







(Monthly Premiums)









IOWA FARMLAND AVERAGE VALUE PER ACRE





IOWA TOTAL REALIZED NET FARM INCOME





1991 PERCENT OF EXPORT SALES BY PRODUCT TYPE









DISTRIBUTION OF IOWA'S MANUFACTURED EXPORTS 1992













1992-93 UNDERGRADUATE RESIDENT TUITION AND FEES AT BIG 10 INSTITUTIONS































TOTAL ADMISSIONS, RELEASES, AND YEAR-END PRISON POPULATION









ROAD USE TAX FUND REVENUE 1993













The first session of the 74th General Assembly passed salary adjustment legislation (SF 548) for FY 1992 fully funding the arbitrated agreements for contract employees and providing a 2.0% cost of living increase for non-contract employees.
