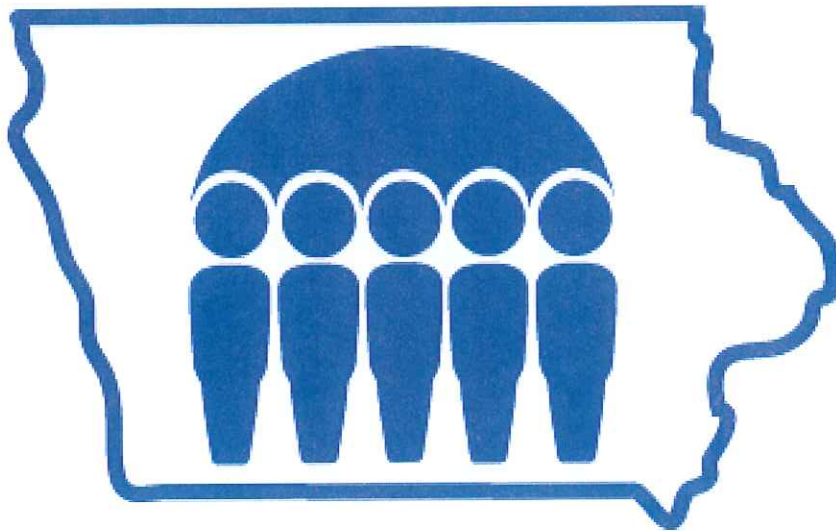

## Inventory of Parenthood Support Programs

December 2013

## **Executive Summary:**

Section 8 of Senate File 446 directed the Department to collaborate with other state agencies to compile a comprehensive inventory of parenthood support programs in the state. The Department requested all executive branch agency directors and elected officials to respond whether their agency was involved in a parenthood support program. The following agencies responded that they are involved with parenthood support programs in the state: Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship, Iowa Department of Corrections, Iowa Department of Human Services and Iowa Department of Revenue.

## **Introduction:**

Section 8 of Senate File 446 directed the Department to collaborate with other state agencies to compile a comprehensive inventory of parenthood support programs in the state. The inventory shall provide a description of each program, the population served, outcomes to date, and funding sources and funding expended for each program. This report constitutes the Department's compliance with that legislative directive.

## **Inventory of Parenthood Support Programs:**

The attached table is an inventory of parenthood support programs in the state.

## **Conclusions/Recommendations:**
