Cooper Evans, long time resident of Grundy Center, who enjoyed a lifetime of service to his country, died December 22 at the age of 81.

From 1991 until 2002, Evans served as a member of the board of directors of Volunteers in Overseas Cooperative Assistance (VOCA). VOCA provides agricultural technical assistance to emerging democracies and developing nations. He traveled extensively to the former Soviet Union and Eastern Europe to develop new programs for VOCA and to advise on agricultural policy.

He served as Special Assistant to

ities included working closely with the Chairman of Appropriations. Secretary of Agriculture on agriculturrural America.

President George Bush asked Evans to chair his national agricultural policy advisory group. In December of 1987, President as spokesman on agricultural matters when Bush met with General Secretary Gorbachev in Washington, D.C. Evans was elected to the 1988 Republican Platform Committee and took a leadership role in drafting the agricultural plank.

Evans served in the U.S. House of Representatives from 1980 through 1986. In early 1986, he announced that he would not seek re-election in order to devote more time to agricultural activities. He served on the Committee on Agriculture and played an active role in drafting both the 1981 and 1985 farm bills. He played key roles in many aspects of agricultural legislation. As a member of the Select Committee on Hunger, he traveled extensively throughout Africa.

Before serving in the U.S. Congress, Evans was elected for three terms to the Iowa House of


