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# Federal Education Funding in Iowa

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## Background

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Federal funding supplements State and local resources to help schools meet educational goals, provide equitable opportunities, and support the needs of students. According to the United States Department of Education (USDE), federal contributions account for about eight percent of total funding for elementary and secondary education.

The Iowa Department of Education (DE) oversees the State education system, which includes Pre K-12 public schools, accredited nonpublic schools, area education agencies, community colleges, and teacher preparation programs. The DE serves as the primary intermediary between the federal government and Iowa's local education agencies (LEAs). The DE receives and distributes federal funds, implements federal legislation, and ensures compliance with federal education laws.

This ***Fiscal Research Brief*** reviews examples of funding sources used by the DE from FY 2023 to FY 2025. For each category of federal funds received, a table is presented showing an identified federal catalog number, the federal grant name, the State-identified name for the funds deposited into a State fund or State appropriation account, and the three-year history of funds received. The reporting on the amounts received is provided from the State accounting system and is reported by State fiscal year. The recent State realignment of departments and agencies did impact multiple funding streams, including moving Iowa College Aid, the Iowa School for the Deaf, and Iowa Educational Services for the Blind and Visually Impaired (IESBVI) under the DE and moving Adult Education from the DE to Iowa Workforce Development (IWD).

## Funds by Federal Department

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The USDE is the primary federal agency providing education-related funds to Iowa. It administers a wide range of grants and funding for programs aimed at improving Pre K-12 education, special education, and related programs. Some federal funding authorized under the [Every Student Succeeds Act \(ESSA\)](#) include the following:

- Title I funding supports schools with a high percentage of low-income students.
- Title II funding provides professional development for educators.
- Title III funding supports English learners.
- Title IV provides funds for before-school programs, after-school programs, and summer programs to support academic enrichment and other student services.

In addition to these federal funds, the DE in recent years also received multiple rounds of federal support in response to the COVID-19 pandemic to address learning disruptions and support schools.

Multiple other federal agencies provide education-related funding to states. The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) provides federal funding to support nutrition programs in schools through multiple programs including the following:

- National School Lunch Program (NSLP)
- School Breakfast Program (SBP)
- Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)
- Summer Food Service Program (SFSP)

The United States Department of Health and Human Services provides funding to support early childhood education and other family support services. Included in that funding is Early Head Start, supporting children from birth to three years of age, and Head Start, which promotes school readiness for children ages three to five years old.

The Department of Labor (DOL) works in partnership with the USDE supporting career and technical education (CTE) through the [Strengthening Career and Technical Education for the 21st Century Act](#), also known as Perkins V. The DOL provides additional funding to develop apprenticeship programs.

The Department of Justice (DOJ) provides funding for programs related to school safety, violence prevention, bullying, and cyberbullying.

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## Types of Federal Funding

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The USDE offers a wide range of grants and funding streams aimed at supporting educational initiatives across schools. These grants can be broadly categorized into formula grants, competitive and discretionary grants, and block grants.

Formula grants are allocated based on specific formulas, such as the number of low-income students or the population of students with disabilities. The allocation of funds is often predetermined, and recipients do not need to compete for them. Some examples include Title I funds or [Individuals with Disabilities Education Act \(IDEA\)](#) funding, which supports special education.

Competitive grants require applicants to submit proposals that are reviewed and selected based on merit and scoring. These grants often fund innovative or high-priority educational initiatives. These grants can be project-based or focused on identified initiatives like charter school expansion. Discretionary grants are similar but may involve a more detailed application process, are often more competitive in nature, and are issued at the discretion of the grantor. These grants have supported priorities such as innovative approaches to literacy and school safety programs.

Block grants are large, flexible grants with broad federal guidelines but significant local discretion on how the money is used. Education block grants are allocated to states by formulas using variables such as the number of eligible students. The funds are often passed onto local education agencies using a similar formula, with a portion sometimes held for state-level activities. An example is the funding authorized under Title IV, Part A of ESSA, which is used to support well-rounded education, safe and healthy learning environments, and the effective use of technology to improve academic performance. The goals are provided, but the use of funds to meet those goals is determined at the state and local level.

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## Federal Funds by Category

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The federal funds listed below have been categorized by purpose. Each category includes the federal department that is issuing the funds, the general objective of the funds, and the type of funding stream identified by assistance type. In addition, a table is provided showing the three-year history of funds received on a state fiscal year basis. See **Attachment A** for available links to additional federal funding information.

Career and Technical Education

Grant Name: Career and Technical Education Basic Grants to States

- Grantor: USDE
- Type of assistance: Formula grants
- Objective: Strengthen the academic, technical, and employability skills of secondary and postsecondary students who participate in [career and technical education](#) programs.

School Food Service

Grant Name: Child Nutrition Technology Innovation Grant

- Grantor: United States Department of Agriculture (USDA)
- Type of assistance: Project grants
- Objective: Provide grants that help state and coordinating agencies develop, improve, and maintain technology systems for managing child nutrition programs.

Grant Name: National School Lunch Program

- Grantor: USDA
- Type of assistance: Formula grants
- Objective: Support states in offering nutritious school meals through cash grants and food procurement, while promoting the use of domestic agricultural products. Participating school food authorities are provided per meal reimbursements for each reimbursable meal served, as well as donated commodity foods to reduce program costs.

Grant Name: Child and Adult Care Food Program

- Grantor: USDA
- Type of assistance: Formula grants
- Objective: Provide grants and support for food service programs in child and adult care settings, after-school programs, and emergency shelters. Eligible programs are provided per

meal reimbursements for each reimbursable meal served. The goal is to provide access to nutritious meals that promote the health and development of children, older adults, and disabled individuals. The funding also supports State administrators of child and adult care food programs.

Grant Name: State Administrative Expenses for Child Nutrition

- Grantor: USDA
- Type of assistance: Formula grants
- Objective: Fund State agencies' administration costs for overseeing, assisting, and distributing USDA foods to schools and child care institutions in operating child nutrition programs.

Grant Name: Team Nutrition Grants

- Grantor: USDA
- Type of assistance: Project grants
- Objective: Support State agencies or local school food authorities in strengthening school meal programs by providing technical assistance and mentoring and training for school nutrition professionals with the goals of improving meal quality, compliance, and sustainability.

Grant Name: Child Nutrition Discretionary Grants Limited Availability

- Grantor: USDA
- Type of assistance: Project grants and cooperative agreements
- Objective: Provide a variety of grants and cooperative agreements that support State agencies in improving child nutrition programs. These include funding for equipment purchases, administrative reviews, staff training, summer food access, breakfast expansion, and initiatives to enhance the nutritional quality of school meals.

Grant Name: Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program

- Grantor: USDA
- Type of assistance: Project grants
- Objective: Assist states, through cash grants, in providing free fresh fruits and vegetables to elementary schools with high percentages of children who receive free or reduced-price meals through the National School Lunch Program.

Grant Name: Farm to School State Formula Grant

- Grantor: USDA
- Type of assistance: Formula grants
- Objective: Fund farm to school programs that expand local food use in child nutrition programs. The funds also provide agricultural education for children.

- Grantor: USDE
- Type of assistance: Formula grants
- Objective: Assist states providing special education and related services to children with disabilities ages three through five years through grants.

Grant Name: Special Education Grants for Infants and Families

- Grantor: USDE
- Type of assistance: Formula grants
- Objective: Provide grants to states to assist with the implementation and maintenance of a statewide, comprehensive, coordinated, multidisciplinary, interagency system to make available early intervention services to infants and toddlers with disabilities and their families.

**Postsecondary Education and Adult Education**

Grant Name: Undergraduate Programs

- Grantor: USDE
- Type of assistance: Project grants
- Objective: Provide six- or seven-year grants to states and partnerships to provide support and maintain a commitment to eligible students from low-income backgrounds, including students with disabilities, to assist the students in obtaining a secondary school diploma (or its recognized equivalent) and in preparing for and succeeding in postsecondary education. The Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs (GEAR UP) initiative has two major service components of early intervention and college preparation activities. All projects provide a comprehensive set of early intervention services including mentoring, tutoring, academic and career counseling, and services to increase parental involvement. Other college preparation activities include exposure to college campuses and financial aid information and assistance. Provides college scholarships to participating students.

Grant Name: AmeriCorps State and National 94.006

- Grantor: Corporation for National and Community Service
- Type of assistance: Project grants
- Objective: Address community needs by recruiting, training, and managing AmeriCorps members. Members may receive a living allowance and benefits and earn an education award after completing service in an approved position.

Grant Name: Adult Education Basic Grants to States

- Grantor: USDE
- Type of assistance: Formula grants
- Objective: Fund local programs providing adult education and literacy services including workplace literacy services, family literacy services, and English literacy and integrated English literacy-civics education programs. Participation in these programs is limited to adults and out-of-school youths aged 16 and older who do not have a high school diploma or equivalent and who are not enrolled or required to be enrolled in a secondary school.

Grant Name: Veterans Education

- Grantor: United States Department of Veterans Affairs
- Type of assistance: Reimbursement-based
- Objective: Ensure that veterans and their dependents have access to high-quality educational opportunities through the [GI Bill](#) by supporting compliance efforts, outreach, and assistance. The State Approving Agency (SAA), which in the State of Iowa is the DE, reviews facilities and programs to verify that they meet federally mandated approval criteria. The SAA also provides technical assistance and training to ensure proper administration of the GI Bill.

- Grantor: USDE
- Type of assistance: Formula grants
- Objective: Provide grants to State Educational Agencies (SEAs) and, through the SEAs, to LEAs to increase student academic achievement consistent with State academic standards; improve the quality and effectiveness of teachers, principals, and other school leaders; increase the number of teachers, principals, and other school leaders who are effective in improving student academic achievement in schools; and provide low-income and minority students greater access to effective teachers, principals, and other school leaders.

- Objective: Support school readiness for low-income children and families by providing education, health, nutrition, and social services. Early Head Start programs focus on infants and toddlers. Programs collaborate with local schools and other early education providers to support students, and training is provided to strengthen staff skills and learning environments.
