

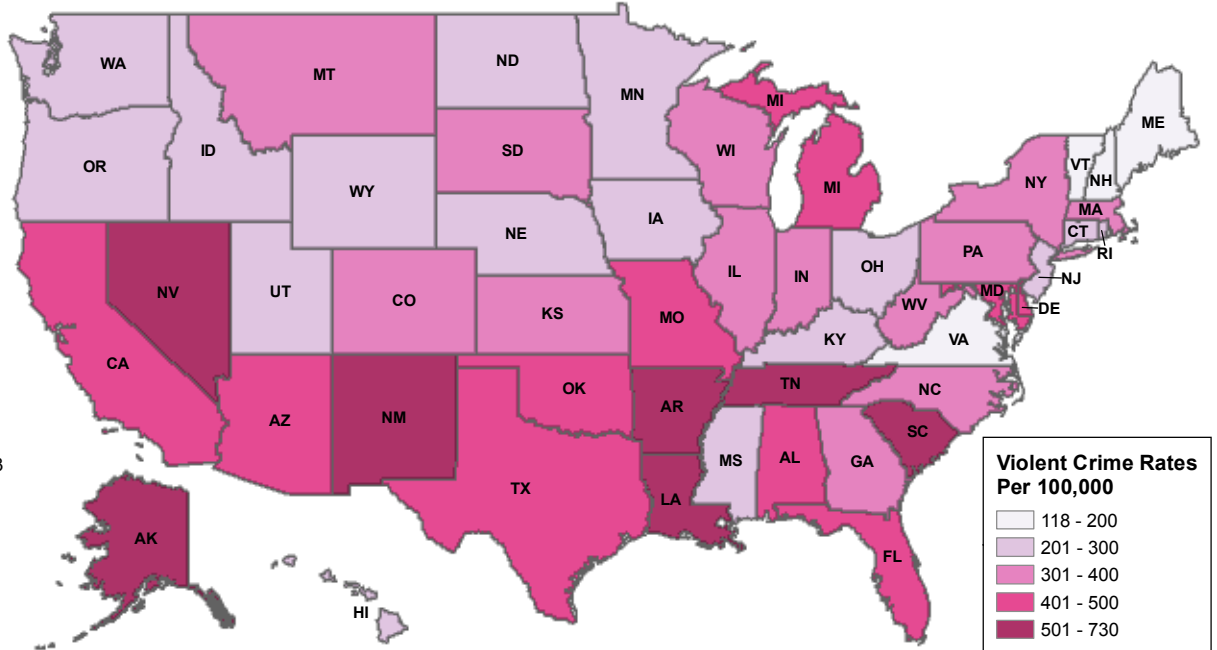

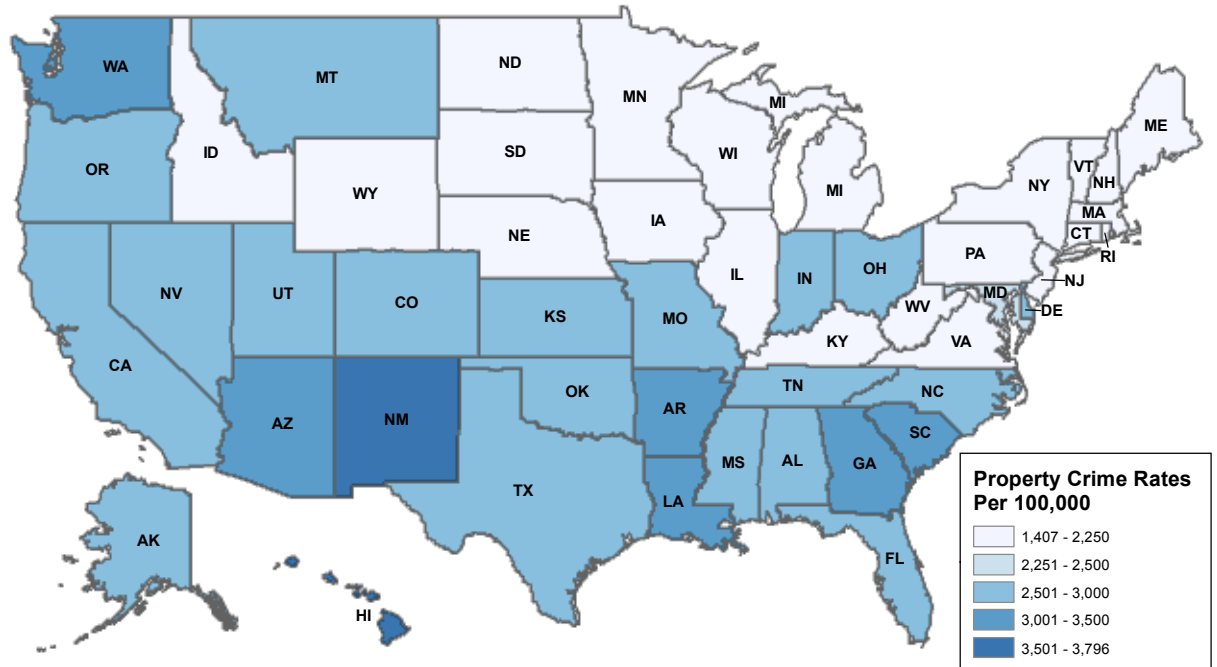

The property crime category includes arson because the offense involves the destruction of property; however, arson victims may be subjected to force.
