Introduction

The Gap Tuition Assistance program was established to provide funding to community colleges for need-based tuition assistance to applicants for completion of continuing education certificate training programs for indemand occupations.

One aspect of eligibility for tuition assistance under this program shall be based on financial need. Criteria to be assessed in determining financial need shall include, but is not limited to, the following:

- applicant's family income for the 12 months prior to the date of application;
- applicant's family size; and
- applicant's county of residence.

An applicant must also have a demonstrated capacity to achieve the following outcomes in order to be eligible for tuition assistance:

- ability to complete an eligible certificate program;
- ability to enter a postsecondary certificate, diploma, or degree program for credit;
- · ability to gain full-time employment; and
- ability to maintain full-time employment over time.

Applicants for the program can be found eligible for partial or total tuition assistance. Only an applicant eligible to work in the United States shall be approved for tuition assistance under this program. A person will not be approved for tuition assistance under this program for more than one eligible certificate program. Individuals earning incomes at or below 250% of the federal poverty level as defined by the most recently revised poverty income guidelines published by the United States Department of Health and Human Services shall be eligible to receive assistance under the Gap Tuition Assistance program (Note: poverty level benchmark increased from 200 percent to 250 percent in fiscal year 2014).

Eligible Costs

Costs eligible for coverage under the Gap Tuition Assistance program shall include, but are not limited to, the following:

- tuition;
- direct training costs;
- required books and equipment;
- fees including, but not limited to, industry testing services and background check testing services; and
- program staffing (allowable expense as of fiscal year 2014).

Staffing and support costs are capped at 20 percent of allocated funds for the two smallest community colleges, 10 percent for the two largest community colleges, and 15 percent for the remaining community colleges.

Eligible Programs

Assistance can be provided to persons in eligible programs that meet the following criteria:

- I. The program is not offered for credit, but is aligned with a certificate, diploma, or degree for credit, and does any of the following:
- offers a state, national, or locally recognized certificate;
- offers preparation for a professional examination or licensure;
- provides endorsement for an existing credential or license;
- represents recognized skill standards defined by an industrial sector; and
- · offers a similar credential or training.
- 2. The program offers training or a credential in an indemand occupation. In-demand occupations includes the following industries:
- Information Technology
- Healthcare
- Advanced Manufacturing
- Transportation and Logistics
- 3. The program may offer training in any other industry designated as in-demand by a regional advisory board. A complete list of approved programs can be found on the lowa Department of Education website (www.educateiowa.gov/community-colleges).

Process

An applicant for tuition assistance under the Gap Tuition Assistance program is required to complete an initial assessment administered by the community college receiving the application to determine the applicant's readiness to complete an eligible certificate program. As part of this process, all applicants are required to complete a National Career Readiness Certificate (NCRC). An applicant is then required to meet with a member of the staff from the eligible certificate program offered by the community college. The staff member will discuss the relevant industry, any applicable occupational research, and any applicable training related to the eligible certificate program with the applicant. The discussion includes an evaluation of the applicant's capabilities, needs, family situation, work history, educational background, attitude and

motivation, employment skills, vocational potential, and employment barriers. The discussion will also include potential start dates, support needs, and other requirements for an eligible certificate program.

A participant in an eligible certificate program who receives tuition assistance will be required to do all of the following:

- maintain regular contact with staff members from the certificate program to document the applicant's progress in the program;
- sign a release form to provide relevant information to community college faculty or case managers;
- discuss with staff members from the certificate program any issues that may impact the participant's ability to complete the certificate program, obtain employment, and maintain employment over time;
- · attend all required courses regularly; and
- meet with staff members from the certificate program to develop a job search plan.

Reallocation of Funds

Please note that midway through the FY15 reporting year, the decision was made to reallocate a portion of funds from colleges with a substantial surplus to those who indicated the need for additional funding. This reallocation was approved by the Iowa Association of Community College Presidents. Ultimately, Northeast Iowa Community College, North Iowa Area Community College, and Southwestern Iowa Community College returned a total of \$130,000, which was allocated to Hawkeye Community College, Des Moines Area Community College, and Western Iowa Tech Community College (\$50,700, \$67,600, and \$11,700, respectively). Analysis

Colleges continued to make significant progress in the implementation of their Gap Tuition Assistance programs in FY15. In FY15, the community colleges received a state appropriation of \$2,000,000 to implement the Gap Tuition Assistance program.

Accounting for the \$861,426 of funding appropriated in FY14 carried forward into FY15, colleges had a total of \$2,861,426 to spend over the past year. Of the \$2.8 million in total available funds, colleges spent a total of \$2,415,015 on tuition and books, equipment, fees and testing, and program staff. Accordingly, colleges will carryforward into FY16 a total of \$446,411 in funds, a significantly smaller carryforward total than was noted last year. It should be noted that a portion of the funds

carried forward into FY16 may already be apportioned to active students who are currently participating in or waiting to participate in an approved training program.

Breaking down the expenditures from FY15, \$2,037,748 was spent on tuition and required books for approved participants, \$38,886 was spent on equipment, and \$145,917 was spent on fees, assessments and testing. In addition, \$192,464 was spent on staff support and services.

In FY15, 3,272 individuals completed an application to be considered for tuition assistance under the Gap Assistance Tuition program. Of these applicants, 1,348 were approved and accepted into a program. At the time of reporting, 1,049 individuals had completed the training program in which they enrolled; 180 had failed to complete their training. The remaining individuals were either actively participating or waiting to participate in the Gap Tuition Assistance program. The statewide completion rate for FY15 was 85.4 percent.

Colleges are required to collect rudimentary employment statistics on program completers. In FY15, 594 individuals found new employment after completing their training; 153 individuals retained employment. Thirty-one (31) individuals continued onto further full-time education upon completion of their training program. At the time of reporting, 98 completers were looking for employment. The overall employment rate among completers in FY15 was 88.4 percent. In addition, 70.3 percent of completers reported gaining new employment upon completion of their training program.

There are currently 286 approved certificate programs eligible for student enrollment. Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) programs were the most utilized with 300 participants. Commercial drivers license (CDL)/ Transportation were the next most utilized with 243 participants, and welding was third most with 132 participants.




