IOWA VETERANS TRUST FUND CALENDAR YEAR 2014 REPORT

Per Iowa Code Chapter 35A.13 Annual Report to the Iowa General Assembly January 15, 2015

OVERVIEW OF THE IOWA VETERANS TRUST FUND

This report fulfills the requirements of Iowa Code 35A.13, section 9:

The commission shall submit an annual report to the general assembly by January 15 of each year concerning the veterans trust fund created by this section. The annual report shall include financial information concerning the moneys in the trust fund and shall also include information on the number, amount, and type of expenditures, if any, from the fund during the prior calendar year for the purposes described in subsection 7.

Veterans must meet specific income and asset guidelines to qualify for Trust Fund assistance. Initially, the veteran and their family must have less than \$15,000 in liquid assets and have a household income below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines (FPG). Some areas of assistance have a lower qualifying asset level. This is to prevent over utilization of the fund and to ensure that the veteran has either contributed some of their assets to their situation, or are truly in need.

Some veterans are only eligible for one category of assistance, such as unemployment assistance, while other applicants apply for and are eligible for multiple areas of assistance based on their needs. For example, a veteran requesting housing repair could also qualify for dental assistance. Applications for assistance may be deferred because the veteran has not provided sufficient evidence to warrant approval or denial, but have indicated they will provide the needed eligibility evidence.

The Iowa General Assembly has determined areas of eligible expenditures for Iowa veterans:

- Travel expenses for service-related medical care
- Unemployment or underemployment assistance due to service-related causes
- Job training or tuition assistance
- Assistance with vision, hearing, dental care, durable medical equipment, and prescription drugs
- Counseling and substance abuse services
- Emergency vehicle and housing repair
- Transitional housing in an emergency
- Emergency room and ambulance transportation assistance
- Funding to determine whether a deceased veteran is the father or mother of a child
- Funding for family support groups
- Grants for providing honor guard services at veteran's funerals
- Matching funds to veterans service organizations to provide for accredited veteran service officers

Trust Fund applications have substantially increased, due in part to the current economic conditions and publicity from the Iowa Lottery. During 2011, the trust Fund interest balance was depleted and a waiting list was implemented. Legislative action in the 2012 session corrected this situation.

During the 2008 Legislative Session, HF 2359 was signed into law. This bill authorized the creation and sale of four new Iowa Lottery tickets to benefit the Iowa Veterans Trust Fund. In early July of 2008 the first scratch-off ticket was introduced and later that month the first pull tab ticket was introduced. First quarter sales met expectations, and in October 2008, \$992,771.80 was deposited into the principle balance of the Trust Fund account. It is anticipated that these tickets will provide between \$2 - \$3 million dollars annually in additional principle revenue.

The following information is provided by the Iowa Lottery:

Lottery Proceeds to Veterans Trust Fund Top \$16 Million

More than \$16 million has been raised to help our state's veterans and their families through the sale of lowa Lottery tickets since legislation authorizing the initiative was signed into law in 2008.

Lottery tickets dedicated to veterans' causes debuted in July 2008 and have continued to be released each year since. Legislation approved during the 2008 session authorized the lowa Lottery to create two new instant-scratch games and two additional pull-tab games each year, with all proceeds from the games dedicated to the lowa Veterans Trust Fund.

"We're reminded every year how much lowans are committed to veterans' causes," said Lottery CEO Terry Rich. "We're incredibly proud of the consistent revenues we've been able to achieve for the Veterans Trust Fund and we thank our players for their continued support."

The lottery focuses on varying the theme and look of its veterans-benefit tickets to keep a fresh mix of games in the marketplace. Lottery officials had predicted when the concept was initially discussed that veterans-benefit games could raise between \$2 million and \$3 million annually. So far, proceeds from the games have averaged \$2.5 million annually since 2008.

To further call attention to veterans' causes, in January 2014 the lottery teamed up with a well-known lowa artist to produce a one-of-a-kind motorcycle that was up for grabs in a promotion to support the Veterans Trust Fund. It was the first time that Ray "Bubba" Sorensen II, the artist best known for his annual artwork on the huge "The Freedom Rock[®]" boulder near Greenfield in western lowa, painted a motorcycle.

The one-of-a-kind motorcycle from Victory® Motorcycles in Spirit Lake was given away in the lottery's "Veterans Victory" promotion that players entered using nonwinning tickets in the \$1 "Ride to Riches" veterans' instant-scratch game that began sales Jan. 6.

The latest Veterans games include the \$1 "Say Uncle" pull-tab game which began sales on June 16 and the \$3 "15X" scratch game with sales starting July 7 in that game.

All tickets that benefit veterans' causes feature the Veterans Trust Fund logo in their design.

The lowa Lottery has released a total of 13 scratch and pull-tab games dedicated to the Veterans Trust Fund since the program began in 2008.





Lottery funds are deposited in the Veterans Trust Fund on a quarterly basis. Here are the lottery proceeds raised for the Trust Fund up to and including the most recent quarterly deposit in October 2013:

EXPENDITURES

Trust Fund expenditures can be separated into three separate categories: (1) Veteran Service Officer grants, (2) Honor Guard reimbursement, and (3) assistance to veterans in need.

In April 2009, the Iowa Veterans Commission temporarily suspended several areas of assistance due to lack of funding. After the 2012 legislative action, the Commission was able to reinstate all categories of assistance. (Assistance categories are established in **Iowa Code 35A.13** and rules are further defined in **Iowa Administrative Code 801**, Chapter 14.

A breakdown of assistance per category is illustrated in the tables below. These areas were temporarily suspended from April 2009 through June 2012 due to lack of funding. A waiting list began in April 2011.
