LHA from FY 2014.

2014 RFP Funded Projects

- 1. The Nature Conservancy: \$30,000 towards an 18.4 acre acquisition in Pottawattamie County within the Folsom Point SLA.
- 2. Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation: \$15,000 toward 152 acre acquisition in Monona County within the Turin SLA.

The Executive Committee contributed the additional \$7,000 to fully fund both projects.

FY 2012- RIIF

\$1.2 Million appropriated to DAS (agency 335) for the purpose of State Historical Building Exterior Repairs & Improvements

Update: The initial planning by DAS and Keffer Overton for exterior repairs & improvements included estimates for repairing the granite at the perimeter of the building's base where panels were detaching or have loosened due to weather, normal wear and tear or have been damaged by force (car running into building). DAS and Keffer Overton developed three options to repair and reinforce the granite at the base of the building. The plan is to complete the first level of repair covering the most severely damaged granite and concrete, and areas that presented a public safety concern. DAS and Ryan Companies oversaw the exterior work, of which the majority was completed in 2013 and the remaining amounts will be completed in spring of 2014. The exterior work is expected to cost just over \$900,000.

In addition, the DCA initiated Program & Planning, and working with DAS, DCA contracted with museum expert planners Lord Cultural Resources. Lord Cultural Resources compiled a Building Needs Assessment Study & Facility Strategy which provided recommendations and cost estimations (prepared by the combined team of Lord Cultural Resources, DCA, DAS and Ryan Construction) for three options for the State Historical Building: first, to only complete the deferred maintenance, second, to undergo a partial renovation, and third, to demolish and rebuild on the same site. After DCA presented the options to the Governor and the Legislature, the partial renovation of the existing building was determined to be the best option. The team was asked to move ahead by more fully developing a high level project timeline and cash flow for the partial renovation option.

In 2014, DCA and DAS continued to work with Lord Cultural Resources with Ryan Construction on Master Planning and existing building studies. Further, Shive-Hattery performed a building condition review of the State Historical Building to assist in evaluating the overall condition of the facility as it relates to structural, architectural, mechanical and electrical systems. The building study evaluated the building and building systems, noted deficiencies, recommended improvements and the estimated costs of these improvements, exclusive of engineering design or construction management fees.

Balance: \$1,160,706 has been expended. The balance is \$39,294 and will be used for additional building planning work.

FY2013 - RIIF

\$1.45 Million appropriated to DCA (agency 259) for planning, design, construction and renovation of the State Historical Building.

Update: DAS and DCA worked in partnership with Ryan Companies to contract with Slingshot Architecture to develop plans for minor improvements to the State Historical Building Atrium space. The Museum Atrium space had significant water damage from leaking skylights and outdated drainage systems, and as a result, damaged exhibits, floors and infrastructure. Long overdue improvements were made to a portion of the damaged, buckling floor, some lighting and electrical wiring was updated, some exhibits were removed, and damaged walls were repaired and painted to improve the aesthetic of the space and making it more welcoming to the public. The DCA made additional improvements to the auditorium, enhanced the exhibit entrances to better introduce Museum visitors to the exhibition galleries, improved navigational signage and created a destination for customer service with a new visitor desk.

The team will continue to identify improvements that will create easy-to-navigate spaces, identify efficiencies to better serve the public, solve collections management (climate and storage) issues, positively impact the visitor experience for the next 3-5 years, and support the overall renovation plans.

In 2014, DCA fully engaged in comprehensive Master Planning utilizing the expertise of Lord Cultural Resources. Master Planning is being completed in phases in 2014 that include Research & Community Engagement, Visitor Experience & Exhibition Strategy, Institutional & Business Planning, Architectural & Capital Planning, Fundraising and External Community Engagement. A key piece of the Master Planning was the statewide Community Engagement whereas Iowans had the opportunity to share their ideas and priorities in a meaningful discussion.

Balance: Of the \$1.45M appropriated to DCA for planning, design, construction and renovation of the State Historical Building in FY13, \$782,782 has been expended and encumbered; \$667,218 remains and will be used for additional planning, design, construction and renovation.

FY 2014 - RIIF

\$1 Million appropriated to DCA (agency 259) for planning, design, construction and renovation of the State Historical Building.

Balance: Of the \$1 Million appropriated to DCA for planning, design, construction and renovation of the State Historical Building for FY14, \$692,416 has been expended and encumbered for master planning; \$307,584 remains and will be used for additional planning, design, construction and renovation.

FY 2013 - RIIF

\$150,000 appropriated to the Grout Museum District for the Today's Hero's: Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans Oral History project:

Update: The \$150,000 appropriated to the Grout Museum District is phase one of a two phase project. Camera, video editing station and data storage for veteran interviews, at a cost of \$36,489, was completed in January of 2013. Once the camera was acquired and tested, staff publicized and launched a statewide interviewing campaign in each quadrant of the state. This campaign was to cover 12 months. During that time the interview videos were cataloged and added to the permanent video archives. In phase one the infrastructure upgraded, at a cost of \$43,511 and was completed in March 2013. In June 2014 work began with Applied Art & Technology to develop the permanent exhibition installation. This project is an interactive exhibit in the Current Conflict area of the Sullivan Brothers Iowa Veterans Museum. This exhibit features each of the Iowans killed in action in Afghanistan and Iraq, as well as interview excerpts with surviving vets who participated in each of these theatres. In phase one \$70,000 was spent on this exhibit. Funds allocated in phase two of this project will be used to continue the interviewing and storage process, as well as to develop and build the Current Conflict exhibit.

Balance: To date of the \$150,000 appropriated for FY13, \$150,000 has been expended.

FY2014- RIIF

\$129,450 appropriated to the Grout Museum District for the Today's Hero's: Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans Oral History project:

Update: The \$129,450 appropriated to the Grout Museum District is phase two of a two phase project. Additional video editing/data storage equipment was purchased at a cost of \$3,288 to help aid staff members to continue conducting interviews and add the interviews to the video archives. The equipment was purchased in June 2014. Design of the project evolved and the early estimates were not sufficient to complete the installation. To that end, funds from phase two of this project were shifted from a travelling kiosk to finalizing the permanent installation in the Current Conflict area of the Sullivan Brothers Iowa Veterans Museum. Sharing the stories State wide and beyond will be accomplished through upgrades in infrastructure that will allow access to the Today's Heroes stories through the Museum's website. The website was completed in August 2014 at a cost of \$76,127. The permanent exhibit for the Current Conflict area cost an additional \$50,035 to complete the installation. The exhibition opened in November 2014.

Balance: Of the \$129,450 appropriated for FY14, \$129,450 has been expended.

FY 2015 - TRF

\$500,000 appropriated to the Grout Museum District for the Faces to Go With Names: Iowa's Vietnam Veterans:

Update: The \$500,000 appropriated to the Grout Museum District is for a permanent exhibit in the Sullivan Brothers Iowa Veterans Museum honoring the service and sacrifice of Iowans who died or who were listed as POW/MIA, in Southeast Asia. The exhibit is based on the work of Vietnam veteran Tom Brickman and his daughter Shari Kirkpatrick who have collected photos of all but three Iowans who died while serving during the Vietnam War. Initial work will include organizing and archiving photos provided by Brickman and the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund to develop a searchable database. Grout staff will conduct research to increase the range of material available about Iowa's fallen Vietnam soldiers. Vietnam veterans, widows and others will be interviewed. Grout staff will also research and develop interpretive material about the Huey helicopter, an icon of the war in Vietnam. To date, \$65,000 has been expended for research. The research and interviews will become video archives for the permanent exhibit. Thirty-second video clips of each interview will be available on the Grout's website. The development on of the permanent exhibit is currently in progress. Vendors have been interviewed and proposals are due back on February 13, 2015. Final selection is slated for mid to late March of 2015. Target opening of the exhibit is estimated for July 2016. The remaining \$435,000 will be used to create and install the permanent addition(s) to the Vietnam portion of the Sullivan Brothers Iowa Veterans Museum and to update the technology infrastructure.

Balance: Of the \$500,000 appropriated for FY15, \$65,000 has been expended and encumbered; \$435,000 remains.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

Description of Project – ICN Part III Leases and Maintenance

When the ICN Part III legislation was passed, the General Assembly wanted the Part III circuits to be leased from local companies and not owned by the state. The approximately 53 K-12 schools that are Part II sites had state-owned circuits which meant there were no lease costs involved for these sites. To avoid creating an equity issue, the General Assembly determined that the 428 Part III sites should not have to pay for annual lease costs either. To address this issue, they appropriated \$2,727,000 to the Department of Education to support these costs.

The actual annual lease costs of the Part III circuits exceeds the \$2,727,000 appropriation to the Department of Education, but the Department uses these funds as a match to qualify the state for Federal Communications Commission USF E-rate funds, which help to pay the remaining cost of the Part III circuit leases.

With the \$2,727,000 Part III appropriation, the state realizes revenues from the E-Rate fund which would not be possible without the "match" it creates. Additionally, the state does not have to find other resources to pay the lease costs to local companies.

Progress on Work

The Department of Education annually bids the process of leasing, billing and maintenance each year. The Iowa Communications Network has been the contract awardee.

The Part III sites are in place. This funding provides for ongoing costs related to leases with private local companies and maintenance.

Description of Project – Statewide Student Data Warehouse

The Department of Education (DE) uses Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund funding to support critical components of Iowa's Statewide Longitudinal Data System (SLDS). The DE has deployed a SLDS to provide service to Iowa school districts and additionally assists in meeting state and federal mandates. The United States Department of Education requires Iowa to build and maintain a SLDS.

Specifically, the DE implemented EdInsight, a statewide reporting platform which provides important information to Iowa education stakeholders. EdInsight is designed to improve education in Iowa, empower educators with access to data for trends and comparisons. Further, EdInsight provides access to a series of education metrics which can assist in answering key questions like "what is working" and "how do I compare to other schools and districts." EdInsight provides comparisons and feedback to school districts, such as state-wide testing information from the 2004-2005 school year to present.

Currently, the DE has loaded ten years of longitudinal data in order to gauge impact and assess outcomes across multiple years. Education stakeholders are able to examine student achievement data which spans an entire decade of results. There are also additional data sets which provide a robust set of information for analytical investigation. This includes information such as curriculum data, dropout and graduation rates, equity, staffing as a few examples. This platform is used to provide information for the school improvement and accreditation process which occurs across Iowa annually. No other system in Iowa provides this

comprehensive information. And it does it in a way that saves time for school districts and Area Education Agencies (AEAs).

To date, thousands of stakeholders including AEA consultants, district superintendents, building principals, curriculum directors, school improvement leaders and others have been trained and currently have access to use EdInsight. Approximately 5,000 reports a month are run for data-based decision making.

The investment the state has made in funding this project has allowed the DE to build on this foundation and expand and attract new federal grant opportunities.

The expansion projects will allow Iowa DE to build the bridge and begin data sharing across the K-12, Iowa Post-Secondary and Workforce domains. This will result in a series of high school feedback report which will evaluate longitudinal educational outcomes across sectors. For example, the high school college enrollment report provides a breakdown of college enrollment rates by high school and subgroup. Data matched across these sectors is de-identified and kept securely to ensure privacy is maintained.

The DE also uses the RIIF funding to support the Iowa Transcript Center (ITC). ITC is a K-12 Student Record and Transcript Exchange System. ITC facilitates the flow of student transcript data between Iowa high schools and postsecondary institutions. In addition, this initiative includes a permanent electronic transcript repository which will provide a central location for all final high school transcripts and will provide a service to Iowa citizens, school districts, and postsecondary institutions as well as assist the DE in meeting state and federal reporting requirements.

It is very clear that the postsecondary community needs a standardized transcript format. The ability to move transcripts electronically is available to all public school districts through the developed application. Ease of use will benefit school registrars and standardized transcripts will benefit postsecondary registrars, especially with such additional requirements as calculating the Regents Admission Index (RAI).

Progress on Work

The system is in place and operational. The DE continues to work with districts and AEAs on local implementation and training. The DE is also working to expand the reporting information that is available. The cost of annual operation of the system, including all ongoing licensing and fees is over \$1 million. This obligation will be covered by the \$600,000 in RIIF funds and supplemented with federal grant funds.

Total Estimated Cost of Project

Ongoing annual expenses related to this project exceed the RIIF funding allocation. All expenses are for licensing and fees. Federal grant funds currently supplement the state investment.

RIIF – \$600,000 Federal Grants

Amount of Funds Expended

For fiscal year 2015, funds have been fully obligated. By the end of the fiscal year, this fund will be zeroed out. The majority of these costs go to pay maintenance agreements to continue to operate the software for the different components of the project.

Amount of Funds Obligated

The entire amount is obligated for ongoing expenses related to the implementation of this system.

Date of Project Completion or Estimated Completion

The system is operational. The DE continues to work on rollout, training and expansion. This funding covers ongoing maintenance and annual costs.

Project Name and Description – The goal of the project is to enter criminal justice data <u>once</u>, and then share the data automatically with other criminal justice agencies.

Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS) Integration Project – Using a centralized computer system that meets or exceeds all federal and state security requirements, this initiative continues to develop a seamless, real-time, electronic information sharing "system of systems" for members of the criminal justice community in Iowa. Historically, criminal justice information systems have been developed in isolation, resulting in independent systems that may share many common data concepts without being able to effectively communicate. Iowa's CJIS Program was born out of the need for these systems to share information and work product in a timely, secure, accurate, and comprehensive manner. As criminal justice information sharing is a high priority of federal law enforcement agencies, the CJIS system has adopted national standards that effectuate its design to enable the timely, efficient, and automated sharing of information within and between criminal justice entities at the state, local, and national levels. Sharing is accomplished without sacrificing the independence of criminal justice entities and without forcing them to incur costly upgrades to their distinct technological architectures.

<u>Iowa's CJIS</u> system has received national awards for excellence and is a national leader in criminal justice information sharing.

Progress of Work -

A significant amount of progress has been made on this project since its development began in 2007, and specifically during the last year. The electronic exchange of real-time justice information is in process in more than 150 jurisdictions around the state (detailed information provided below). The CJIS Program Office, pursuant to CJIS Advisory Committee directives, has plans to continue expansion of current information exchanges to local jurisdictions and to implement new information exchanges during the current fiscal year. CJIS-brokered information is now a part of the daily business process and workflow of the statewide court system and state and local criminal justice agencies and offices. On average, it takes approximately three seconds to perform a round trip, electronic transmission of CJIS information for any given information exchange.

<u>Examples of the benefits that accrue to the public</u> and to agencies participating in CJIS exchanges include:

- As soon as a judge approves a protective order, the information is transmitted to the Iowa On-line Warrants and Articles (IOWA) System. That information is now available to law enforcement responders anywhere from 12 to 36 hours sooner than it was with paper transmission. Since the first 24 hours following a domestic incident are the most dangerous, immediate information helps officers protect victims from further violence.
- When the DOC documents a change in the address of a sex offender, that information is electronically sent to the Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) which allows for faster and more accurate updating of the State's sex offender registry and website. As a result, the public is made safer by the publishing of more timely information, and law enforcement officers save time in documenting and verifying addresses of sex offenders.
- Police state-wide as well as law enforcement agencies across the nation are routinely and instantly provided correctional related information upon request, including photographs of suspects. As a result, the personal safety of officers and the public is enhanced. This exchange is used by law enforcement over eighteen thousand times per day.
- In seventy-four Iowa counties, law enforcement officers are able to spend less time on paperwork and more time on investigations and patrol by preparing electronic complaints. These complaints are electronically delivered to the Court Clerk and, in a growing number of counties, the County Attorney. When delivered, the complaint information is automatically populated in the Court and County Attorney databases. This exchange assists the Electronic Data Management System (EDMS) that the Judicial Branch is expanding to all Iowa counties.
- The Iowa Secretary of State's database of persons in Iowa convicted of a felony is now electronically updated at the time a felony judgment is entered by any court in the State. Prior to this exchange, the Secretary of State's office re-entered this information from paper reports periodically sent by each clerk. This exchange increases the accuracy of the Secretary's records and increases the integrity of Iowa's voting system.
- The Office of Driver Services is now receiving electronic conviction and suspension information from the Judicial Branch, increasing the DOT's efficiency in handling convictions and suspensions of driver licenses.

The benefits of CJIS also include the elimination of information errors and redundant data entry, allowing for improved and more immediate decision-making, operational efficiency, and an enhanced ability to evaluate the effectiveness and cost-effectiveness of local, as well as statewide, justice related programs and laws. The CJIS Project collaborates with several criminal justice information system initiatives throughout the State of Iowa:

- Appriss (VINE system which provides notices to victims and others)
- The Traffic and Criminal Software (TraCS) system, which is administered by the Iowa Department of Transportation (IDOT) and used by 128 law enforcement agencies including the Iowa State Patrol and IDOT Motor Vehicle Enforcement.

- The Iowa Online Warrants and Articles (IOWA) System, which is administered by the Department of Public Safety and is accessed by all of law enforcement and numerous criminal justice agencies in the state.
- The Department of Corrections (DOC), Iowa Corrections Offender Network (ICON).
- The Iowa Court Information System (ICIS), which is the case management system used by all judges and court clerks, and the companion Electronic Document Management System (EDMS), which the Judicial Branch is currently implementing on a county-by-county basis.
- The County Attorneys' ProLaw Case Management System
- The County Attorneys' Judicial/Dialog Case Management System
- Intergraph, the Records Management System (RMS) vendor for Des Moines PD and Cedar Rapids PD. These agencies host RMS services for Polk and Linn County Sheriffs, respectively, as well as several of the suburban agencies
- ShieldWare, the RMS vendor for Waterloo PD, Black Hawk County Sheriff, and approximately 40 smaller jurisdictions
- Sypherlink, a law enforcement integration services provider working in Ames, Story County, and with the Iowa State University police agency.

Currently, the CJIS Program Office has a number of exchanges in various stages of implementation. A <u>fully implemented exchange</u> means that: 1) the exchange is "in production" as the CJIS centralized computer system has been fully programmed to automatically receive and automatically transmit the information to be exchanged; and 2) that all possible state, local (and in some cases, federal) agencies are actively sharing the information through the CJIS system. Where exchanges are "<u>in production</u>" but not rolled out to all eligible systems or agencies (e.g., all County Attorneys' systems, or all law enforcement agencies using the TraCS software), CJIS continues to implement (roll out) whenever individual agencies have completed necessary programming on their computer systems.

Here is the status of each CJIS exchange:

Exchanges in Production: 100% implemented

- Adult Data Warehouse. The ICIS system sends information on all case filings and dispositions in adult criminal court to the Iowa Adult Data Warehouse (ADW) within the Division of Criminal and Juvenile Justice Planning (CJJP).
- **Juvenile Data Warehouse.** Exchanges juvenile case petitions and adjudications from ICIS to the Iowa Juvenile Data Warehouse (JDW).
- **Protective Order.** Exchanges information relating to the issuance of protective orders from the Judicial Branch to the Department of Public Safety (DPS) and to local law enforcement through the IOWA System.
- **Protective Order Served.** The Protective Order Served exchange sends information from the courts or DPS to the VINE system (Victim Information and Notification

Everyday). When a protective order is served, either in court or by law enforcement, the information is sent to VINE, enabling victims to have immediate access to that information.

- Order for Pre-Sentence Investigation. The Order for Pre-Sentence Investigation Exchange, which is the order issued by the Judicial Branch to the DOC requesting the completion of a pre-sentence investigation (PSI), has been implemented in all judicial districts. This exchange may be expanded to also provide a copy of the Order to the relevant County Attorney's system.
- **Pre-Sentence Investigation Report**. The completed PSI report is transmitted from DOC's ICON system to the Court's ICIS system.
- ICIS to NICS. Following the 2007 fatal shootings at Virginia Tech by an assailant who had a history of mental health orders, Congress expanded the National Instant Check System (NICS). This exchange automatically populates the NICS database maintained by the FBI with mental-health-related court orders, and judgments of Not Guilty by Reason of Insanity.
- **OWI Disposition**. This exchange sends information from the Courts to the Department of Transportation. When a defendant is found guilty of an OWI offense the disposition is sent to the DOT's driver license system. Automatic updates at DOT ensure that the appropriate actions relating to driving privileges are enforced immediately.
- Sex Offender Address Updates (DOC to DCI). A change in the documented address of sex offender triggers an exchange to update the DPS-Division of Criminal Investigation's (DCI's) Sex Offender Registry (www.iowasexoffender.com), keeping this important public resource on sex offender tracking as current as possible.
- **Sex Offender Address Updates (DCI to DOC).** When sex offenders' addresses or other important information are updated on the sex offender registry by the DCI (information usually obtained from local Sheriffs), the information is pushed to the Department of Corrections. The DOC is then better able to supervise sex offenders, which may result in quicker probation/parole revocations of sex offenders who violate supervision terms.
- **DPS-ICON.** Query from DPS to DOC for offender information, including photo identification. Officers are able to query DOC through the IOWA system to access data on any person who has been incarcerated or is under community supervision. This capability has been extended to Nlets, the International Justice and Public Safety Network, providing information to investigators in other states, further leveraging Iowa's investigative resources.
- Court Disposition & Payments (Court to Polk Co. Sheriff). Dramatically increases collections from convicted criminals by sending of disposition and collection information from the Polk County Court to the Polk County Sheriff's Office. This has improved the collection rates for administrative fees due to the Polk County Sheriff's Office.

- Felony Convictions to the Secretary of State's Office. The ICIS system pushes information to the Secretary of State's Office for each defendant newly convicted of a felony. This data transfer replaces a monthly paper report, saving data-entry time for Secretary of State's staff.
- Convictions and Suspensions to the DOT. The ICIS system pushes driving related conviction and suspension information to the DOT's Office of Driver's Services. This data transfer replaces a periodic paper report and allows the DOT to better automate suspension and revocation related notices.

Exchanges in Production/Exchanges less than 100% Implemented

- EDMS Integration Exchanges. These exchanges interoperate with the courts' new Electronic Document Management System (EDMS) initiative. This "bundle" of exchanges allows law enforcement and prosecutors to interact with EDMS directly through their own data systems TraCS, ProLaw, Judicial/Dialog and other case management or records management systems (RMS or CMS). These exchanges are in production to some extent in seventy-four of Iowa's 99 counties, as part of the Judicial Branch's EDMS roll-out.
 - o **Complaint.** Automates delivery of the Complaint and Affidavit from law enforcement via Iowa's Traffic and Criminal Software (TraCS) system, to the Courts' ICIS system for review and further processing. Third-party law enforcement records management system (RMS) products are also programmed to file complaints through this standards-based exchange.
 - Iowa State Patrol and DOT's Division of Motor Vehicle Enforcement are able to use the Complaint form statewide, filing electronically in the 74 counties that are part of the EDMS system, and printing and filing the standardized form as paper in the remaining counties. Electronic-filing capability will be statewide by June 30, 2015.
 - Seventy (70) local agencies (Sheriff's Office and local Police Departments) are now able to electronically file complaints. There are currently a total of 147 local agencies that could use the Complaint form. Roll-out to the remaining 77 is expected in calendar year 2015.
 - Additionally, two County Attorneys, those in Polk and Linn Counties, regularly file Complaints directly with the courts.
 - Court Notice. This exchange returns court case information upon filing of a complaint or trial information, enabling more up-to-date case tracking in RMSs and CMSs. Thirteen county attorneys are currently able to receive this information directly from the Courts. Roll-out to at least another 40 counties is projected to be accomplished in calendar 2015.

• Electronic Citations (ECCO). The ECCO exchange automatically transmits traffic citations from law enforcement agencies to the clerks of court. To date, it has been implemented by 128 agencies (compared to 69 at the end of 2013), including:

Currently, the CJIS network is transmitting approximately 6,000 citations per week. This represents over 65 percent of all traffic citations written in Iowa. The goal of the CJIS Program Office and the TraCS program is to roll out the ECCO exchange to additional agencies that, together with the existing agencies, comprise 80 percent of the citations written in the State.

This exchange saves a significant amount of time for both law enforcement and the clerks of court. The estimated 300,000 tickets created annually in this manner do not need to be hand written by law enforcement or hand entered into the ICIS system by the clerks of court, allowing for more efficient and accurate transfer of information.

- **Victim Information Transfer.** Upon conviction, victim contact information is transferred to the DOC to enable notifications via Offender Release and the VINE network. This has been implemented in the DOC and 36 county attorneys' offices.
- Offender Release. The Offender Release Exchange, which provides offender release information to county attorneys so that they can uphold their statutory obligation to provide notice to victims about the offender's release, has been implemented in the DOC and 36 county attorneys' offices.
- **OWI Implied Consent Exchange** (**MOWI**). The OWI Implied Consent Exchange, which provides the required consent information from the alleged offender, transmitting that information between local law enforcement and county attorneys, has been implemented in seven jurisdictions. The Judicial Branch will be added as a receiver of this information once its EDMS is implemented.
- **OWI Report.** The OWI Report Exchange, which provides detailed information related to an OWI offense between local law enforcement and county attorneys, has been implemented in seven jurisdictions. The Judicial Branch will be added as a receiver of the information once its EDMS is implemented.
- **Registered Victim Notification.** The Registered Victim Notification exchange sends information from county attorneys to the Attorney General. This supports the Attorney General's responsibility of notifying victims when defendants file appeals to their criminal case. This exchange has been deployed in Linn County.
- **Hearing Order.** The Hearing Order exchange sends information regarding hearings from the Court to the County Attorney's office. The Hearing Order Exchange has been implemented and is in production in 46 counties. Expansion to other counties is occurring rapidly.
- Arrest Warrant. The Arrest Warrant exchange sends warrant information from the Court to the IOWA system. Upon verification by the law enforcement agency responsible for final processing of the warrant (usually the Sheriff's Department in the county of issue), the warrant is accessible by every law enforcement agency throughout the state. Development of the Arrest Warrant Exchange has been completed. Piloting of the full "suite" of warrant exchanges, including Warrant Clear and Warrant Cancel, will resume in 2015-16, following resolution of remaining business and technical issues to ensure accurate cancellations of warrants.
- Statewide Charge Code Table. The Statewide Charge Code Table exchange sends information from a centralized charge table to the Judicial Branch, DPS, DOC, DOT, County Attorneys, and local law enforcement. Traditionally, each of these recipients had maintained its own version of a table listing all Iowa criminal statutes and municipal ordinances in various level of detail. This exchange ensures that all of the participating agencies are using the same information and that charge information remains current and consistent. Efficiencies should be realized by local law enforcement agencies, county

attorneys, and the Judicial Branch, when all are utilizing the identical, up-to-date list of chargeable offenses. The table is also available through a web portal for use by the public, academics and other government agencies.

Exchanges in Development (Exchanges not yet in Production):

- ICON/CCH Offender Movement. Automates transmission of offender custody statuses from DOC to the DCI IDENT section. Custody statuses are descriptions of the subject's movements through DOC's ICON system such as: "County Jail Hold", "Probation Discharge", "Escape Warrant Requested", etc. Deployment has been delayed to 2015-16 due to resource and scheduling constraints for both agencies.
- **Disposition Tracking Number (Green Sheet).** This project will create a CJIS exchange that will be triggered by the creation of a new DTN (disposition tracking number) on Iowa DPS' CCH (computerized criminal history) system. That trigger will send a message to the CJIS ESB (enterprise service bus). This message will be made available to any lowa justice endpoint system that is involved in the current, paper-based process of transmitting the DTN as the case progresses through the system.
- **Dispositions to County Attorneys.** This exchange leverages a portion of the work on the Dispositions and Payments exchange implemented in Polk County in 2012. Focusing on disposition and sentencing data only, this exchange provides a more efficient roll-out strategy for that exchange, by breaking it into two pieces. A Collections and Payments Data exchange would effectively roll-out the other portion of that information to county attorneys at a later date.
- Warrant Clear. Sends information from DPS to the courts that a warrant has been served or is no longer necessary.
- Warrant Cancel. Information from the Courts to DPS that a warrant has been canceled and is no longer in effect.
- Incident Report. The Incident Report exchange will send information from local law enforcement to the county attorney and on to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) N-DEx (National Data Exchange) database. The FBI's N-DEx system brings together data from law enforcement agencies throughout the United States, including incident and case reports, booking and incarceration data, and parole/probation information. N-DEx detects relationships between people, vehicles, property, locations, and/or crime characteristics. It "connects the dots" between data that are not seemingly related. The N-DEx system is accessed by participating law enforcement agencies throughout the nation. Thanks to the receipt of a grant from the U.S. Department of Justice, the CJIS program has made concerted efforts to promote and encourage law enforcement agencies to implement N-DEx between local agency RMS applications and the FBI. TraCS will

be making an effort in calendar year 2014 to implement incident reports as part of the CJIS electronic complaint exchange.

Exchanges Requested, Not Yet in Development

- **Juvenile Delinquency Petition**. This exchange would be patterned after filing of criminal complaints and affidavits, from County Attorneys to the Clerk Review application at ICIS. However, the exchange will be secured and "firewalled" from Criminal complaints, to provide the necessary protection for juveniles.
- Application for No Contact Order. The Application for No Contact Order exchange automates transmission of the County Attorneys Application for No Contact Order to the Court. This exchange will allow the County Attorney's office to submit the applications from the CMS to the Courts ICIS system electronically. With this exchange, upon acceptance by the Court, all information required for issuance of a Temporary No Contact Order will immediately be available for review. This will allow the Court to review the request for protection, thereby increasing the ability for the judiciary to more immediately respond to the County Attorneys request.
- **Probation Report of Violation.** The Probation Report of Violation exchange would automate transmission of information from a DOC probation violation report to the County Attorney. This information will provide the County Attorney with data needed to initiate probation revocation proceedings, or, when necessary, to initiate targeted follow-up investigations of possible additional charges.
- Notice following Initial Appearance. The Notification of Initial Appearance exchange would automate transmission of Notification of Initial Appearance data from the Court to the County Attorney. With this exchange, the Court will be able to submit all notifications electronically from the ICIS system to the County Attorney Case Management System (CMS).
- **Final Disposition Report.** The Final Disposition Report exchange depends on implementation of the Green Sheet exchange, above. Once that is in place, this exchange would automate transmission of Final Disposition data from the County Attorney or the Courts to DPS. This exchange will increase the number of incidents that have Court or County Attorney dispositions associate with the incident.

With this exchange, the County Attorney's office will submit Final Disposition Reports electronically from the CMS to the Iowa system, and the courts will also be able to immediately submit Final Disposition Reports from ICIS to the IOWA System. Another advantage to immediately sharing disposition data, in contrast to the current batch processing of this information, is the ability to reconcile the data being transmitted in real-time, leading to more efficient reconciliation of miss-matched records.

- **Order to Transport.** The Order to Transport exchange would automate transmission of transport orders from the Court ICIS system into the DOC's ICON system.
- **LEA/DPS Fusion Center.** The LEA/DPS Fusion Center exchange would automate transmission of local Law Enforcement Agency (LEA) complaint type data to the DPS Fusion Center. Fusion Centers are concerned with collecting and analyzing Suspicious Activity Reports. This exchange would likely comply with National Information Exchange (NIEM) specifications.
- **DPS/DOC Live Scan Booking.** The DPS/DOC Live Scan Booking exchange would notify the DOC whenever an individual is booked so that the ICON system could notify an offender's supervisor that his or her charge has had contact with law enforcement.

Total Estimated Cost of the Project

Project planning began in 2001, and the total estimated cost of project development (from all sources of funds) is expected to be \$10,000,000 - \$20,000,000.

Infrastructure Appropriations for the Equipment Project

Description:

The ICN has received appropriations to replace and upgrade equipment that is reaching its end of functional life for FY 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, and 2015. Following is an explanation of the two multi-year equipment replacement projects funded by the appropriations.

Voice (Local Telephone System) equipment serving state agencies on the Capitol Complex and surrounding areas The manufacturer no longer supports the equipment and third-party refurbished replacement parts are becoming scarce. So far, the ICN has not experienced large outages. ICN is pursuing a third-party voice solution that will include the desired features; such as caller ID, the ability to comply with new eDiscovery laws, unified communications features, and the ability to have redundancy for the Network. ICN intends to use appropriated funds to purchase equipment and upgrade cabling. This will provide State agencies services on the Capitol Complex and surrounding area that will assist in reducing costs to State government.

Internet Services Technology Equipment

Many new video applications for education, medical, and other government services are moving to Internet Protocol (IP) technology. Capabilities offered by the new equipment would allow more simultaneous "IP" sessions and better quality Video over IP (VoIP) conferences. This funding complements the upgrades funded by the Broadband Stimulus funding received from the US Department of Commerce and allows the network to provide more robust services in a shorter time frame.

Progress:

Recent technology developments and agency demand for services have led the ICN to find a new solution that provides unified messaging and unified communications. The desired solution is a managed service that can take advantage of economies of scale to reduce costs to State agencies. This project is underway with the contract nearing completion. All legacy phones will be moved to the new platform.

The ICN selected equipment based on the H.323 protocol, which is an industry standard. The remaining appropriated funds will be used to provide data and video equipment at the remaining sites during the transition to the H.323 standard. ICN has established a sunset date for the legacy video platform. Securing a managed service for this platform should be underway in the next several months.

Total Estimated Cost of the Projects:

The total cost for these projects is estimated to be \$12 million for voice and \$18 million for Internet service equipment. The total amount includes funds previously appropriated.

Technology Reinvestment Fund Annual Status Report – January 2015 (FY15) - Iowa Judicial Branch Funding for Electronic Document Management System (EDMS)

Project

The Iowa Judicial Branch began work on mandatory Electronic Filing of documents for the second time in 2007. "The project is designed to implement an Electronic Document Management System (hereinafter "EDMS") to facilitate the electronic filing of information/documents with Courts of Iowa." The EDMS project covers all District courts as well as the Court of Appeals and Supreme Court.

Progress

Work began following contract signing in November 2008. Design, development, testing, training and implementation were completed in two (2) pilot counties in Calendar Year 2010.

EDMS business and technical staff continue to enhance EDMS in order to realize efficiencies, make it easier for court filers to use, and improve access to the judicial system for the citizens of Iowa, as well as filers from other states involved in litigation in Iowa courts.

Further enhancements and improvements continue as implementation continues. Implementation of EDMS has been completed in forty-three (74) counties in judicial sub-districts 3A, 3B, 2A, 2B, 5A, 5C, 5B, 6, 7, 1A, 1B, 8A and 8B currently. Implementation of the district courts will be completed in Calendar Year 2015. The Judicial Branch provides onsite training for internal and external filers prior to implementation in a county or group of counties. Due to staffing shortages in the Judicial Branch contract staff have been hired to assist in the training and support functions for the EDMS project.

Work continues on the development and training for electronic filing to cases on appeal in the Supreme Court and Court of Appeals courts with complete implementation anticipated in Calendar Year 2015.

Total Approved Funding for EDMS Project

Estimated EDMS project cost is \$19,000,000 over 5 years. Technology Investment Funds approved for the EDMS project is \$1,000,000 for FY13. Infrastructure Funds approved for the EDMS project in FY 14 is \$3,000,000.

Funding Sources for the EDMS Project

The Enhanced Court Collections Fund, the Court Technology Fund, Technology Reinvestment Funds and Infrastructure Funds are being used for this project.

Total Project Funds Expended

Total expended funds from all sources are approximately \$18,500,000 as of December 31, 2014. Estimated completion date for full implementation is Calendar 2015.

Project: IT consolidation
Description of the Work:

Iowa Code Chapter 8A.201 provides the framework for the OCIO's vision to combine, re-architect and focus the excellence of agency IT resources who are delivering information technology services today, into one seamless IT model that leverages shared resources to serve government and citizens alike.

Today, most IT services are provided by Information Technology professionals embedded within the agencies they support with equipment owned by the agency. There will be a transition period where DPH will work with the OCIO to plan to retire the Lucas data center and begin paying for services currently covered in the existing equipment and personnel. The agency will also be charged for the Project Management and Technical staff from the OCIO for any help in shutting the Lucas data center down.

We do not have a clear picture yet on the long term impact of the consolidation, that is, whether the overall IT expenses for DPH will be lower as a result of consolidation. There most likely will be savings when consolidated, but during the transition, there are additional costs that will need to be addressed.

Progress of the Work:

The project was delayed in 2014 due to competing projects for the OCIO and IDPH. We expect discussions to begin again in 2015.

Estimated Completion Date of the Project:

We do not have an estimated completion date. A target date will be established after the planning phase of the project.

Iowa Department of Public Health – Technology Reinvestment Fund

EMS Data System Project – FY 2015

<u>Project Description:</u> The lowa Department of Public Health (IDPH) is required to collect data regarding EMS service runs as well as trauma related data. These data are used to assess system performance and patient outcomes to identify quality improvement opportunities for trauma and emergency care. The current data collection system is over 10 years old, is antiquated, and is no longer sustainable due to system security concerns and outdated operating systems. This project seeks to replace the outdated system with a new, online data reporting and management system that is more automated; provides greater accessibility for EMS and trauma centers for data submission and report generation; and to establish a maintenance plan that reduces infrastructure and security risks in the future.

<u>Progress of Work:</u> IDPH initiated a competitive selection process and awarded a \$215,000 contract to ImageTrend, a Minnesota based company, on September 9, 2014. ImageTrend has extensive experience with off the shelf products specifically designed to address the EMS and trauma data management needs for this project. Since September, IDPH staff has met regularly with ImageTrend to review business needs and assess data conversion needs in order to implement the new data system. The contract contains 10 milestones as performance measures. IDPH has received one billing from ImageTrend for three contractual milestones that have been met and expects all contractual milestones will be completed within the 2015 Fiscal Year.

Radio Communication Upgrade Mandate

Description: Funds are appropriated for the replacement of the Department of Public Safety radio dispatch system. The Department intends to pursue a Land Mobile Radio System (LMR) statewide public safety wireless communication system infrastructure to support the 700/800 MHz spectrum. The system infrastructure will provide mission critical voice interoperability among its primary users and other public safety agencies and first responders to support day-to-day, mutual aid, and task force operations.

Progress of Work Completed: The Department issued a Request for Information relating to the provision of mission critical voice services for public safety agencies, based upon interoperable communications across the various disciplines of public safety, levels of government, and neighboring states using 700/800 Mhz. Subsequently, the State agreed to issue a RFP for a statewide communications network/subscriber units. During the issuance and related appeal period for the RFP, all purchases of radios/subscriber units were suspended.

DPS is mandated by the Federal Communications Commission to narrowband their radio equipment by January 2013. The State could not meet that deadline and asked for a waiver due to the delay in purchase of new radios. The waiver was granted.

DPS needs to purchase and install additional radios to be compliant. Emergency maintenance is needed at three tower sites.

The Watershed Improvement Fund and the Watershed Improvement Review Board (WIRB) were created in 2005. This statute is now codified in Iowa Code Chapter 466A. The purpose of the Watershed Improvement Fund is to enhance the water quality in the state through a variety of impairment-based, locally-directed watershed improvement projects. These projects are awarded grants through a competitive application process directed by the WIRB. Appropriations to the Fund do not revert except for the Capital Revenue Bonds II (RCB2) appropriation. Interest earned on the moneys on the Fund are also retained in the Fund and are used to fund projects or pay per diem and expenses of the WIRB members. Starting July 1, 2012, the Fund is also receiving Animal Agriculture Compliance Fund Penalties.

In state fiscal years 2009 (SFY2009) and 2010 (SFY2010), the Watershed Improvement Fund was appropriated \$5,000,000 from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund (RIIF). In SFY2011, the Watershed Improvement Fund was appropriated \$2,000,000 from the Revenue Bonds Capitals II Fund (RBC2). No appropriation was received in fiscal year 2012. In SFY 2013, the Watershed Improvement Fund was appropriated \$1,000,000 from the RIIF.

On June 30, 2014, any RBC2 unspent funds reverted. Of the \$2,000,000 of RBC2 funds appropriated to the WIRB, \$477 reverted.

Table 1 lists the projects selected September 12, 2008 and February 27, 2009 by the WIRB utilizing the SFY2009 RIIF appropriation. Table 2 lists the projects selected September 21, 2009 and February 19, 2010 by the WIRB utilizing the SFY2010 RIIF appropriation. Table 3 lists the projects selected July 23, 2010 and November 5, 2010 by the WIRB utilizing the SFY2011 RCB2 appropriation. Additional projects are allocated RBC2 funds when slippage occurs from current RBC2-funded projects. These project numbers are given a suffix 'IJ' to identify them as being funded using RBC2. Table 4 lists the projects selected September 9, 2011 using funds available from interest earned on the account and slippage from previously-funded projects. Table 5 lists the projects selected August 17, 2012 and February 8, 2013 by the WIRB utilizing the SFY2012 RIIF appropriation. Each table includes the project name, a brief description of the project, estimated total cost of the project, RIIF or Revenue Bonds awarded, other revenue sources, RIIF or Revenue Bonds expended, RIIF or Revenue Bonds obligated or encumbered, project status and project completion date.

In 2011, changes were made in the authorizing legislation to allow the WIRB to fund a nutrient mass balance study to be conducted by the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship in cooperation with Iowa State University College of Agriculture and Life Sciences. The WIRB approved \$50,000 at their September 9, 2011 meeting to complete this study. The study was completed with a final cost of \$42,116.23.

ASSOCIATION OF IOWA FAIRS

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ECONOMIC IMPACT of COUNTY & REGIONAL FAIRS On the STATE of IOWA in 2014

Currently, there are 106 State, County and Regional Fairs in Iowa. 100 are actual "county fairs", 5 are community fairs and 4-H/FFA Achievement Shows, and one is the Iowa State Fair. (Note: this report does not include the Iowa State Fair, only county and regional fairs).

The primary focus of a Fair in lowa revolves around the youth, furthering their education in their project areas, and providing an event that highlights the youth and their projects. Equally of importance is a Fair's focus on the history and culture of the community that the Fair serves. The following is taken from a mission statement of a county fair in Iowa. It summarizes the mission of all Iowa Fairs.

"The primary focus of the county fair is to, first and foremost, serve as a showcase of the talents of the youth of the community by providing a means of education, exhibit and competition of the various livestock and non-livestock projects the youth are involved in. The Society will also use the county fair to highlight the heritage of the community, and its ties to agriculture, industry, and businesses that are the backbone of the community."

While the focus of an Iowa Fair is the youth, all Fairs have a major economic impact on their community and the entire State of Iowa. For most all communities with Fairs, the Fair week is the largest activity of their community. A Fair can draw visitors from a wide area, bringing much needed tourism dollars into the communities.

- Total reported attendance at the 105 County and Regional Fairs in 2014 was 2,314,859 persons, on par with 2013.
- Total statewide economic impact realized from the 105 County & Regional Fairs in 2014 was \$272,749,112, on par with 2013.
 - Not included in this figure economic impact realized from the sales of goods and services by local commercial exhibitors and businesses at the County Fairs. Most Fairs do not require this information from their commercial exhibitors, and therefore it is not available to the AIF.

4-H and FFA Youth involvement at County and Regional Fairs in 2014

- For livestock projects, 17,189 youth entered 75,035 livestock projects.
 - Youth livestock exhibitors were up 7% over 2013, and livestock exhibits were up 7% over 2013.
- For non-livestock projects, 16,081 youth entered 69,610 projects.
 - o Youth non-livestock exhibitors were on par with 2013, and non-livestock exhibits were on par with 2013.
- A total of \$490,222 was paid to youth in premiums earned in 4-H/FFA competitions, up slightly over 2013.

Open Class involvement at County and Regional Fairs in 2014

- For livestock projects, 4,481 persons (up 5% over 2013) entered 12,591 livestock (up 10% over 2013) in open shows.
- For culinary, flowers, textiles, crafts, etc areas, 13,569 persons (on par with 2013) entered 62,394 exhibits (on par with 2013).
- A total of \$363,418 was paid as premiums earned in open class competitions, up 32% over 2013.

Capitol Improvements to County Fairgrounds

- In 2014 total state aid paid to all County and Regional Fairs totaled \$1,060,000 (or an average of \$10,095 per qualified Fair.). A total of \$4,077,735 was spent by the Fairs for capitol improvements on their fairgrounds in 2014.
- For every \$1 in state appropriation to the Fairs, an additional \$3.08 was invested in capitol improvements by the Fairs.
- This results in another \$28,544,145 in state wide economic impact resulting from improvements to county fairgrounds, starting with the state investment of \$1,060,000 in the county fairgrounds for 2014.
- Capitol improvements to county fairgrounds over the past 4 years totaled \$16,158,408. Total statewide economic impact over the past 4 years from capitol improvements to county fairgrounds is \$113,108,856.

As seen by these figures, County and Regional Fairs are very much an important part of their communities and the State of Iowa. Not only do the Fairs serve the youth of Iowa, but also they have a significant economic impact on their communities and the State. Another interesting fact regarding County Fairs is that volunteers play a major role in the operation of a County Fair, and the related non-fair activated held on the fairgrounds across Iowa. The reason the County and Regional Fairs in Iowa are so successful is a direct result of the efforts their volunteers, as the thousands of volunteer hours given to the Fairs in Iowa every year. In short, a Fair is a community coming together to provide their youth and their families with an event that highlights their community, which in turn has a significant economic impact on their community. Multiply this by the 105 County and Regional Fairs, and the State of Iowa itself benefits significantly from the success of its County Fairs.

This report compiled from data included in the Yearly Summary Report that all Fairs are required to file with the Association, pursuant to the Code of Iowa. Economic impact dollars are calculated according to accepted guidelines.
