RIIF Report Narrative - Program Summary

Launched in 2005, Iowa Great Places (IGP) is administered by the Iowa Department of Cultural Affairs (DCA) and now includes 36 Iowa communities designated and awarded grant funding as one of Iowa's Great Places.

Through IGP, the DCA continues to put out a challenge to Iowa communities, regions and neighborhoods to recognize and invest in what makes their place a Great Place. This was made possible again in 2014-15 through reinvestment from the Legislature in recognition of the program's successful outcomes on behalf of Iowans.

In its reinvigorated form, IGP seeks to have a transformative impact on community vitality and quality of life for lowans. In reviewing applications, the DCA favors proposals that exemplify bold thought and innovation; encourage creativity and entrepreneurship; foster a sense of place and identity; and demonstrate a commitment to enhancing community vitality and quality of life.

The program centers on recognizing and cultivating the unique and authentic qualities of lowa neighborhoods, communities and regions and aligns State resources with local and private matching funds to capitalize on these strengths through infrastructure. The program's insistence on an inclusive and comprehensive visioning process enables communities to form a foundation for success and for public and private dollars to be wisely invested in projects that are sustainable and involve significant partnerships and collaboration.

New IGP must demonstrate that they have achieved a guiding vision plan and interrelated set of strategies; broad based support for the project(s), as evidenced by the presence of multiple local and regional partners and public-private partnerships; and strong organizational capacity as demonstrated by financial and programmatic performance and service to constituents.

FY15 Grant Cycle Summary

This year, the IGP Citizen Advisory Board reviewed applications from nearly a dozen lowa communities requesting approximately \$3 million. Six communities were ultimately awarded funding, after work with program staff, site visits, and careful review by a panel of IGP Citizen Advisory Board members and State employees with expertise in areas ranging from trail development to tourism.

Common themes identified across the communities awarded funding include an emphasis on creating livable, walkable communities, revitalizing downtowns and urban neighborhoods, and capitalizing on outdoor recreational corridors.

Iowa Great Places Citizen Advisory Board

The IGP Citizen Advisory Board, under the State of Iowa's formal Boards and Commissions, advises the DCA on the program's guidelines, annually reviews grant applications, and recommendations designation and grant funding to eligible communities and projects to the DCA. The Board consists of 12 members, which includes private citizens representing cities and counties, local government officials, cultural leaders, community development officials, and experts in business development. Members of the Board are appointed to three-year, staggered terms and convene 3-4 times per year.

Notable outcomes and impacts

One key metric of the program's success is that IGP have continued to receive statewide, national and even international recognition after their designation and grant funding period:

- The City of Marion (IGP 2009) recently received federal support through ArtPlace America, a highly competitive program that awards major grants to communities working to use the arts to shape their social, physical and economic future. Marion is Iowa's first ArtPlace America grantee.
- The renovation and re-opening of the Historic Park Inn in Mason City (IGP 2009), a project partially funded by IGP, has resulted in a sharp increase in tourism and economic development of Federal Street.
- The City of Dubuque (IGP 2006) was named an 'All-American City', among many other accolades the city has received, while Marshalltown (IGP 2014) received the All-American City designation in 2014.
- The Danish Villages (IGP 2010) attracted international attention and a sharp increase in visitors last September for a film, produced in Denmark, highlighting the community's unique cultural heritage and local assets, many cultivated through the Great Places program.
