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**Description**

**House File 2328** relates to voter registration and voting by lowering the age at which a person may register to vote and the age at which a registered voter is eligible to vote in a primary. The bill allows a registered voter who is not 18 years of age to vote in a primary election if the voter will be at least 18 years of age on the date of the election. This bill is effective January 1, 2017.

**Background**

- Current law in Iowa permits a young person who is at least 17 and one-half years of age to register to vote. The registration does not become effective until the voter turns age 18.
- According to the National Conference on State Legislatures (NCSL), approximately 21 states, including Iowa currently, permit young people to register to vote before they reach the voting age of 18.

**Assumptions**

- Arikkan, the IVoters System vendor, estimates this change will require between 1,300 and 1,750 hours to reprogram the IVoters system. The cost per hour is approximately \$110.
- Precinct Atlas, an electronic pollbook system for more than 55 counties in Iowa estimates programming costs of approximately \$600.

**Fiscal Impact**

The cost to the Secretary of State's Office to reprogram the IVoters System for voter registration and election management is estimated to range between \$143,000 and \$193,000.

**Description**

**House File 2311** prohibits local authorities from placing or maintaining automated traffic enforcement (ATEs) systems on highways under the jurisdiction of the Department of Transportation (DOT).

**Background**

The Iowa DOT filed administrative rules in January 2014 that regulated the use of ATEs on the primary road system. In March 2015, the Department ordered nine traffic cameras removed. Of the nine ordered removed, seven remain in use awaiting a ruling on several lawsuits filed by cities against the Iowa DOT.

**Assumptions**

This fiscal note assumes that the remaining seven ATEs will be removed due to the passage of **House File 2311**. **Table 1** reflects violations, the estimated average ticket price, and the vendor's share of the ticket in 2014 for the seven remaining cameras.

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**Description**

**House File 2331** prohibits certain entities defined by the bill as public funds from directly investing in companies that are engaged in a boycott of Israel. The entities include: the Treasurer of State, Board of Regents, Iowa Public Employees Retirement System (IPERS), the Municipal Fire and Police Retirement System, the Peace Officer Retirement Fund, and the Judicial Retirement System. The public funds are not prohibited from investing in indirect holdings (i.e., mutual funds, etc.) that include scrutinized companies, but are encouraged to replace such investments with investments that do not include scrutinized companies.

The bill also prohibits a public entity from entering into a contract of \$1,000 or more with a scrutinized company. The bill requires each public fund to file an annual report by October 1 with the General Assembly, and make the report available to the public. The report is to include a list of identified scrutinized companies, a summary of written notices sent, and all investments sold, redeemed, divested, or withdrawn during the prior fiscal year.

**Background**

**House File 2331**, as well as similar legislation in other states, is intended to counter efforts of the Boycott, Divestment, and Sanctions Movement (BDS). The purpose of the BDS Movement is to encourage countries, government entities, and companies to boycott goods manufactured in Israel and by Israeli companies and divest from financial holdings in Israel and Israeli companies. Legislation similar to **HF 2331** has been enacted in South Carolina and Illinois. Similar legislation is currently pending in seven other states.

**Fiscal Impact**

**HF 2331** will not have a fiscal impact on the State General Fund. However, the fiscal impact resulting from future investment activity on the pension funds cannot be determined due to lack of information as to particular companies that may be covered by the legislation.

The cost associated with purchasing research services associated with identifying information on scrutinized companies is estimated to range from \$3,000 to \$10,000 annually. It is assumed that the entities impacted by the requirements of the bill will coordinate for the purchase of these research services to eliminate duplication.
